

1944 CORN CROP TO BE FAR OVER PREVIOUS YEAR

3,101,319,000 Bushels Are
Forecast — Wheat Yield
Slightly Reduced.

Washington, Sept. 12.—(U.P.)—The agriculture department today predicted that the 1944 corn crop will total 3,101,319,000 bushels compared with 3,076,159,000 last year and an estimate of 2,929,117,000 bushels made a month ago.

The crop reporting board estimates were based on conditions as of Sept. 1.

Wheat Total Lower
This year's total wheat production was placed at 1,115,402,000 bushels, compared with the estimate of 1,132,105,000 bushels a month ago and 1943's production of 836,298,000 bushels.

Winter wheat production with harvest completed remains at 766,124,000 bushels as estimated last month, compared with 529,606,000 bushels in 1943.

The board forecast a spring wheat production of 329,278,000 bushels compared with 345,981,000 estimated on Aug. 1 and 306,692,000 bushels produced in 1943.

The board said that conditions as reported Sept. 1 indicate production of all crops about four per cent above last year, nine per cent above any year prior to 1942 and 22 per cent above the 1923-32 average.

The corn yield now is estimated at 31.8 bushels an acre compared with 30 bushels predicted last month and 32.5 bushels a year ago. The overall wheat yield was placed at 18.3 bushels compared with 16.6 last month and 16.5 bushels a year ago.

V-DAY DRY DAY

San Francisco, Sept. 12.—(U.P.)—Unless celebrants stock up with liquor beforehand, San Francisco will probably be dry on V-Day. Bars and liquor stores were expected to close in compliance with requests from military authorities that sales of alcoholic beverages be suspended during a 24-hour period immediately following cessation of hostilities in Europe.

EAGLE PT. SCHOOL OPENS OCTOBER 2

The Eagle Point schools are scheduled to open Monday, October 2, the latest in the county, the school superintendent's office reported today. The late start is due to repairs and enlargement, now under way, to make room for new pupils, under consolidation with seven schools of the area authorized at a special vote last spring.

The grade schools of Medford, Central Point, Talent, Antelope, Brownsboro, Forest Creek and Oak Grove are listed to open next Monday. Thirteen schools of the county, including Ashland, started yesterday.

Dewey For Lifting FCC Censor Right Over Broadcasts

Washington, Sept. 12.—(U.P.)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, the republican nominee, said today the Federal Communications commission should have no right of radio censorship or control over broadcast content, and urged a new radio law to restrict FCC to regulation of "technical facilities."

In a copyrighted interview in "Broadcasting" magazine, Dewey said he was opposed to federal ownership, control or operation of radio stations saying "the government no more belongs in this field than in the field of the newspaper or magazine."

"I believe that the FCC should have no right of censorship, that it should not control the content of radio programs," he said. "When the FCC starts to control program content, free radio goes out the window."

The FCC, headed by Chairman James Lawrence Fly, has long been a target of republicans in congress.

Bar Resolution Takes Swing at New Deal Judges

Chicago, Sept. 12.—(U.P.)—The annual conference of the American Bar association today had under consideration a resolution charging that supreme court decisions "reflect the governmental philosophy and political purpose of the administration by which its judges were appointed and of which many of them recently were a part."

The resolution, presented last night by J. Cleo Thompson, Dallas attorney, charged that the court "has repeatedly overruled decisions, precedents and ignores landmarks of the law of long standing."

"By disregarding these principles," the resolution declared, "the supreme court has created such a state of uncertainty as to what the law is that it was rendered impossible for even the practicing lawyer to advise his clients as to what the law is today or even to offer a guess as to what it will be tomorrow."

PRESS WAITS PEACE
London, Sept. 12.—(U.P.)—Norway will re-establish a free press as soon as military censorship is lifted, Trygve Lie, Norwegian foreign minister, today assured Hugh Baillie, president of the United Press.

MEDFORD POST IS CITED BY STATE LEGION LEADERS

Medford Post No. 15 of The American Legion was recently awarded a Certificate of Distinguished Service for 1944 by State Department Commander D. M. McDade and duly attested by Department adjutant Fritz Nissen, formerly of Medford, at state department headquarters in Portland. The citation is for "faithfulness in the performance of duty, for loyal cooperation and for meritorious achievement, and for a membership surpassing the assigned quota of the state department."

The 1944 post commander was Walter J. Reinking, and the post adjutant was Fred L. Strang. New post officers for 1945 with Harry A. Young as commander and Chas. D. Wiley as adjutant, take over with their first meeting the evening of Sept. 27 at the armory. At this meeting Commander Young will announce his standing committee appointments.

Medford Post Legion records show that A. J. Anderson at the coming meeting of Medford Post is starting his 19th year as post chaplain, as he took over the duties of this office in January, 1926. In a recent edition of The Oregon Legionnaire, Horace Bromley, formerly of Medford and now a resident of Salem, states that "Andy" Anderson was re-elected chaplain of the Medford post for the 20th year or thereabouts, and while his memory fails him on the exact number, he is positive that his record exceeds even that of Franklin Delano—Believe it or not.

There will be no post meeting this Wednesday night as previously scheduled. First meeting of the fall season will be Sept. 27, when the Legion and auxiliary will have joint installation of officers, with members of Ashland and Grants Pass posts as guests.

PEPPER BRANDS GOP ISOLATIONIST

Portland, Ore., Sept. 12.—(U.P.)—Following a speech here in which he warned that lasting peace and security could come only with re-election of President Roosevelt, Sen. Claude Pepper, Democrat, Florida, Monday branded the republican party as "old guard isolationist," and urged that Oregon send to congress only men who would support the present administration.

Pepper said that if the republicans won 10 seats in the senate—the G. O. P. goal—they would control and thus dictate the terms of peace.

He asserted that the American people today faced a situation comparable to that of 1918 when elections fell just six days before the Armistice, and the public "unthinkingly" repudiated President Woodrow Wilson who had "won the war." The result was the defeat of the League of Nations, denial of a world court and a policy of isolation and unpreparedness which led to the present war.

He said that with the republican party in power, Sen. Hiram Johnson of California would become chairman of the senate

foreign relations committee, and that Johnson was one of the "willful men who opposed Wilson's plans."

HANSEN COMPILES ACTIVITY REPORT FOR CHURCH AREA

A report of the 1943-44 activities of the Presbyterian War-Time Service Commission of southwest Oregon has been compiled by the chairman, the Rev. Harry W. Hansen of Medford, and his duties for the coming year will be taken over by the Rev. George M. Shuman, pastor of the Ashland Presbyterian church. The southwest district of the commission embraces 27 of the Oregon Presbyterian churches.

This district's quota for the coming year is \$2,625. It is stated, the money to be used for spiritual work among men and women in service, in war industry communities, in foreign war emergency relief and for youth guidance in war industry areas. A total of \$1,254,000 is to be raised by all Presbyterian churches of the nation.

The War-Time Service Commission has been carrying on religious work in these four major fields since shortly after the outbreak of the war.

GOVERNMENT TO FIGHT FILM RING

Los Angeles, Sept. 12.—(U.P.)—The government will carry its anti-trust drive into Hollywood to compel producers to break their monopoly hold on film distribution, Assistant U. S. Attorney General Wendell Berge declared today.

"Producers will either have to give up their theaters or stop distributing films," he said.

Under existing conditions it is

impossible, Berge continued, for independent theaters to get pictures on equal terms with producer-owned houses.

Switching to the railroad situation, Berge said the government's recently filed suit against western railroads was an attempt to break up the "western agreement."

"There's nothing political about the suit," he said. "The government does not intend to try it before the election. But when it comes to trial, the government will win."

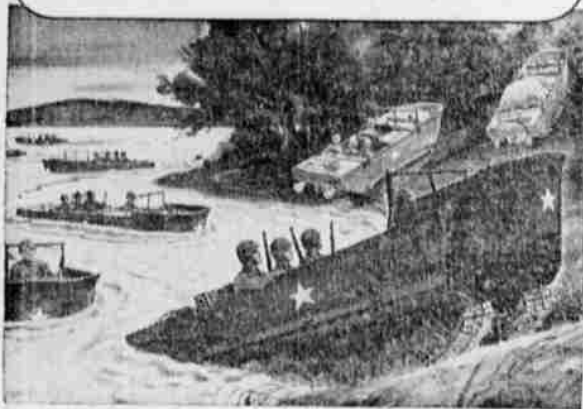
