

LOUIS MARTIN, 45, SUSTAINS INJURY IN BIKE MISHAP

Louis R. Martin, 45, employee of the Southern Pacific Railroad company, was confined in Sacred Heart hospital today with a probable fractured skull he suffered when the motor bike he was riding struck the side of a car operated by Robert Barker, 20, of Phoenix, at Main and Grape streets, about 7 p. m. Wednesday.

His attending physician said that X-ray pictures hadn't yet been developed, but that from all indications he had a skull fracture. The doctor said he was conscious and resting nicely.

According to investigating city policeman, Martin was riding his motorbike north on South Grape street when it ran head-on into the automobile, traveling west on Main street. Martin was taken to the hospital in the Conger-Morris ambulance.

Police quoted several witnesses as saying that Martin failed to stop at the Main street intersection and that he was traveling at a fast rate of speed. They said witnesses reported that Barker was also traveling rapidly.

DO YOU LIKE GRAPE JELLY?

This Delicious Recipe Saves Sugar

For jelly making, Concord grapes are best. All blue grapes, however, are NOT Concord. Be sure you get Concord when you ask for them.

CONCORD GRAPE JELLY

5 Cups Concord Juice
7 Cups Sugar
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash and crush 3½ pounds fully ripe grapes. Add 1½ cups water and sugar, covered, 10 minutes. Squeeze out juice. Measure exactly 5 level cups squeezed juice (add water to fill last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin, stir well, bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 2 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, skim carefully. Pour into sterilized glasses, allowing ¼-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.

WHITE GRAPE JELLY

3½ Cups Squeezed Juice
4½ Cups Sugar
1 Cup Lemon Juice
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Use seedless Muscat or Malaga. Wash and stem about 3 pounds of grapes. Add ½-cup water and sugar, covered, 25 minutes. Squeeze out juice then, using proportions above, follow same procedure as in making Concord Grape Jelly.

Motorists asked to speed blanks

Persons who have not yet sent in their renewal applications for "A" gasoline ration are urged to do so at once in order that they may be processed before the quarterly issuance of "A" ration starts at the local war price and ration board.

L. L. Ternahan, executive secretary of the board, stated yesterday that the "A" applications were somewhat slow in coming in and since the board is anxious to have these all processed before starting work on the new truck ration, he urged applicants to hurry. Those "A" applications which do not come in before Sept. 15 may be delayed should there be a shortage of volunteer workers, since ration for trucks are considered more important than the "A" ration, the secretary stated.

BARGAIN DAYS OF MAIL TRIBUNE TO CLOSE ON MONDAY

Persons wishing to take out new subscriptions or make renewals on subscriptions to the Mail Tribune are urged to do so while the annual "bargain days" offer is in effect, taking advantage of the saving in money to themselves and also eliminating extra work through the year for the carrier, according to Circulation Manager Gerald T. Latham. The "bargain days" drive which ends Monday, offers a year's subscription to the paper, delivered by carrier for \$7.50, or when delivered by mail for \$8, representing substantial reductions from the monthly payment policy.

The average route delivered by 43 Mail Tribune carriers is 139 papers per carrier, Latham states. Persons who subscribe annually eliminate 11 monthly collections by the carrier throughout the year, thus saving themselves the trouble of being solicited each month, and also allowing carrier boys more time for school studies and activities. This is especially true, Latham says, in cases where subscribers are away from home frequently and four or five trips are necessary for the carrier to contact them and make the collection. Net earnings of each carrier are based on total collections, and all money paid into the Mail Tribune office is refunded to carriers making their earnings the same amount as when collected on a monthly basis.

Subscribers who have been taking the paper on a monthly basis and who are planning to take a year's subscription now are asked to bring their last receipt to the office when the subscription is paid to avoid confusion as to the date the present subscription expires.

Yearly subscriptions may be taken out at the Mail Tribune office or by mail, or for persons living outside Medford they may be given to the carriers, who are qualified to accept them, Latham states. Carriers delivering routes outside of Medford are Route A—Joseph Wilkinson; 4—Charles N. Hansen; F—D. O. Lindsey; F-1—Fred Miller; F-2—Billy Griffiths; Ashland—Lewis Langer; Talent—Dwight Sullivan; Phoenix—Wesley Perdus; Central Point No. 1—George Smith; No. 2—Milo Trautman; Gold Hill—Dick Ferguson; Berrydale—Philip Todd; and Jacksonville—Wayne Meisner.

KIN OF ALL WAR PRISONERS WILL MEET SATURDAY

Next of kin and other relatives of Jackson county servicemen who are prisoners of war will meet at the courthouse auditorium at 11 a. m. Saturday, Sept. 9, at the invitation of the Red Cross. Purpose of the meeting, first of its kind in the county, is to form an organization of the relatives for mutual benefit, it is stated.

An exhibit of prisoner aids, such as maps, food packages, recreation kits, will be on display. Cartons in which to send gifts to prisoners will be available and problems will be discussed.

Mrs. Harry Holmes, chairman of the home service committee of the county chapter, will preside at the meeting and Miss Anne Bergholz, nutrition specialist from the Pacific area office, will talk on nutrition needs of prisoners as met by the Red Cross.

Red Cross officials state that many Jackson county prisoners are interned in the same camps. Three are in Stalag Luft Three, three in Stalag Luft One, Germany; four are in Camp Four, Osaka, Japan, and four in Camp Seven, Island of Honshu.

It is stated that a number of organizations of prisoners families have already been formed in Pacific coast areas and that there is now a prisoner of war department of the Red Cross in the San Francisco area office.

Next week a window display is planned through the courtesy of Mann's Department store which will acquaint the general public of the location of the Jackson county men who are prisoners of war in Germany and Japan and what the Red Cross is doing to alleviate their condition.

These contests have been set previous to the fair because many girls are enrolled in both livestock and home economics and are too busy with their animals to take part in the home economics contests at the time of the fair, Earle Jossey, county club agent reports.

The home economics judging contest and several demonstration team contests will be features of the program. Other contests to be held are baking contests for cooking club members, a darning contest for girls in division II, clothing, a patching contest for girls in division III, clothing, a buttonhole contest for girls enrolled in clothing projects above division III, a canning contest for girls enrolled in canning.

Judges for these events will be Miss Winifred Gillen, home demonstration agent of Klamath county and Miss Ruth Crawford, home demonstration agent of Josephine county. The program will start at 9:00 a. m.

ROTARIANS HEAR TALK ON ALASKA

Highlights on Alaska and the Aleutians in wartime were given to members of the Medford Rotary club Tuesday by Capt. Howard Schreengost, former Medford man now stationed in Alaska. Speaking at the Hotel Medford, Capt. Schreengost described interesting customs of the natives and the type of dress used by army personnel to meet the rapid and extreme changes in northern climate.

The natives in more remote Aleutians were evacuated before the Japs invaded, the speaker said. Most of these natives have been sent back to their island homes.

Capt. Schreengost lauded the record of Alaskan aviators and pointed to air travel as the great builder of the north country after the war. The speaker was introduced by Verne Robinson.

Sgt. Dick Roberts, who has played an important role in the aerial attack on Germany and is now here on furlough, told club members of his interesting experiences as a Fortress gunner. Sgt. Roberts participated in D-day operations over the Channel and France.

NAME BUDGETEERS COMMUNITY CHEST

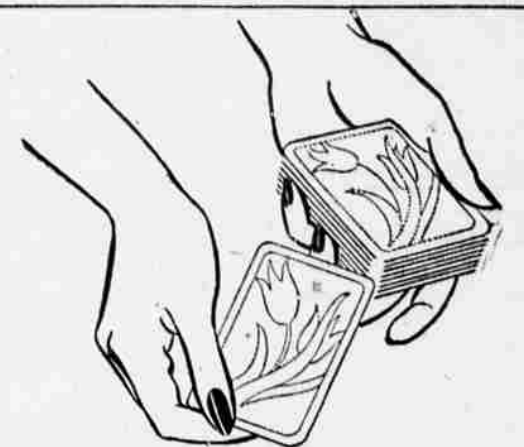

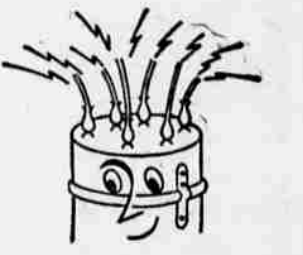

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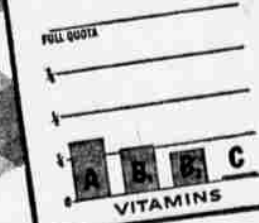
