

BETTER GRADE OF STEAKS, HAM AND PORK COMING UP

Tomatoes and Butter Will Continue; Meat Rationing Eases.

Washington, Sept. 7.—(U.P.)—Better grades of beefsteaks and hams, along with pork loins, will join the growing list of unrationed foods by the end of the year at the latest, informed sources forecast today.

Utility grades of beef already are unrationed but points are required for the better grades—commercial, good (A) and choice (AA). The latter two are going

to the armed forces but sources in government food agencies expect steaks and roasts of the commercial grade to come off rationing by Oct. 1. Choice and good grades of lamb also are still rationed along with the two pork cuts.

While important changes in the meat ration list were foreseen for the next few months, points probably will continue to be required for some time for butter, cheese and other dairy products as well as margarine. The newly announced cut in the list of rationed processed foods, under which 17 items become point free Sept. 17, left canned tomatoes as the major vegetable still to be rationed. But there was said to be some prospect that tomatoes too will become unrationed before the end of the year.

With its rationing duties considerably lightened by the new cut, the Office of Price Administration was seeking meanwhile to devise some way to absorb the blue points to be freed by the changes.

As far as meat is concerned, the supply is expected to improve during the remainder of the year. Heavy cattle marketings will begin within a matter of weeks. Hogs will be coming to market in quantity about December.

Butter is the principal exception to the picture of plenty at the present, and other foods will be removed from rationing long before butter. Canned milk, another food not in abundant supply, may be needed for relief feeding and hence not available in unlimited quantities to civilians. Military demand for canned milk is very high.

Spokesmen pointed out that the end of hostilities in Europe "could change the food picture completely," a statement interpreted as meaning there is a possibility of immediate lifting of virtually all remaining rationed items.

SEN. PEPPER SAYS F. R. CAN GET REDS TO WAR ON JAPS

But Dewey's Election Would Delay Move, and Not Please Stalin.

Seattle, Sept. 7.—(U.P.)—Russian participation in the war against Japan depends on the outcome of November's election, Sen. Claude Pepper, D. Fla., asserted here last night on his arrival by plane from California. "Under President Roosevelt many factors promise Russian participation in the cleanup of the war against Japan, with the resultant saving of tens of thousands of American lives, billions of dollars and much time," Pepper declared.

Mr. Roosevelt, Pepper claimed, "can get Russia on our side in the war against the Japanese as soon as Germany is whipped. We could pour troops into Siberia through Alaska fast enough to guarantee Stalin against initial reverses during any time lapses between closure of the main Russian offensive and transport of veteran troops to Siberia from the eastern front."

"Stalin is a realist," Pepper added. "If Roosevelt is defeated, he will reason that there is not much use trying to deal with reactionaries."

Pepper said he believed that if Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, the republican nominee, won the November election, Stalin would delay open participation in the Pacific war and the granting of Siberian bases to American forces "until the cycle revolved again and an American government he could trust was put back in power."

Sen. Hiram Johnson, R., Cal., an opponent of lend-lease to Russia prior to American entry into the war, according to Pepper, "would be the republican secretary of state."

"Stalin has had bitter experience with reactionaries for years," Pepper said. "There were many who criticized the president for extending lend-lease to the Russians and who publicly expressed hope our aid to Russia would be so slight that Russia and Germany ultimately would knock each other out."

PLAN INSURANCE FOR PRISON MILL

Salem, Ore., Sept. 7.—(U.P.)—Commercial insurance will be continued for protection of the state flax plant at the penitentiary, the board of control decided, but awarding of the insurance was delayed, it appearing that two or more firms were anxious to handle it.

Present insurance, which expires on Sept. 26, amounts to \$250,000, with a \$12,000 premium. Coverage which fluctuates with the flax inventory is desired by the board in place of the present fixed rate.

The board had discussed writing its own insurance through the reconstruction fund, as it had in the past. Three destructive fires in 1940 preceded the use of commercial insurance.

FINED FOR FALSETTY
Seattle, Sept. 7.—(U.P.)—Former captain of a Chinese junk that ended a trans-Pacific voyage on the rocks 200 miles north of Vancouver, B. C., was fined \$750 in federal court yesterday for falsely claiming American citizenship.

Salem, Ore., Sept. 7.—(U.P.)—Robert W. McCarran, an escapee from the state penitentiary here, was back in custody today following his capture in Winnemucca, Nev.

ARMY PLANS FOR DEMOBILIZING OF TROOPS STUDIED

Washington, Sept. 7.—(U.P.)—House Military Affairs committee members turned today to a study of selective service requirements in connection with the army's plan for partial demobilization after defeat of Germany.

Major Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, selective service director, and Col. Francis V. Keesling, liaison officer between selective service and congress, were invited to a closed session of the committee. The demobilization plan announced by the War Department yesterday presumed that the army would continue inductions after the defeat of Germany although some service men would be discharged on a priority system giving credit for length of service, overseas service, combat awards and parenthood.

Hershey was reported to favor continuing to induct all eligible 18-year-olds and registrants up to 26 years of age for the Pacific war. However, unless Japan should be defeated by next May 15, when the draft law expires, it will be necessary to extend the act if inductions continue past that date. Even the most optimistic do not look for peace in the Pacific by May 15.

DEMOCRAT SOLONS BEAT IN NEVADA M'CARREN VICTOR

Reno, Nev., Sept. 7.—(U.P.)—Former U. S. Senator Berkeley L. Bunker, who lost two years ago in the democratic primary to incumbent Sen. James G. Scrugham, was back in the political spotlight today with a victory in Tuesday's democratic race for U. S. representative over Maurice J. Sullivan, incumbent.

Bunker polled nearly 12,000 votes to Sullivan's 8,300 and will meet Rex Bell, one-time movie cowboy and husband of former "It Girl" Clara Bow, in November. Bell was unopposed in the republican race.

Meanwhile, U. S. Senator Patrick A. (Pat) McCarran, D. Nev., maintained a safe and growing lead over Lt. Gov. Vail Pittman, Ely publisher, with returns recording from all but 20 of the state's 283 precincts. Returns from the missing precincts, with a registration of less than 300, could not seriously impair McCarran's 1,100-vote lead.

McCarran apparently was assured of meeting George Malone, former state engineer in the November elections.

CENSORS OPENED G. I. BALLOTS IN PRIMARY, CHARGE

Washington, Sept. 7.—(U.P.)—The war department is investigating charges that soldier ballots were opened by military censors during the Washington state primary campaign last July 11, Rep. Norman, R., Wash., announced today.

Norman informed the war and navy departments earlier this week of charges by republican party and county election officials of Grays Harbor county, Wash., that servicemen's ballots mailed for the primary bore army and navy censor stamps.

He said Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson has informed him that an immediate investigation has been ordered. He quoted Stimson as saying censorship of soldier ballots violates standing army orders. Norman said he expected a similar inquiry to be made by the navy.

SEATTLE REPORTS FEEBLE TREMORS

Seattle, Sept. 7.—(U.P.)—Short-lived earth tremors, that apparently caused no damage, alarmed a number of Seattle residents last night. Only one main shock was felt, between 11:15 and 11:20 p. m. (PWT) but some said it was strong enough to wake them up. Pictures and light fixtures rattled briefly on the walls of many homes.

NO INTEREST PAYMENTS
New York, Sept. 7.—(U.P.)—Missouri-Kansas-Texas railroad will make no payment Oct. 1 of interest on its five per cent adjustment mortgage bonds, series A, it was announced following the directors' meeting today.

NEWSPAPERS: Fold them flat (the way the paper boy sells them) and tie them in bundles about 12 inches high.



MAGAZINES AND BOOKS: Tie them in bundles about 18 inches high.



CORRUGATED AND CARDBOARD BOXES AND CARTONS: Flatten them out and tie them in bundles about 12 inches high.



WASTE-BASKET PAPER (WRAPPERS, ENVELOPES, ETC.): Flatten and pack down in a box or bundle, so that it can be carried.
