How About Camp White?

Washington, D. C., Sept. 5.—(Special). The War Dept. advises Camp White has been placed on caretaker basis, or inactive status, but official order provides that Camp White hospital be maintained so that hospital facilities may be ready for use at any time on 30 days notice.

The War Department further advises that the Camp will not be officially declared "surplus" until official survey of its post-war uses for training has been determined.

(Signed) Guy Cordon, U. S. Senator.

The above wire from Senator Cordon removes all doubt that Camp White is now on a caretaker basis, a moot question for several weeks as the personnel at the camp has been steadily decreased. Some reports have been to the effect the camp would be abandoned entirely and all equipment and buildings shipped out; others that in a few weeks more units would be moved in for final training or reassignment.

It appears from the above neither report is correct, either training or reassignment will be out entirely under a caretaker basis; while if the entire camp including the hospital were to be abandoned, both would be officially designated as "surplus".

THE above was in answer to a wire from the Mail Tribune in an effort to learn definitely what the present status of Camp White and the hospital are. It appears the hospital will be retained for the duration at least and may be opened up at any time if conditions render same advisable, while the final status of the rest of the camp will not be known until the results of the official survey have been announced.

THIS announcement will at least eliminate further uncertainty and speculation, as far as any return of the camp to the status quo ante is concerned. Such a return is simply out.

There will be disappointment in many quarters, but after all with the war in Europe practically over and the war in the Far East far ahead of schedule such a situation was only to be expected.

Meanwhile there is good reason to believe that the hospital unit at the camp will eventually be used for some purpose, and will not be torn down and shipped out as some reports have maintained.

Is Hitler Suing for Peace?

The report that Herr von Papen, ex-Nazi envoy to Turkey and Dr. Funk, are in Lisbon discussing terms of peace with allied representatives may not be true. But it is fairly certain that before Germany capitulates, as was the case with Italy, there will be such preliminary discussions, and the German representatives in all likelihood will be from the Funk-von Papen group.

For while these two men have apparently been loyal representatives of the Hitler government, they are not Hitler or Nazi types. They are educated men sophisticated and shrewd. Hitler would certainly not be foolhardy enough to send any of his brass-knuckle gangsters on such a mission, for he would wish to get the best terms possible. Von Papen and Dr. Funk, would talk the allied language diplomatically at least, and probably do as well as any pair available in the Third Reich.

BUT that will be nothing to boast about as far as Nazi Germany is concerned. The conditions as was true with Fascist Italy will be tough,—very, very tough.

Hitler and his gang will fare no better than Mussolini and his and in all probability the former will not have any armed pal to rescue him as the latter did.

BUT in spite of all this talk about unconditional surrender, when Nazi Germany does surrender, there WILL be conditions all right. And undoubtedly they will be determined before the papers are signed not after—how could it be otherwise? Hitler-Germany will have no more to say about them than Mussolini-Italy had, but there will be a pre-peace understanding in writing,—as a practical matter it could hardly be otherwise.

And the preliminaries will probably be decided upon in some such convenient place as Lisbon, as the Italian terms were decided upon in North Africa.

Even so we would put down this Funk-von Papen rumor, as just another one of the many phony reports, hovering around in the air, rather like vultures soaring above, with their eyes on the dying beast beneath.

Retribution

Yes, it's a cruel fate facing Germany. But only what Nazi Germany has brought on herself. In fact here, we think, is a classic example of retributive justice.

The country that deliberately decided to live by the sword, in a world of peace, now must follow the biblical injunction, and die by it.

The country that declared might to be right, now must suffer from a superior might that IS right.

The country whose government accepted the Nietzsche doctrine of anti-Christ, that broke every moral law of God and man, in its mad pursuit for power, through force, now stripped of power, forced to its knees in fear and horror, can find solace and sanctuary only in a revival of the faith it desecrated and renounced.

The defeat of Germany will go down in the books as a great military victory,—which will be true—but we believe ultimately it will be seen as a far greater moral victory.

NAZIS FEAR RUSS VENGENCE; WANT ALLIES IN FIRST

Weak In France, Strong In Poland Cited—Atrocities Arouse.

London, Sept. 6.—(UP)—The strange spectacle of Nazi forces in disorderly flight in the west while putting up a terrific fight against Russia in the east was attributed today to German fear of Russian vengeance for uncounted atrocities in the Soviet Union.

Both allied and Russian observers believed Germany would rather lose in the west to the Americans and British than in the east to Russia.

The Germans never attempted to bring up reinforcements to delay the allies in France, although they were continually replenishing their hard pressed forces through Poland where they lost as many as 1,000 tanks in some weeks.

A German army spokesman, Lt. Gen. Kurt Dittmar, in his weekly broadcast to the German people, attributed the collapse in France to the lack of reserves and the material superiority of allied forces.

Dittmar's explanation was in contrast to the fact that the Germans have been able to find resources to hold the Russians in Poland and on the borders of East Prussia.

This situation of letting one front fall while bolstering another was emphasized by one Russian observer. He said that while the Germans were collapsing at Avranches, in Normandy, leading to the Falaise encirclement in one of the most complete defeats of the wehrmacht's history, they were moving 12 full tank divisions to the Warsaw area.

Some observers believe Adolf Hitler has hopes of effecting a stalemate along the Siegfried line, but if this fails the war will be over and the Anglo-Americans can pour through Germany. They think it likely that the Germans will not quit on the Russian front until the British and Americans complete the occupation of Germany.

One Russian observer said he thought the Germans were wrong if they are basing any hope for the future on this plan.

All the world knows Germany's record in Russia. Millions of Russians have been tortured and slaughtered indiscriminately or driven to slave labor in Germany.

"Russia will not forget Lublin's charnel house, or Baby Yar's thousands of corpses or the decimation of numbers of villages, towns and even cities."

Allied observers took the same view that Germany was afraid of Russian occupation.

"No one can safely predict what steps Stalin will take," one allied source said, "except that in view of the misdeeds against his people, the Germans apparently believe he will repay them in kind."

All dairymen of the county are urged to attend the meeting, regardless of the size of their dairy operations or the present disposition of their output.

NOTED METHODIST CRUSADER, FOE OF AL SMITH, PASSES

Chicago, Sept. 6.—(UP)—Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist church, vigorous dry crusader during the prohibition era, died today at Wesley Memorial hospital.

Bishop Cannon, of Virginia, was 79. He died at 6 a. m., of a heart ailment. He had entered the hospital last Friday.

Bishop Cannon's career reached its peak in 1928, when he was believed to be primarily responsible for the shift of the Democratic votes of the "solid south" in favor of Herbert Hoover, thus bringing about the defeat of Alfred E. Smith, wet Democratic presidential candidate.

He was born Nov. 13, 1864, at Salisbury, Md. He was graduated from Randolph Macon college in 1884 and attended Princeton Theological seminary. He began his religious career in 1888 on his 24th birthday. Twenty years later he was elected bishop.

Bishop Cannon rose from comparative obscurity to national renown through wide publicity given to senatorial investigations into his activities as chairman of the Virginia anti-Smith committee. In 1928 he was called by the Steiwer committee to explain how he disposed of a \$65,300 contribution received from Edwin C. Jameson, New York capitalist. Cannon accounted for only \$17,000, but he was exonerated.

TINY HORSES ON EXHIBITION HERE

Recovered from a dark and hidden section of Colorado's Grand Canyon where they and their progenitors had lived more than 100 years, a group of tiny horses having an average height of two feet and weighing less than 100 pounds is being shown in Medford today, Thursday and Friday from 10 a. m. to 9 p. m., at the former Adrienne location on North Central avenue, just north of the United States National Bank.

Ernest W. Ritter, who is displaying the midsize animals, spent several years painting scenic views in the Grand Canyon area. He frequently heard an Indian legend about a herd of horses that was driven into the canyon in the early 1800's by warring Indians. Later, a section of cliff broke off, trapping the animals within.

Inbreeding and starvation over a number of horse generations caused the animals to diminish in size, according to Ritter, who led an exploration party into the canyon in 1940 and brought out 11 of the 50 tiny horses found. Their diet consisted of cactus, and they could not at first see the light.
