HARD TO TELL IN ONE INSTALLMENT

Sometimes, apparently in an attempt to be funny, you succeed in being offensive and a disgrace to your profession—that is, if you really have the right to use the title of doctor. It might be well for you to compare the dignified character of Dr. Brady's column with your would-be humor . . . of which this suggestion of "pasteurizing" infected tonsils is too typical. (T.E.L.)

I have tried every feasible method in the years I have been grinding out this column before the eminent Dr. Brady, whose distinguished style you admire started his health column. One method recommended to me by numerous experienced editors was to just monkey around and say anything at all to get the reader's attention and then let him have it in one crisp sentence or paragraph. This struck me as an excellent plan. But no go. I found in many instances the meat of the article was omitted (to make it fit a limited space) and only the chaff was left. Of course that made many readers regard my attempt to be funny as do do, sir or madam.

By "pasteurizing" a focus of infection, a septic focus, in the tonsil I mean precisely what I say—the infected area of tonsil tissue is subjected to sufficient heat to prevent multiplication of germs in the tissue, if not sufficient to destroy all the germs. It is identical in principle with pasteurizing milk or other food. This is a rational, scientific explanation of the benefit a patient with infected tonsils derives from skilled diathermy—electro-coagulation—treatment at the hands of a physician skilled in that field. There is a zone surrounding the point of coagulation where the passage of the diathermy current raises the temperature of the tissue to approximately the temperature of milk being pasteurized (145-150 degrees F.)—and if this is not pasteurization of the tissue in the zone, you may give it whatever name you deem appropriate.

Notwithstanding the radical views of doctors of yesterday concerning the tonsils, the present consensus and practice is by comparison strikingly conservative. Not only in regard to removal of simply enlarged tonsils (and adenoids) in children, but also in the treatment of focal infection.

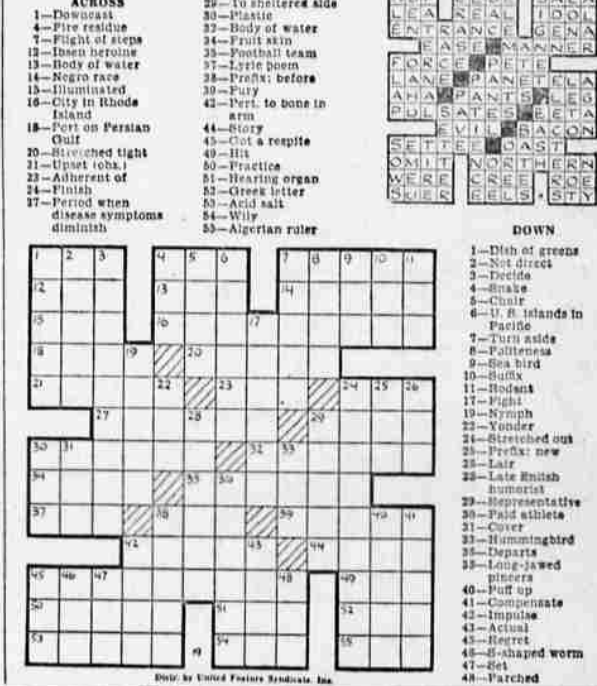
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STATE GIVES UP RUM BONUS PLAN
