

JACKSON COUNTY FARM NOTES

Superphosphate
Orders for superphosphate can now be filed in the AAA office. Indications are that there will not be as much of this fertilizer available for the coming season as last, when 900 tons were applied in Jackson county in the 12 months period ending May 1, 1944. Orders have been placed for delivery and some will be delivered this fall.

Results from the use of superphosphate in this county have been very striking, especially on Ladino seed crops and on other legumes for hay.

Dairy Feed Subsidies
Dairy feed subsidy is payable now for the months of July and August combined at the rate of 45 cents per hundred for whole milk delivered and six cents per pound of butterfat delivered to creameries.

AAA Closing Date
The 1944 AAA program will be extended to December 31, instead of September 1, as has been the case the last two years. This means that many soil building practices which were not completed by September 1 can now be finished.

Oregon Crop Outlook
The Oregon crop outlook for the fall months has been received and a supply is available in this office. The leaflet gives present facts and prospective outlook for fall sown crops, dairy, poultry and livestock products. It also contains a section devoted to farm prices, costs and demand situation and outlook.

Cabbage Worms
If you have noticed a lot of holes being eaten in the cabbage leaves, the imported cabbage worm is probably to blame. A good dusting with a rotenone dust will give excellent control and will not leave a poisonous residue. If the plants are just starting to head so there is no danger of poisonous residues, a lead arsenate dust will also give good control.

STANDARD OF CALIFORNIA

The white butterflies flying about the garden are the parents of these worms so as long as they are present and laying eggs, more trouble can be expected. A good dusting now, however, should give control for the rest of the summer.

Paradichlorobenzene
Local feed and seed stores now have a supply of paradichlorobenzene on hand. As the present warm weather is ideal for getting results with these crystals, they should be applied at once if possible. On young trees under three years it is desirable to tear down the mounds over the crystals about three weeks after treating.

Lawns
The shorter days and longer nights of fall are favorable for increased lawn growth. This increased growth should be encouraged as much as possible in order to have an attractive lawn all winter. The food stored in the grass roots now will help keep the lawn green during cold cloudy weather. An application of ammonium sulfate or complete commercial fertilizer followed by a thorough watering is an excellent lawn tonic. Two pounds of ammonium sulfate or five pounds of complete fertilizer is enough for a 20 x 20 foot lawn.

Care of Home Canned Foods
The job of home canning is not completed when the food is safely sealed in jars. There are always questions which arise pertaining to the proper care and storage of home canned foods. Some questions and answers regarding this stage of food preservation follow:

Q. How can jars be tested for leaks?

A. Cool all jars right side up and then test for leaks. Test seals the day after canning, after removing the screwbands that hold on the metal or glass disks during canning. A well-sealed metal disk is slightly drawn inward at the center. You can also test it by tapping with a spoon—a ringing sound shows a good seal; a dull sound, an imperfect seal. A further test for glass jars is to lift the jar by the disk using finger tips, to see whether it has sealed firmly. To test types with rubber rings tilt and turn the jars upside down for several minutes after it is cool to see if any drops ooze out.

Q. How long will home canned food keep—several years?

A. In normal times of food plenty, home economists advise eating up canned foods within the year. But longer storage is not unsafe if foods are properly canned, sealed airtight and kept in a cool, dark storage place. Foods kept for a long time lose some food value and flavor.

Q. When opening some jars of home canned food, the metal lids were discolored. Does this effect the food, which seems quite all right?

A. This discoloration of the metal is not unusual. It is not harmful and does not appreciably affect the food.

Q. Sometimes in moving canned foods by automobile, some jars spoil. Does the car motion cause this?

A. Main problems in moving canned foods, aside from proper packing, are jolting and possibly heat. Jolting may loosen jar tops, so that spoilage bacteria can enter. Too-warm storage may give bacteria a chance to sour the food, if any of these germs are in the jars. Jars moved inside a car are likely to be less jolted and cooler than those moved in a trunk compartment.

FRANCE INSISTS SHE HAVE PLACE IN CURBING HUN

Washington, Sept. 7.—(U.P.)—The French provisional government of Gen. Charles De Gaulle will be satisfied with nothing less than full and equal representation with the big three powers on the European advisory commission or any future control organization set up for Germany, it was learned today.

A spokesman for the French group here pointed out that the war in Europe is near an end and that France, the nearest big neighbor of Germany and with one of the biggest stakes in Germany's future, is "still out in the cold" so far as the planning of armistice terms is concerned.

The French have a full and equal voice on the Italian advisory commission and Frenchmen point out that their interest in the work of the European advisory commission on Germany is of far greater importance to France.

"There are lots of rumors about the French being consulted with respect to Germany," the spokesman said, "but consultation and an equal voice with

equal responsibilities are two different things."

He said that the French delegation here has not received any reports that the Allies have offered to let the French provisional government submit to the advisory commission in writing its ideas on armistice terms and control plans for Germany. But spokesmen made it plain that the French would reject such indirect access to German affairs.

Vichy Premier, Pals, Now On Isle, Claim

Zurich, Sept. 7.—(U.P.)—Pierre Laval, Vichy premier, accompanied by a large group of associates, has arrived on the island of Mainau, on Lake Constance in the German province of Baden, according to reliable reports circulating here today.
