POLIO EPIDEMIC DELAYS SCHOOLS

Detroit, Aug. 29.—(U.P.)—Opening of Detroit public schools was delayed two weeks by an official order today as State Health Commissioner William De Kline advised six southeastern Michigan counties to cancel the beginning of their school year due to an epidemic of infantile paralysis in the state.

De Kline, in his recommendation, revealed a total of 327 polio cases had been reported in Michigan for 1944 with 22 cases recorded over the week-end.

RED CROSS GETS BIDDLE FOR END CARTONS FOR WAR PRISONER GIFTS

Washington, Aug. 29.—(U.P.)—Attorney General Francis Biddle told the senate military affairs subcommittee on war mobilization today that any peace which leaves Germany's great industrial combines intact "will be a peace to insure another war against us."

Declaring that these combines, through restrictive international agreements, sought to "cripple American production" during the interval between wars, Biddle mentioned as examples the Carl Zeiss optical firm, Friedrich Krupp, the Stahlwerkverband Steel Trust, Oskram, and I. G. Farbenindustrie.

The American Red Cross has purchased these combines in an effort to assist in the gigantic and all-important task of promptly delivering the personal parcels sent to servicemen and civilians held by enemy countries. It is expected families of war prisoners in the future will be able to procure the cartons at regular intervals of about every two months.

Prompter service in handling the cartons will result from use of the standard box, officials state. It is not always possible for relatives to obtain the proper carton, nor can they estimate the strength that a box must have to survive its overseas trip. Packages not strong enough to survive must be repacked in solid cardboard containers at the censorship office, causing delay and excessive handling, it is said.

POLITICAL TRICK LAID TO BIDDLE

Los Angeles, Aug. 29.—(U.P.)—Charges by Attorney General Biddle of conspiracy between railroads to fix rates is a "purely political matter" and pre-election strategy by the administration, William T. Jeffers, Union Pacific president, asserted today.

"Attorney General Biddle and Assistant Attorney General Berge are wrong and before the coming election is over will find that their allegations are very poor politics," Jeffers stated. Jeffers said that the railroad's federal and interstate boards are fully adequate to control railroad rates and management.

DAIRY BONUS TO COST 10 MILLION

Washington, Aug. 29.—(U.P.)—The War Food Administration disclosed today that the special subsidy to drought-stricken dairymen will cost the government between \$10,000,000 and \$15,000,000.

The payments will be distributed among 950 counties in 21 midwestern, southern and eastern states between now and next March, a WFA official said. WFA already is financing a dairy subsidy program estimated at \$365,000,000 for 1944.

The supplemental payments were intended to help dairymen offset increased feed costs brought on by drought conditions.

Reinforced cardboard cartons for the convenience of next of kin sending the every-two-months packages to prisoners-of-war have been received at the office of the Jackson County Red Cross chapter, it was announced today by Seth Bullis, chapter chairman. The cartons are now available at the chapter office in the courthouse, Medford, and can be used to send Christmas parcels to prisoners-of-war, using the regular labels sent to next of kin by the army.

The American Red Cross has purchased these combines in an effort to assist in the gigantic and all-important task of promptly delivering the personal parcels sent to servicemen and civilians held by enemy countries. It is expected families of war prisoners in the future will be able to procure the cartons at regular intervals of about every two months.

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The program will begin with physical examinations for the nation's school children, which will include heart X-rays and other diagnoses and will be followed by periodic health examinations, the committee said.

Necessity for the program was indicated when the selective service system rejected more than 4,000,000 men as physically unfit, the committee was told by its chairman, Col. Leonard G. Rowntree, chief of the selective service medical division.

Washington, Aug. 29.—(U.P.)—Sen. Guy Cordon, R., Ore., and Rep. Homer D. Angell, R., Ore., received assurance from Public Buildings Commissioner W. E. Reynolds today that the federal government intends to make an on-the-spot survey before going ahead with plans for a proposed federal office building and post-office in Portland, Ore.

In a telegram to Mayor Earl Riley, Cordon and Angell said Reynolds intends to visit Portland and confer with the city planning commission before making a decision on the building site.
