RURAL RESIDENTS GET DIRECTIONS FOR WASTE PAPER

Rural residents unable to deliver waste paper to the salvage depot in Medford were urged today to bundle it and leave it by the mailbox for collection by the mail carrier. Frank DeSouza, postmaster, pointed out again today that all rural and star route carriers will pick up the waste paper, handling each day whatever their cars will carry, if it is properly bundled.

Wayne Jamison, salvage chairman, repeated the bundling instructions today, stating that newspapers are to be laid flat, as when on sale at news stands, and tied in bundles about a foot high. Magazines should be stacked in piles about 18 inches high and cardboard cartons should be flattened and bundled. All bundles should be securely fastened with stout twine or rope.

DeSouza and Jamison are hopeful that this plan will result in a considerable collection of the badly needed scrap paper, since there are about 4700 rural and star route box holders in the Medford area. Mr. Jamison states that a considerable quantity of paper has already been collected at the old Chamber of Commerce building on Main street near the railroad tracks, but he urges everyone with paper to make arrangements for its delivery to the center within a few days since it is hoped to have a carload by Sunday.

GRAPHITE STRIKE STILL IN EFFECT

Cleveland, Sept. 5.—U. P. Officials of the Cleveland Graphite Bronze company admitted today that a back-to-work movement at their two strike-bound plants had failed as less than 500 workers reported on the 7 a. m. shift. The normal day shift is about 3000 at both plants where members of the Mechanics' Educational Society of America have been on strike for six days, completely halting production of aircraft bearings.
