

FOUR FIRES KEEP FIRE LADS BUSY

Four fire alarms in less than four hours yesterday summoned Medford firemen to a house fire, trash fire and two grass fires and caused damage in two cases.

First alarm came at 1:24 p. m. when boys playing with matches on a vacant lot at 128 Almond street set fire to surrounding grass, firemen report. No damage resulted.

A grass fire at 40 North Pench street gave the second call at 1:49 p. m. after a trash fire was allowed to spread.

Burning trash at Kampfer's Bly Y market was listed by firemen as cause of a blaze there at 4:16 p. m. Flames burned a telephone pole and melted wires attached, and several lines were down in the area as a result.

Part of the roof of a two-story residence owned by William Hanscom, 420 North Grape street, was burned off when sparks ignited the surface, firemen stated. The blaze was reported at 5:02 p. m.

NEW MODEL PARIS BLUEBEARD REAL

Paris, Aug. 31—(U.P.)—The mad butcher of Rue Lesueur was no Nazi propaganda myth, but swarthy and sinister-looking, with the sadistic features of a kaffir and the cleverness of a scientist. And he probably is the bloodiest of all bluebeards.

Police were none too happy about Dr. Marcel Petiot, who, according to Nazi newscasts, murdered and burned scores of persons—most of them women—during the occupation. There had been some suspicion that the whole thing was a Nazi invention.

"A myth?" a police official asked. "How we wish he were. He is only too real. We already have identified 54 victims and heaven only knows how many more there are."

Petiot, who still is listed in the Paris telephone directory, escaped and led police a chase through France. He is rumored to be somewhere with the German army.

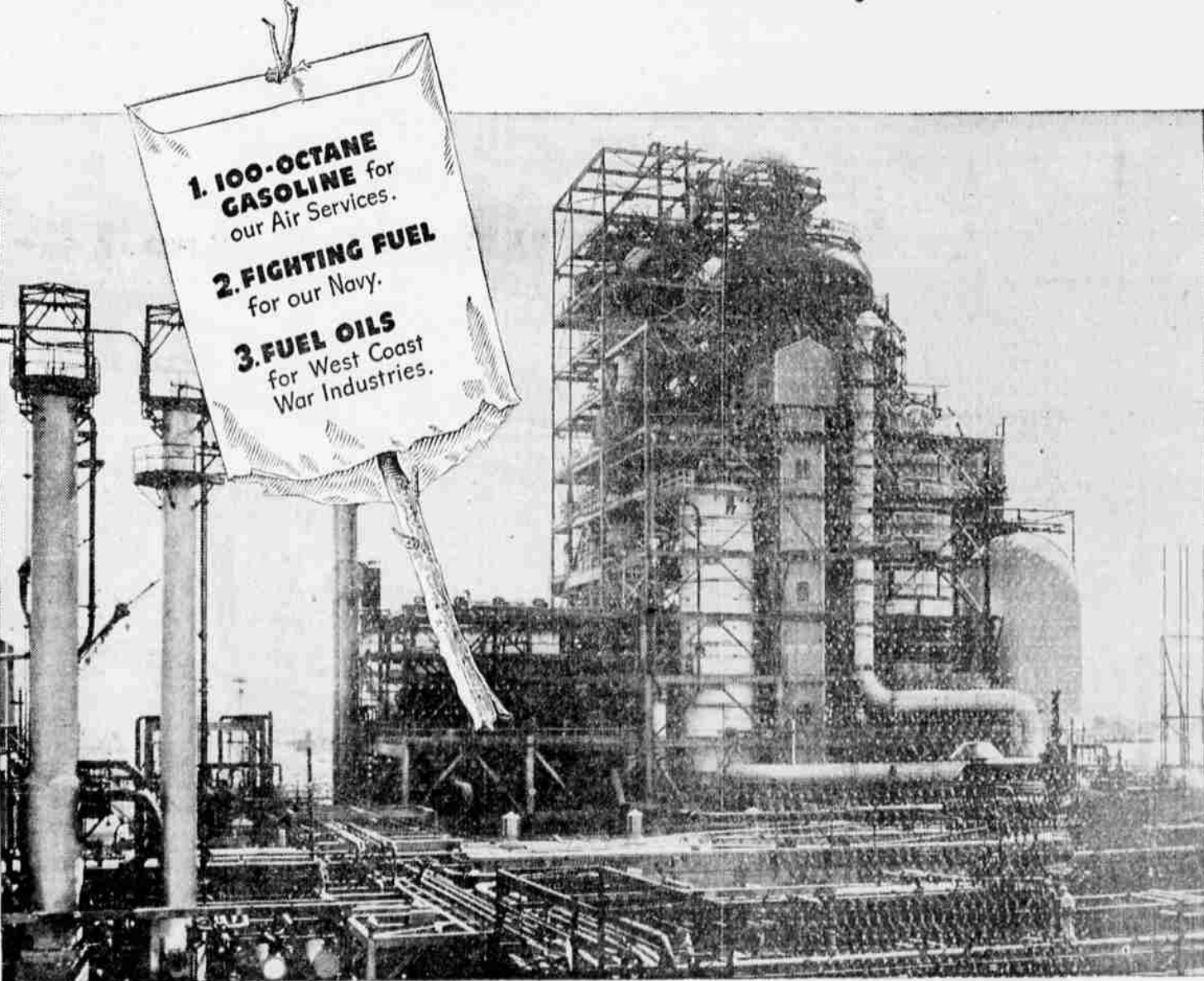

Portland, Ore., Aug. 31—(U.P.)—Probable relief from the danger of northwest forest fires was forecast today by the weather bureau with thunderstorms and occasional showers and cloudy weather promised to drop the high 90 temperatures down to the low 70's tonight and tomorrow.

Regional Forester H. J. Andrews warned, however, that some forest areas may have to be closed unless the low relative humidity is remedied by rain.
