Washington, Sept. 2.—(U.P.) J. W. Millard, retiring director of the war food administration's materials and facilities branch, predicted today that most controls over the production and distribution of farm machinery will be lifted by next summer.

As long as the war goes on there will be "spot" shortages, he said, but output of farm implements now has reached 100 per cent of pre-war levels.
