Dairymen of Jackson county met in the courthouse auditorium Friday evening to discuss organization of a cooperative creamery, either alone or in conjunction with Josephine county. A working committee to pursue the matter was appointed, and consists of Frank Wilkin, Jewell Lowe and Roscoe Roberts.

A member of the Josephine county dairy cooperative committee reported on progress made there, stating that they have been incorporated and that marketing outlet contacts have been made.

Richard H. Cronshy, director of public relations of the Challenge Cream and Butter Association, gave an interesting talk on dairy cooperative associations.

ROY H. GREEN HURT WHEN AUTO SKIDS

Roy H. Green, 58, of Route 2, suffered what Community hospital attendants described as apparently superficial head lacerations and an injured back late afternoon when his automobile skidded on a freshly gravelled portion of the Old Stage road and crashed into a power pole. He was said to be resting comfortably in the hospital today.

The accident occurred near the junction of the Old Stage road and Taylor road northwest of Medford. He was taken to the hospital by a passing motorist, Leonard Scott of Route 1.

State police said marks on the road indicated the car, a 1936 Dodge coupe, skidded for about 45 yards on a curve before ramming into a power pole, bending it over and disrupting electric service in the area for a short time.

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106 SKY-LINERS TO SPEED TRAVEL WHEN WAR ENDED

New York, Sept. 12—(U.P.)—A postwar boom in plane travel was visualized today as a result of \$50,000,000 in contracts signed by Douglas Aircraft Corporation to build four-engined skyliners for three commercial airlines.

A total of 108 planes, each capable of carrying 44 or 55 passengers, were scheduled for the production line as soon as war commitments permit.

The planes will be much faster than travel liners and have a range of 3,000 miles non-stop, Douglas officials said.

Flying time for a New York to San Francisco flight is expected to be about eight and one-half hours in the new planes as compared with the present 18 hours.

Air lines ordering planes included United Airlines, 15 DC-4s and 20 DC-16s. United indicated they would order 15 DC-6s soon. Douglas officials announced. Eastern Air Lines also plan to build several new planes.

A DC-4 plane sells for approximately \$355,000 and the DC-6 for about \$565,000.

BRADLEY NOMINATED FOR PERMANENT RANK

Washington, Sept. 12—(U.P.)—President Roosevelt today nominated Lt. Gen. Omar C. Bradley, commander of the U. S. 12th army group, to be a permanent major general in recognition of his "outstanding accomplishments" in northern France.

The hard-hitting leader of American armies now starting the battle for Germany holds the temporary rank of lieutenant general but his regular or "line" rating is brigadier general.

Bishop's Daughter Who Stole Jewelry Blames Schooling

Riverhead, N. Y., Sept. 12—(U.P.)—Mrs. J. B. Taylor, 2nd, socialite daughter of a bishop and descendant of two presidents of the United States, said today she had stolen from the jewel collections of her wealthy friends because her finishing school training left her unprepared to "face the world without money."

Mrs. Taylor, held in Suffolk county jail since last Thursday on grand larceny charges resulting from the theft of \$37,000 worth of jewels from three prominent Long Island hostesses, said in an interview:

"I never would have done this if I hadn't been desperate. It was always bills, bills, bills, and more bills. I have no one to blame but myself, of course. Eventually I would have gotten enough money from my trust fund."

"But I'm just a product of a finishing school. I wanted to work, but you don't learn work at finishing schools."
