High Blood Pressure
Most people past middle life must guard against high blood pressure and its consequences. One of its chief dangers lies in the fact that one is usually unaware of it until its dangerous consequences strike. After reaching the period of middle life every one should have his blood pressure checked occasionally. MRS. GAIL RITES NEXT WEDNESDAY

Also surviving are two brothers, C. C. Card of Youngstown, Ohio, and B. A. Card of Halliday, North Dakota, and five grandchildren.

Axis Tactics Alike Jap-Yank Vet Says

Washington, Aug. 28.—(U.P.)—Second Lt. Richard K. Hayashi, who should know because he's fought them both, says that German and Japanese soldiers are using almost identical tactics in their desperate efforts to stave off defeat. Hayashi, the war department reported, served in the Pacific as an enlisted man with an air force unit and is now with the Fifth army in northern Italy, leading fellow Japanese-Americans in combat against the Nazis.

STATE INTERESTED IN BUYING CAMP SHORE ON ROGUE

Interest in the proposal of acquiring portions of the Rogue river shore line now in the Camp White territory for a state park is shown by S. H. Boardman, state parks superintendent, in a letter to the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce. The proposal has been discussed considerably in recent weeks by county citizens.

"Your proposal is exceedingly well taken," Mr. Boardman wrote, "and when the camp goes up for actual sale, every effort should be made to secure the shore line. So much of the Rogue shore line is under private ownership that every area possible should be secured for the general public."

QUIZ SOUGHT ON PRICE CONTROLS

Washington, Aug. 28.—(U.P.)—Rep. Charles A. Halleck, R., Ind., today called on congress to investigate reports that the Office of Price Administration has ignored congressional mandates in administering price control and is seeking to destroy the profit motive in production.

He also called for review of the War Production Board's proposal to "force additional drastic cuts in the use of printing paper in the fourth quarter of the year." It is time, he said, to ask the armed forces to "justify some of their demands" for paper.

Gravesville, Fla., Aug. 28.—(U.P.)—Quadruplet boys, born last night to a 22-year-old farm girl, the wife of an army private, were reported in good condition today in their Hall County Memorial hospital incubators.

BUTTER REMAINS AT 16 PTS. POUND

Washington, Aug. 28.—(U.P.)—Butter will stay at 16 points a pound when the new September ration point values go into effect next Sunday, the Office of Price Administration announced today.

OPA explained that it had made a tentative decision to raise the value to 20 points but that further study indicated that September consumption would not go over the allocation of 95,000,000 pounds under the present value.

Ration point charts for September already have been printed to show the 20 point value, OPA said, but grocers will be advised to make the correction.

Hollywood, Aug. 28.—(U.P.)—Louis B. Mayer, Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer film studios chief, today was reported resting "as well as could be expected," at Cedars of Lebanon hospital where he was taken after an accident at his Hemet, Calif., ranch.

Washington, Aug. 28.—(U.P.)—The office of price administration today rescinded price control over Concord grapes sold for home consumption until new prices for the 1944 crop are set, probably within the next two weeks.
