

PRESIDENT GIVES SIX ARMY HEROES MEDALS OF HONOR

Washington, Aug. 30.—(U.P.)—President Roosevelt, in the largest ceremony of its kind since the war began, today awarded six congressional medals of honor—two of them posthumously—for heroism in battle.

The ceremony brought to 56 the number of congressional honor medals awarded in this war to army and to 55 the total for the navy, coastguard and marine corps.

The four army heroes, who were present for the ceremony with their families, were:

Second Lt. Arnold L. Bjorklund of Seattle, Wash., who distinguished himself in killing seven Germans and destroying two machine guns and a heavy mortar near Alta Villa, Italy.

Technical Sgt. Forrest L. Voller, of Livonia, N. Y., radio operator-air gunner who, although wounded, to be thrown out of his crippled Flying Fortress to lighten the plane while repelling enemy attacks over Bremen, Germany.

Staff Sgt. Jessie R. Drowley of Luzerne, Mich., who displayed extreme heroism last January in attacking a Japanese pillbox on Bougainville.

Pfc. William J. Johnston of Colechester, Conn., who held off two German counterattacks as a 45th infantry division machine gunner near Padiglione, Italy, on the Anzio beachhead, and who continued to man his gun even though his comrades thought he had been killed.

Mr. Roosevelt greeted each one of the parties individually.

Clyde Hollenbeck, arrived in Medford Monday noon after having been on duty in the South Pacific war theatre for the past year. Lt. Hartzell will visit his mother, Mrs. J. E. NO CHANGE FINN STAND ON NAZIS

Stockholm, Aug. 30.—(U.P.)—The accession of Baron Marshal Carl Gustav Mannerheim's new government in Finland has failed to bring any measurable change in that country's relations with Germany, observers believed today.

It was noted that the Germans have withdrawn some troops from southern Finland but observers believed this was simply because they needed them more urgently on the other side of the Finnish gulf to oppose the Russian drive on Narva in Estonia.

Observers conceded that the new Finnish government desired peace, but not peace at the price considered just by Moscow.

19,000 JAPS DIE OR WOUNDED IN GUINEA BATTLES

Canberra, Aug. 30.—(U.P.)—Allied troops have knocked out the Japanese 8th army and killed or wounded more than 19,000 Japanese in two months' fighting around Wewak and Aitape, New Guinea, Prime Minister John Curtin said in a war review to the Australian house of representatives today.

The enemy's 8th army, originally 60,000 strong, has virtually ceased to exist as an effective fighting force, Curtin said.

Curtin defended the government's decision to reduce the Australian army and air force by 45,000 men this year to bolster production in essential industries, asserting the manpower shift was determined after conferences with British Prime Minister Winston Churchill and President Roosevelt.

Curtin paid tribute to the part played by Great Britain and British leaders in the war effort.

Lamar, Mo., Aug. 30.—(U.P.)—Residents of Lamar completed preparations today for Sen. Harry S. Truman's acceptance tomorrow night of the democratic vice-presidential nomination, plagued by two worries—the weather and the feeling that "Joplin is trying to steal our show."
