WILSON COMPILES LAST WPB REPORT

Washington, Aug. 31—(UP)—Charles E. Wilson wound up his duties as executive vice chairman of the War Production Board today, leaving behind a final report showing that the nation's aircraft factories turned out almost 68,000 planes in the first eight months of the year.

August production was listed at 7,800 planes, bringing within easy reach the goal of 100,000. Wilson, who resigned his WPB post after a feud with Donald M. Nelson, met with reporters last yesterday to give his last report on the state of the aircraft production program. It was to straighten out bottlenecks in that program that President Roosevelt called him to Washington two years ago.

Asked if WPB feuds had hurt war production, Wilson said that he hoped that it was "not too seriously affected by them."

UPSTATE IN NEED OF TIRE RELIEF

Portland, Ore., Aug. 31—(UP)—Additional truck tires will be needed if war production is to be maintained in this locality, the Oregon emergency truck tire committee said today.

The committee said owners of equipment unused because of lack of tires were urged to make reports to the Office of Defense Transportation and national legislators.

Ed Peck, Portland, contended that although the additional allotments had helped, the increases are not sufficient to meet the need.

Chicago, Aug. 31—(UP)—Gloria Cecilia Martinelli, 23, who was arrested with a cent piece in her purse, said in woman's court today that she earned \$100 per week working at the Pan American casino in San Francisco adding that she "must have been crazy" to have left.

The blue-eyed brunette singer warbled several songs by way of proving that she was capable of working as an entertainer. After a talk with Dr. David B. Rotman, court psychiatrist, the social service bureau planned to see what it could do to get Miss Martinelli back to San Francisco.

She said she came here 11 days ago with a soldier she met at Louisville and that she had been sleeping in bus stations and depots.

RUM COMMISSION STAND IS UPHELD

Portland, Ore., Aug. 31—(UP)—L. B. Sandblast, Portland lawyer, today was back to the liquor commission rationing of one quart and one fifth of whiskey, a month.

Circuit Judge Walter L. Tooez ruled that the Oregon Liquor Control Commission has the right to limit individual purchases of whiskey so long as the limitations are not discriminatory and are imposed to benefit the public as a whole.

The ruling was made in a suit of mandamus brought by Sandblast who charged that the rationing was illegal because of an Oregon law requiring that sales shall not be limited in quantity unless intention of resale is shown.

EX-SEN. NORRIS IS QUITE CRITICAL

McCook, Neb., Aug. 31—(UP)—Physicians attending former Sen. George W. Norris said today his condition was "quite critical."

Dr. F. W. Shank and Dr. E. F. Leininger said Norris, who is 83, does not respond when spoken

to and is in a semi-conscious state. Norris suffered a cerebral hemorrhage early Tuesday in the little stucco home to which he retired in 1942 after being beaten in his bid for a sixth term in the senate.

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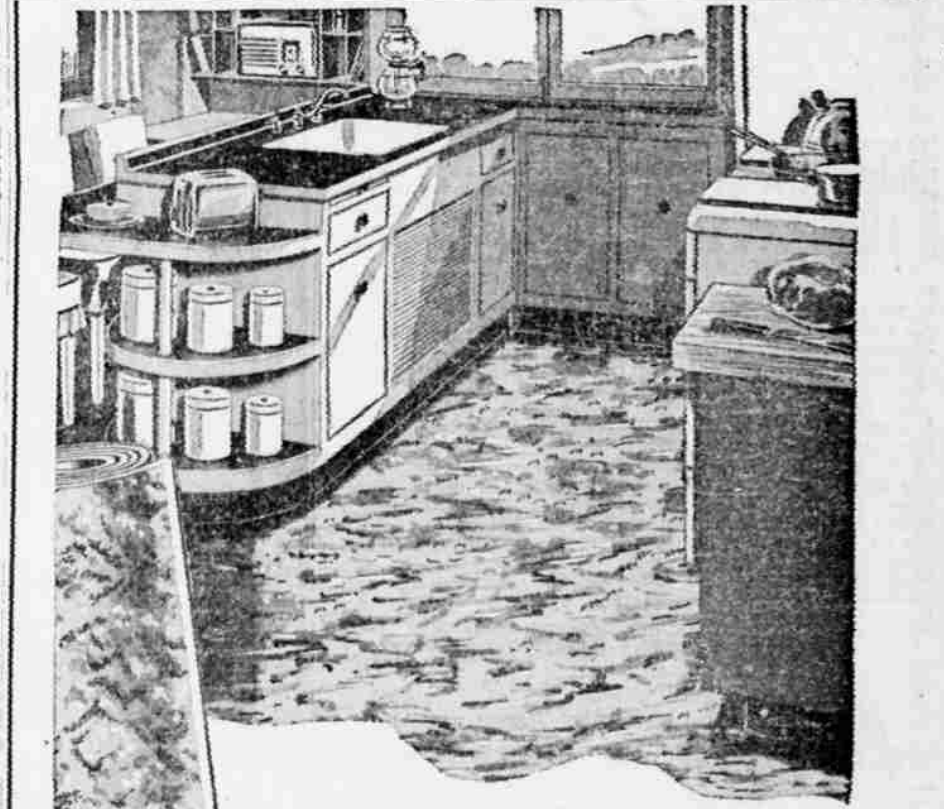

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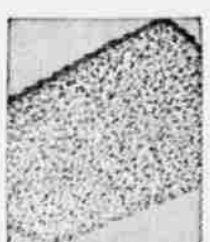

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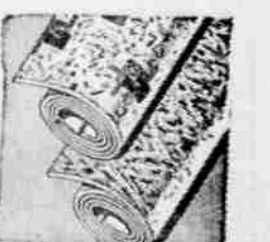
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
