

MONTHLY QUOTAS OF 100,000 TO BE CALLED TO ARMY

Washington, Sept. 8.—(U.P.)—Warning that the work of selective service is "far from finished" despite the encouraging war news, Director Lewis B. Hershey said today the armed forces would continue to call men up at the rate of about 100,000 a month until the end of the year, barring unforeseen contingencies.

He said in a letter to local boards that manpower requirements for the six month period up to Jan. 1, 1945, would be about 600,000—an average of 100,000 monthly—to be drawn from these categories: Ages 18-25, 345,000; 26-29, 80,000; 30-37, 55,000; youths reaching 18, about 210,000, or a total of 690,000.

"At the present time," Hershey said, "it appears that there will be sufficient men under 26 years of age to largely fill the calls for the remainder of 1944.

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GERMANS FLEEING IN TERROR FROM PATRIOTS' WRATH

On the British Front Near the German Border, Sept. 6.—(U.P.)—The greatest manhunt in human history is under way across western Europe today.

Hundreds of thousands of Germans are fleeing eastward on foot, their panzers smashed, their transport gone, and death lurking in every village and field on the long road home. They are making a forlorn bid to get back to Germany but they know now that it is almost hopeless.

An explosion of savage hatred is being witnessed now in the liberated countries which, after four years of suffering under the Nazi order, are avenging their martyrdom in blood.

The allied armies have been augmented by at least a million men in the form of maquis bands who stalk the roads of northern France and Belgium by day and night, adding to the toll of enemy lives taken by British arms.

Groups of Germans are lying in heaps in the country fields, in village streets and in the woods where they were shot down by patriot "white armies."

This is a wrathful uprising of millions of people who know only hate for the Germans. The inexorable hunt continues in the forests and country lanes, even while the townspeople in the liberated areas are welcoming the British.

This savagery is universal. Men, women and children join the hunt. Children rush out of the woods crying: "Germans are in there," and the maquis go in to hunt them down.

Philadelphia, Sept. 8.—(U.P.)—Manager Connie Mack of the Athletics, indignant at the thought that he might give up his hard bench in the dugout for an easy chair by a radio, said today that rumors he would retire were "a lot of hog-wash," but there were unmistakable signs that he is gradually turning over the job to his son Earl Mack.

The 82-year-old dean of American baseball personalities, consistently has told writers that "I'll never retire," but in recent weeks he has delegated the responsibility of running the team to Earl and Coach Dave Keefe on a number of occasions. This included a two-week stretch when he left to take an August vacation at the seashore — something unheard of for Mack.

FRISCO WORRIED OVER DRY V-DAY

San Francisco, Sept. 8.—(U.P.)—San Franciscans today anxiously awaited the outcome of a second day's meeting between officials of the army, navy and the state liquor control board on whether they will legally be able to celebrate V-day with beverages stronger than root beer.

Lt. Col. Charles Steele, army provost marshal, and Capt. E. C. Lazure, head of the local shore patrol, told the meeting yesterday they favored closing the city's 1400 taverns for 24 hours following the surrender of Germany.

Representatives of the tavern owners said their establishments could "absorb 50,000 people and take them off the street."
