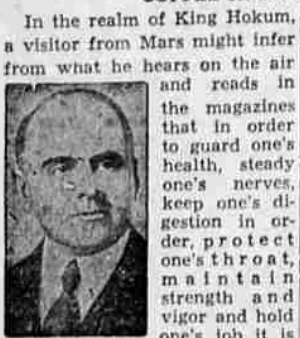

COFFEE AND HEART DISEASE

In the realm of King Hokusai, a visitor from Mars might infer from what he hears on the air and reads in the magazines that in order to guard one's health, steady one's nerves, keep one's digestion in order, protect one's throat, maintain strength and vigor and hold one's job it is imperative that one smoke the right kind of cigarettes, chew the right kind of gum and drink the right kind of beer, wine and whisky. However, if in spite of these precautions one gets that tired feeling, or accumulates a lot of poison (nobody has ever identified it, but the quacks and nostrum mongers agree it is poison) in the blood or, not to stick our necks out, let us say in the system, then one may still be saved if he only has the sagacity or the good fortune to "eliminate" the hypothetical poison or poisons—not with pills, not with salts, not with mineral oil, but with a vegetable cathartic, no matter which old favorite home medicine one prefers, for with few exceptions all the more harmful purgative concoctions of great-grandmother's day were and are all-vegetable physics.

If the man from Mars were not so glib as the American Medical Association evidently assumes most of us dumb doc and most of the laity are (see p. 48 of the June 17, '44, issue of that humorous weekly, the *Journal of the American Medical Association*), his un-American skepticism would be overwhelmed by the weight of such eminent medical authority—bought and paid for by—you may have one guess whom.

The notion that coffee is bad for the heart has been similarly nurtured. The truth is that coffee neither causes nor aggravates heart disease, when used

in the ordinary way as a beverage. A cup or two of good coffee, hot or cold, with or without sugar and milk or cream, gently stimulates the heart, the cerebrum, the muscles, the general metabolism, refreshes and relieves weariness, and this pleasant action is not followed by an appreciable depression or let-down.

Children under sixteen and some invalids should not take coffee—their advice should be guided by the advice of their physicians as to the use of coffee. Most persons are kept wakeful if they take coffee within four hours of bedtime. But it is silly to imagine coffee taken at breakfast or after dinner will disturb sleep more than four hours later.

The caffeine in coffee has a particular effect that is rather desirable in many cases of heart disease, especially coronary disease. It makes a better circulation through the arteries in the heart wall. It tends to dilate these arteries and so permit better blood supply to the heart muscle. That's all, brother. All it seems right to say here.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

What's Good for Cattle?
Here in our section of Florida it is necessary to add manganese to fertilizer to make plants thrive and combat the feed of cattle to make cows and steers grow. Would it not be a waste to add a soupcon of cobalt and manganese to our own food? Just how much is a soupcon?

Answer:—If chemical analyses have shown that the soil, fertilizer or feed in that section is poorer in these elements than the plants and cattle thrive, I should not hesitate to add a wee bit of both elements to the family's food. A soupcon is a very small quantity, a name literally just a suspicion. Some years after my graduation in homeopathic medicine I decided to try the old theory—passing through a sun-dried, I ate a young bud, with no appreciable symptoms. A week later I repeated this, still with only itching in the mouth when I took anything hot. Since then I have had only localized dermatitis on my face and when exposed to poison ivy, oak or sumac. The most satisfactory first aid remedy in my experience has been immediate gentle massage of the affected skin with ordinary gasoline. I suppose the gasoline dissolves and removes the irritant principle.

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Pegasus Group Now Visible

As soon as the twilight has sufficiently deepened, look for the Great Square of Pegasus well above the horizon and almost due east. This large geometrical figure, made up of four stars of about Big Dipper brightness, is now balancing on one corner rather than resting on a flat side.

In Greek fable Pegasus (accent first syllable) was the winged horse, flying upside down across the blue dome of night. Many marvelous feats were attributed to the famous steed. With his aid Bellerophon, his master, conquered the Sol-

omni and the Amazons. Bellerophon finally attempted to fly to heaven on his winged horse. But the gods, angered by this presumption, caused Pegasus to throw his rider and to continue alone his flight to the skies where he was given a permanent place among the stellar hosts.

Only the forward half of Pegasus is outlined among the stars. The square is the front part of his body, the rest of it being hidden by billowing clouds from which he is often pictured as emerging. Directly above the top star of the square, two lines of fainter stars, extending upward, mark the front legs. Out from the right of the southern star of the square a few faint stars trace the neck which soon merges into the head, the latter turning up and ending in a fairly bright star marking the end of the nose. Pegasus is squarely on his back.

Leaving Pegasus to fly alone across the ethereal heights, let us note the brightest stars in the September evening. Almost directly overhead, Vega is gorgeous. Somewhat east and north of Vega, Deneb shines at the head of the Northern Cross. High in the south-southeast, white Altair in the Eagle is splendid. Toward the southwest, Antares flashes red not far above the horizon. Well up in the west, orange Arcturus is still a conspicuous object. Under very favorable sky conditions, the brilliant planet Venus may be sighted near the western horizon very early in the evening.

FEDERAL AID TO LOW FARM INCOME FAMILIES URGED

Washington, Sept. 6.—(U.P.)—Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard today recommended to congress 12 legislative steps for maintaining farm income, directing production to peace-time levels, and improving health and educational standards in rural areas.

In a statement to a house subcommittee on postwar planning, Wickard suggested that aid be extended to all families with incomes below \$1,500 so that they can obtain adequate diets and clothing, and recommended extension of social security benefits to farm workers.

He asked congress to authorize government purchase of perishable commodities to carry out this objective and for use in expanding the school lunch program.

Wickard said that farm income should be supported through a "comprehensive program" of price-support measures. However, he asked that loan rates and support prices be left flexible enough so that their administrators can discourage overproduction and encourage fuller output of needed commodities.

NAVY WILL SLASH COLLEGE COURSES FOR PILOTS HALF

Washington, Sept. 6.—(U.P.)—The navy announced today it has completed plans to reduce by 50 per cent the pilot-candidate output under the navy's college training program.

The revised training schedule will affect 9000 of the 18,000 officer candidates who enrolled in the college program between Nov. 1, 1943, and July 1, 1944, for preliminary academic study preparatory to training as naval aviators.

The navy will select 9000 of its pre-aviation students on a competitive basis to undertake additional training to become naval aviators. The remaining 9000 pre-aviation students will remain in the college program for additional training to lead to commissions as deck, engineering or specialist officers in the naval reserve.

The cut was in keeping with the navy's announcement on June 24 that because of the diminishing need for naval aviators it was planning overall cutbacks in aviation training.

Washington, Sept. 6.—(U.P.)—In an unusual defense of two of his subordinates, Secretary of State Cordell Hull said today that Robert Murphy and Samuel Reber were appointed political advisers to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower after full consultation with the military authorities.

LIVESTOCK CUTS MEAN MORE FEED

Washington, Sept. 6.—(U.P.)—The agriculture department reported today that more liberal rations of feed grains will be available for the nation's livestock during the 1944-45 feeding season.

The supply of the four major feed grains—corn, oats, barley and grain sorghums—will be six per cent smaller than last year, but a relatively large liquidation of livestock will provide nine per cent more grain per animal unit, the bureau of agricultural economics said.

The bureau predicted that livestock numbers will be cut by 13 to 15 per cent by Jan. 1, with principal decreases in hogs and poultry flocks. A record wheat harvest will supplement the major feed grains.
