

COUNTY WELFARE COSTS INCREASE IN JULY LISTED

General assistance to county residents under the Jackson County Public Welfare commission increased 39 cases for July of 1944 as compared to the same month last year, reports submitted at the August commission meeting Thursday showed. It is thought the increase is due largely to the slackening of civilian employment at Camp White which last year was at a high level for older men and women.

The report shows that July's cases this year, numbering 160, were handled for the sum of \$5,575, while 121 cases in July, 1943, received \$4,655. General assistance for June, 1944, shows 167 cases receiving \$5,498.

Old age assistance cases for July of this year numbered 808, 21 more than the same month a year ago, and received \$26,242 as compared to \$20,755 in July of 1943. June cases numbered 812, and were reported at \$25,720, as compared to 777 cases in June of 1943 receiving \$20,358.

The report further showed 14 children maintained in foster homes at a cost of \$358, this being a decrease from the 19 children listed for June. Aid to dependent children reports showed 153 children in 61 families received \$4,128 for July of 1944, this being an increase over 145 children aided in June of 1944 at a cost of \$3,958.

Blind assistance reports showed 11 cases receiving \$439 for July, and 11 cases receiving \$476 in June of this year.

CANNERY STARTS RUN ON PEACHES, BARTLETTS NEXT

Cannery operations at the Rogue River Packing corporation on South Front and 13th street started yesterday according to A. L. James, manager. The cannery will have about a 10-day run on peaches and about a 60-day run on Bartlett pears, James states.

James stated that Bartletts for the cannery were to be supplied by a number of shippers under a plan worked out by the Rogue River Valley Traffic association and a statement by J. J. Finnegan, association officer, confirmed this. Mr. Finnegan stated that members of the association had agreed to furnish the cannery with 1000 tons of Bartlett pears of the large, cannerly sizes, each shipper's cannery sales to be in proportion to the crop.

About 90 people will be employed by the cannery, James states. The plant did not operate last year, and in previous years had been operated by Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Boutelle. Sales manager for the corporation is J. H. Gary of San Francisco, fruit broker.

Philippine Air Base Of Enemy Softened

Allied Headquarters, Southwest Pacific, Aug. 25.—(U.P.)—Liberator bombers, intensifying softening-up blows at Halmahera, unloaded 156 tons of bombs Wednesday in the heaviest attack yet on the strategic island base, 250 miles south of the Philippines, it was announced today.

Other allied warplanes maintained steady strikes on nearby bases in the area, with patrol planes damaging a small freighter-transport off the Celebes and more than 200 fighters and bombers raking enemy positions on Vogelkop peninsula of Dutch New Guinea with 90 tons of bombs.

G. I. INGENUITY Praised
Washington, Aug. 25.—(U.P.)—The ingenuity of American G. I.'s in devising new ways of repairing planes, improvising parts and working out time-saving gadgets has been of "tremendous aid" in keeping the U. S. army 12th and 13th air force planes meeting combat schedules, the war department said today.

FRENCH WAR NEWS IN ALLIED HANDS

Washington, Aug. 25.—(U.P.)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower gave Frenchmen a part in the government of liberated areas of their homeland today under terms of five special agreements with Gen. Charles de Gaulle's French Committee of National Liberation.

The arrangements became effective today after an exchange of letters between the supreme allied commander in Europe and Gen. Joseph Pierre Koenig, leader of De Gaulle's French forces of the interior.

The state department said the terms included an agreement on the dissemination of publicity concerning operations in France. This was regarded as a guarantee against repetition of the confusion caused earlier this week by the premature announcement that Paris had been liberated.

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NAVY MAN TAKES OVER WAR BOARD JOB TEMPORARILY

Washington, Aug. 25.—(U.P.)—Lt. Cmdr. J. A. Krug, back just 48 hours from the Normandy battlefield, shed his navy uniform today and took command of the embattled War Production Board with orders from President Roosevelt to "take it and run it" while Chairman Donald M. Nelson is gone on a White House mission to China.

The 37-year-old Krug, who was a WPB vice chairman until he joined the navy several months ago, got his new appointment late yesterday when WPB executive vice-chairman Charles E. Wilson resigned and brought to a dramatic climax his long-smoldering feud with the WPB boss.

Accepting Wilson's resignation with reluctance, Mr. Roosevelt appointed Krug as acting WPB chairman in Nelson's absence but there was considerable speculation as to whether Nelson would return as head of the agency.

Krug told the United Press that he was not advised during his talk with the Chief Executive whether his assignment was temporary.

"The President just told me to take it and run it," he said. Krug returned to Washington two days ago from the European war theater where he directed the restoration of utilities in Italy and France.

Wilson, the former \$175,000-a-year president of General Electric who was called into the WPB to break bottlenecks and ship building, followed his resignation with a bitter denunciation of Nelson, leaving high and dry the congressmen and others who had been protesting up to the last minute that if anything reigned within the WPB it was harmony.
