

SPAIN WAR VETS DONATE \$300 FOR PLASMA PROGRAM

The sum of \$300, netted by members of the Col. Sargent Auxiliary No. 13 to the United Spanish War Veterans from the last sale of McKinley carnations, has been donated to the Jackson County chapter of the American Red Cross to be used for the blood plasma program, according to an announcement by Mrs. Bertha Bonney, president of the auxiliary.

In a letter of appreciation for the check, forwarded to the area office at San Francisco, Seth M. Bullis, chairman of the chapter, wrote: "You are fully aware of the large number of lives of soldiers and sailors saved by the availability of plasma, and aware of the continued demand for the precious fluid. Unfortunately, Jackson county, by reason of its geographical location, is unable to participate in the actual blood donor program. Your generous contribution, however, will permit recognition of the county, and of your auxiliary, in the program."

"We are forwarding your check intact to the area office at San Francisco for their use in the manner you designate. Our thanks to your organization will be echoed by the service men who receive the ultimate benefit."

Commenting on the blood plasma gift Mrs. Bonney stated, "For quite some time we labored with the idea of buying an iron lung, but after due investigation, we found it not available. Blood plasma is needed every moment of the day and night and we feel those of you who so kindly paid your dime for a carnation will feel fully repaid in the knowledge it is at this moment being used to save the lives of our service men wherever they are."

"We also offer a vote of thanks and appreciation to Seth M. Bullis, chairman of Jackson County Chapter, American Red Cross, for his kind acknowledgment of the gift."

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LAST RITES HELD AT ASHLAND FOR MRS. MATTIE LOWE

Funeral services for Mrs. D. M. Lowe who died Friday at her home in East Ashland were held at Litwiler's Mortuary Monday afternoon at Ashland. Interment was in the family plot.

She was born July 16, 1869, near Trenton, Mo., where she lived until she was married to D. M. Lowe July 29, 1888. They moved to Eastern Oregon early in her married life, then to California where she was active in church and community organizations.

In 1909 Mrs. Lowe and her family moved to Ashland and bought a farm in the Valley View district. In a short time the old Meyer ranch was purchased where the family lived until 1934.

During the residence of the family in the Valley View district Mr. and Mrs. Lowe represented the Ashland and Medford localities at county, state and national fairs where they were outstanding exhibitors, winning many silver cups, trophies and first ribbons. Mrs. Lowe's superior canned fruit contributed largely to this success.

For a time the family resided near the fair grounds in Medford and during this time Mrs. Lowe served the Pythian Sisters at their most excellent chief. She has been active in the Order of the Eastern Star in Ashland and The Daughter of the Nile in Medford.

Mrs. Lowe is survived by her husband, D. M. Lowe and three sons, Jewell D. Lowe and Chief Petty Officer L. Don Lowe, now serving the navy in the South Pacific, both of Ashland; George K. Lowe, Eugene, Ore.; a daughter, Mrs. Carl Anderson, Long Beach; a sister, Mrs. Emma Gentry, Bolivar, Mo. Three grandchildren, Jacqueline, Donna, and David, and Mrs. Carl Anderson, Long Beach, and a great grandson, Mrs. Lowe's namesake, Martin Rau.

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FINAL WEEK MAIL TRIBUNE BARGAIN DAYS UNDERWAY

Circulation Manager Gerald T. Latham today urged all Mail Tribune subscribers to take advantage of the annual "Bargain Days" subscription offer as early as possible this week to avoid a last-minute rush and confusion. Closing Monday, Sept. 11, the current drive allows new subscribers or those making renewals, reduced rates in both carrier and mail routes. Cost of the one year subscription by carrier is \$7.50, a saving of 17 per cent under the monthly payment plan, while the yearly subscription by mail is \$6, or 33 1-3 per cent savings.

Subscribers should mail, send or bring notices to the Mail Tribune office rather than subscribing through carriers. Office hours at the Tribune are from 8 a. m. to 5:30 p. m.

Impressions of an American soldier in a war-devastated country were expressed by T. S. Melvin W. Kohn in a letter written from France to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Kohn of Rt. 2, box 427, Medford. Kohn's wife lives in Grants Pass.

Serving in an engineers' unit which also helped build the Alcan Highway in Alaska, Kohn has now been in France about two months. He is a graduate of Medford high school.

Kohn writes, in part: "We can't have even a match lit after dark so we have to grab off a little daytime to write letters. They have been keeping us a little busy since we got here, but I guess we could be a lot busier. So far we haven't had to dodge any bullets. Things are sure blown to hell in this country. Everything you see reminds you that there is a war on. I'd hate like the devil to see all this happen in the U. S. but there are a lot of people there that should see it, then they would realize what war is like when it comes to your own homes. These little kids over here never knew what chocolate was till old big hearted G. I. Joe came along with his ration. My big trouble is that I can't talk French."

Benicia authorities early today after local police fired 14 shots at a stolen car in a chase that police said reached 70 miles per hour.

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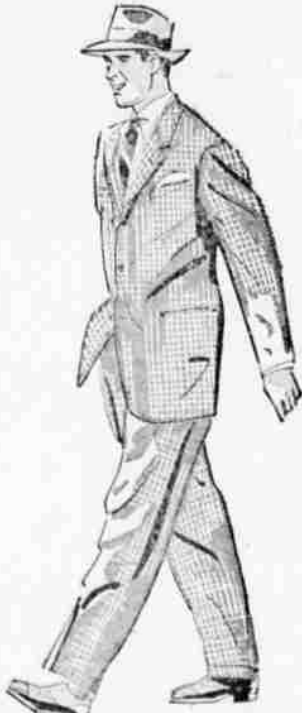
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
