## Gen. Montgomery Outranks Eisenhower

## President For Life?

In his acceptance speech last night Senator Truman based his plea upon experience. Experience, he declared, has no substitute.

Therefore as President Roosevelt has had three terms of experience as President and Governor Dewey has had none, everyone of course should get out and cast a ballot for four more years of Democratic administration.

VERY simple!

BUT we wonder why "the able senator from Missouri" failed to carry his argument to its logical conclusion?

They say that is his habit,—going straight to the essence of all questions.

Perhaps the nature of that logical conclusion and the fact the silly season has started,—that is a presidential campaign is on,—had SOMETHING to do with it!

At any rate, if experience in the office of president SHOULD be the determining factor, then President Roosevelt should not only be re-elected this year, but four years from now and four years from then, and as long as he lives and retains his normal faculties.

Obviously on the basis of experience he would never have any real competition, except from Herbert Hoover, and we doubt if that would be considered very effective competition at this stage of the game. For of course President Roosevelt would each election have had four more years experience than the preceding election, and his opponent by the nature of things, could have had no presidential experience at all.

SO the office of chief executive of the United States, would be frozen so to speak, for F.D.R.'s life time. The people, following Senator Truman's advice, would never replace an EXPERIENCED man with an INEXPERIENCED one, so President Roosevelt would automatically succeed himself and his successor would do the same, and so on ad infinitum.

Not exactly the idea of our forefathers who framed the constitution, but it is, we maintain, the Missouri senator's main contention carried to its logical conclusion.

## Experience For What?

The answer to the above, of course, is that President Roosevelt's running mate was instructed to place special emphasis upon experience, because in that field the Republican candidate is weakest and F.D.R. strongest. Governor Dewey has had no actual experience running a war or running a country, and probably he has never patted Winnie Churchill on the back or called Stalin "Pal Joey".

There is a perfectly good talking point there, and the Democrats would be foolish not to take every vote-getting advantage of it.

BUT, just as carrying this argument to its logical conclusion would have prevented Franklin Delano Roosevelt from ever occupying the White House (he was so INEXPERIENCED as a candidate in 1932 that he promised the people if elected to reduce Hoover's endless bureaus by half and cut federal expenditures by 20%!), . . . accepting the argument as of value particularly as concerns the war and peace, but applying it realistically to what faces the country not this year or next but for "four more years" and where does the argument land one?

Right up behind the 8-ball as far as the Democrats are concerned!

## WHY?

Because it is a hundred-to-one shot the war in Europe will be over before election day,—perhaps it will end tomorrow.

It is only slightly less a sure thing that Japan will be out of the war in a year from now,—perhaps considerably less.

What does that mean?

Just this:

The man who is elected President for the next four years will be faced at least three-fourths of his term, not with problems of war or peace, but with problems of national retrenchment and reconstruction.

What practical experience has President Roosevelt had with retrenchment and reconstruction? With any serious complicated problems of business economy for that matter? The answer is none,—absolutely none!

DURING these four years, somehow, someway the national budget MUST be balanced. When a national problem presents itself in this period spending more money won't solve it, the problems MUST be solved somehow by spending less. Nor will lambasting the capitalistic system or making pretty speeches to the disenfranchised or malcontents, butter any parsnips in the inevitable post-war period of readjustment before us.

NO, perhaps never before in the country's history will a hard-headed, cold-blooded, down-to-brass-tacks BUSINESS administration, made up of the best business ability regardless of partisanship this country can produce, be so needed, as during at least the MAJOR portion of this forthcoming four-year administration.

And in that direction where President Roosevelt has had no experience at all, and no aptitude whatever, Governor Dewey and especially the sort of able business cabinet government he has promised the people of the country to form, would have a wealth of experience, and be faced by the very type of problems, they would be best qualified to solve.

AND let it be added, Senator Truman, that in THIS direction that phrase of yours is as right as rain: Where essentially business principles are involved, there IS no SUBSTITUTE for business experience!

## JAPAN SCHEDULED FOR SAME AERIAL BLITZ AS NAZIS

Mass bombing of Japan with possible 1,000 plane raids and the eventual occupation of the enemy's homeland was envisioned today by Lt. Gen. Millard F. Harmon, newly appointed commander of U. S. army air forces in the Pacific, while allied bombers continued their steady assault on widely spread targets.

Harmon said Japan faced the same aerial punishment that was dealt to the German army in Europe "if she holds out that long."

He warned, however, against over-optimism and expectation of a quick victory.

"We must count on more than a year of hard fighting before the end will be in sight," he said. He pointed out that the allies will need new bases to carry out the mass bombings and suggested such places as the southern Kuriles, Okinawa south of Kyushu, Formosa and the China coast.

Continuing attacks on Japanese shipping, allied bombers sank or damaged five more vessels bringing the total to 24 in two days.

One destroyer was included in the new bag, made in a sweep over the Menado area of the Celebes where air patrols also destroyed or crippled two tankers and two 1,000 ton freighters.

## Pilot, Unhurt Lands Upside Down In Tree

Vernal, Utah, Sept. 1.—(U.P.)—Charles Freeman, Civil Air Patrol commander, reported today that he had landed his plane upside down in a tree while flying unconscious. Freeman said he struck his head on the side of the plane during a freak windstorm. When he regained consciousness, he was hanging upside down by his safety belt. The craft had landed in a tree, but Freeman was uninjured.
