

# Victory Possible In 35 Days, On Fifth Anniversary Of World's Greatest War

Editor's note—The greatest war in history will have run five years tomorrow from the September day Adolf Hitler sent his armor rolling against Poland. The vice-president and European manager of the United Press has surveyed the fighting fronts from his vantage point in London on the eve of the anniversary and presents the following:

London, Aug. 31.—(U.P.)—On the eve of the fifth anniversary of the beginning of the European war, one finds in London official and semi-official quarters a growing number of converts to the belief that the war in this theater can be ended within the next 35 days if the Allies get good weather and a fair share of the battle breaks.

Even the most conservative military view agrees that the next five months should see the armed power of Adolf Hitler's Third Reich broken forever, even if some fanatics should retire into the mountains and forests and wage guerrilla warfare for a time.

A German Wehrmacht which has suffered between 700,000 and 1,000,000 casualties in France, Italy and Russia is retreating—in some places in headlong rout—without the protection of its Luftwaffe in the air and increasingly harassed by snowdrifts and guerrilla movements within its lines.

Many additional thousands will never live to reach the Reich borders. The best approximation of the fighting strength of the Wehrmacht in the field today is 2,000,000 compared with 8,000,000 in 1940 after the amazing German blitzkrieg victories. Two years of uninterrupted retreats have stripped the Germans of vast amounts of equipment including rail transport, gasoline and oil and industrial resources. They have plunged Nazis into a state of gloom so deep that they are frankly admitting that the Reich is facing the gravest situation in its history.

Allies high opinion, on the other hand, is reflected in statements like that of Prime Minister Churchill that the end of the conflict may come sooner than previously could have been expected and in that of Prime Minister Jan C. Smuts, an elder statesman with a vast knowledge of the over-all picture, that the war could not last another year in Europe.

President Roosevelt has made similar utterances and Secretary of Navy James Forrestal, on his return from visits to the Mediterranean theater, said that German army is ripe for revolt than the Nazi home front.

General Eisenhower and Montgomery have said they are driving to finish the business quickly.

The last year has seen Germany suffer military, political and economic misfortunes including the liberation of Rome, Paris and Bucharest. The Nazis have been driven out of all but northern Italy and have lost more than three-fourths of France.

For Britain and the United States, the first phase was a battle of production and inventive genius to build the weapons to beat Germany and catch up on volume production. Japan's attack on Pearl Harbor in December, 1941, turned America from a non-belligerent ally to a thundering, all-out enemy.

America's thunder rolled on the land and on the sea but especially in the air. In one momentous week in February, the American air force smashed the Luftwaffe as a formidable fighting force. It never recovered.

Invasion as inevitable as it was unbeatable struck in June. It was hardly more than two months old before the German Seventh army was shattered to bits and by the 15th, drained by the demands of the Seventh for replacements to a mere skeleton army, was getting ready to flee north.

As this is written American tanks are less than a day's march from Belgium and not much more from Germany itself. German resistance after five years has dwindled to a senseless, random firing of winged explosives into Britain's home area in an effort to extort better peace terms—an effort which all Britons aver will result only in hardening Britain's determination to crush German aggression for all time.

## Ration Calendar

**Meats, Fats**  
Red stamps, A8 through Z8 and A5 through D5 in ration book No. 4 valid indefinitely. Each stamp worth 10 points.

**Processed Foods**  
Blue stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through F5 in ration book No. 4 valid indefinitely. Each stamp worth 10 points. Blue stamps G5 through L5 valid after September 1.

**Gasoline**  
September 21 — Expiration date of stamps No. 12 in A book (three gallons each). B3, C3, B4, C4, T, R1 and R2 stamps worth five gallons each; D, 1½ gallons; E, one gallon.

**Fuel Oil**  
September 30 — Expiration date of period 4 and 5 coupons. New period 1 coupons may be used as soon as received.

**Sugar**  
Stamps No. 30, 31 and 32 in book No. 4 valid indefinitely (5 pounds each). Stamp No. 40 valid for five pounds home canning sugar to February 28, 1945. Stamp No. 33 valid on September 1 for five pounds.

Apply at local boards on form R-323 for additional home canning sugar, affixing spare stamp No. 37 for each person (20 pounds maximum a person).

**Shoes**  
Airplane stamps Nos. 1 and 2 in ration book No. 3 valid indefinitely (each good for one pair).

## FRESH PEACH JAM IS EASY TO MAKE

Here's a Recipe That Saves Sugar and Fruit

4 Cups Ground Peaches  
6 Cups Sugar  
¼ Cup Lemon Juice  
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash, peel, and remove pits from 4 pounds fully ripe peaches; grind the fruit. Measure exactly 4 level cups of the ground peaches (add water to fill out last cup, if necessary) in a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin and lemon juice, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subsides, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing ½-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.

# MART SWAMPERS GOT \$5 PER HOUR BY GANG TACTICS

Los Angeles, Aug. 31.—(U.P.)—

Witnesses told a legislative committee investigating marketing costs today that gangs of swamper at terminal markets enforce demands of \$5 an hour for unloading fruit and vegetable trucks by conducting a reign of terror while police "look the other way."

"Unloading fees were upped four times in the past year without any authorization as far as I can determine from the state railroad commission, war labor board or any other regulatory body," A. C. Ramsey, Los Angeles transportation operator, told the food and fiber committee.

Ramsey said swampers average six hours work a day and are organized into a union, local 630, a branch of the International Teamsters Union (AFL).

August Witte, Reedley, Cal., grower, packer and shipper, said he now pays \$8.25 for the unloading of a truck of peaches, more than twice the prewar cost.

Allen Remy, Sanger, Cal., who owns and drives a truck, said he frequently was unable to find swampers but that when he did the work himself he was forced to pay the unloading fees anyway.

Sen. Hatfield asked Ramsey what happened if truckers refused to pay the fees.

"Swampers consist largely of combative types, and we prefer to pay their excessive charges rather than have our driver fight. A man doesn't look funny with his teeth out. A trucking company gets a bad reputation when it doesn't deliver, so in desperation we pay."

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Sen. Hatfield asked Ramsey what happened if truckers refused to pay the fees.

"He is jumped on and beat up," the trucker replied. "There is always fighting going on."

"Don't the police stop these fights?" Hatfield asked.

"Very seldom. They are too busy to interfere or are at another corner when the fight starts."
