

COL. CHAMBERLIN IN COMMAND OF ARMY HOSPITAL

Convalescent Soldiers Re-
gain Strength At Camp
Lockett, California

An explanation of the army's new convalescent center at Camp Lockett, Calif., commanded by Col. Frank T. Chamberlin, former medical director and post surgeon of Camp White, is given in an article released by the army service forces headquarters at Ft. Douglas, Utah. Col. and Mrs. Chamberlin left only a few weeks ago for the new station.

The article follows:
Convalescent soldiers of the army service forces and army ground forces now are regaining strength and enthusiasm for return to duty in a healthful atmosphere of work, study, and play at the army service forces convalescent hospital, Camp Lockett, California.

Situated near the Mexican border, 52 miles southeast of San Diego, this recently opened convalescent hospital is designed for reconditioning and retraining wounded soldiers who no longer need actual hospital care. This period of planned convalescence assures that the soldier will be returned to his unit adequately prepared to perform military duty.

3,500 Capacity
With a capacity of 3,500 patients, the convalescent center is the only installation devoted entirely to reconditioning activities in the Ninth Service Command—composed of the states of Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho, Montana, Utah, Nevada and Arizona. Major General David McCoach, Jr., is commanding general.

In command of the hospital is Colonel Frank T. Chamberlin, a medical officer with long experience in supervising army hospitals.

In a climate considered extraordinarily healthful and invigorating the year round, in picturesque and beautiful surroundings, Camp Lockett offers the soldier every facility conducive to physical and mental rehabilitation.

Two large swimming pools, tennis courts, and a completely equipped gymnasium provide health-building fun and relaxation. At nearby Morena Lake soldiers may enjoy excellent fishing and boating. Gardening activities, for which ample space is available, will have a place in the program of recreation.

Camp Lockett's stadium, seating 7,000, will be used for outdoor entertainment, much of which will be provided by the patients themselves.

An important aspect of the reconditioning program is the careful counselling and classification for training given to each individual throughout the entire period. To realize the maximum growth educationally, physically and occupationally, the patients are sectioned in classes according to their physical disability, educational background, interests and past military training. The common need of the men in each small group determines the type of educational, physical, military and occupational activities participated in.

Continuous appraisal of the patient's progress by medical and reconditioning specialists assures that his program is constantly adapted to his physical and mental development.

A rich and varied program prepares these men for return to duty as rapidly as possible, at the same time giving them an insight into their post-war opportunities. Recreational activities include music, art and drama, as well as every type of sports and athletics. Educational courses in a wide variety of subjects provided under the United States Armed Forces Institute or conducted locally are available to every man.

gram, the patient receives intensive military training in the atmosphere of a soldier on full duty. Close order drill, rifle practice, and infiltration course training prepare him for return to a combat unit.

Throughout the entire period diligent counselling on his mental and emotional problems, orientation courses on every aspect of the war, and expert guidance in the choice of military reassignment have prepared him to return, emotionally as well as physically fit, to active military duty.

Gov. Dewey Praises War Work of Radio

Washington, Aug. 29.—(U.P.)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York, the republican presidential candidate, today praised the broadcasting industry for its "valiant war service" and its "equally valiant fight against those in our midst who would subordinate American radio to federal wish."

In a statement issued through Republican National headquarters here, Dewey told the current conference of the National Association of Broadcasters at Chicago that they could "look with pride upon the part they are playing in the winning of the war."

RIVAL FACTIONS IN WPB TOLD TO UNITE OR LEAVE

Washington, Aug. 29.—(U.P.)—Rival factions within the embattled War Production Board were faced today with a blunt cooperate-or-get-out edict from the agency's new acting boss, J. A. Krug.

He announced his determination to bring harmony to the WPB at a special meeting yesterday with the special senate war investigating committee whose chairman, Sen. James M. Mead, D., N. Y., said later that Krug had "made a good impression."

Krug declared that the "crowds" who back Chairman Donald M. Nelson, now on a White House mission to China, and those who backed just-resigned executive Vice Chairman Charles E. Wilson, are "either going to be in one group or they are not going to work here."

"In other words, if they don't cooperate you'll discharge them and solve the difficulty that way?" asked Sen. Homer Ferguson, R., Mich.

"I have every intention that they are going to work together," Krug said.

While Krug met with the committee, Sidney J. Weinberg, WPB trouble-shooter who sought to smooth difficulties between Nelson and Wilson, resigned. He said Wilson's resignation was a "great tragedy" and predicted that the "demagogic intrigues" who caused it would be banished soon.

SAILOR PROMISES TO GIVE UP FOR WOMAN'S SLAYING

New York, Aug. 29.—(U.P.)—A man who declared he was the mysterious sailor sought by police in the slaying of Mrs. Phyllis Newman, wife of a Fifth avenue importer, whose battered body was discovered in a clump of shrubbery near the Hayden Planetarium, promised by telephone today to surrender this evening.

"I'm the man who did it," he told Jet Mandel, an intermediary and friend of Meville G. Newman, husband of the slain woman, in a telephone call. Mandel told police the sailor promised to give himself up in Times Square, heart of the Broadway theatrical district.

Mandel's telephone number was published in the morning newspapers after Newman, seeking to solve the mystery of his wife's death, appealed to an unknown sailor and a beautiful blonde woman reported to have been seen with Mrs. Newman, to get in touch with Mandel.

Police, meanwhile, continue to search for the woman, said to be a friend of Mrs. Newman.
