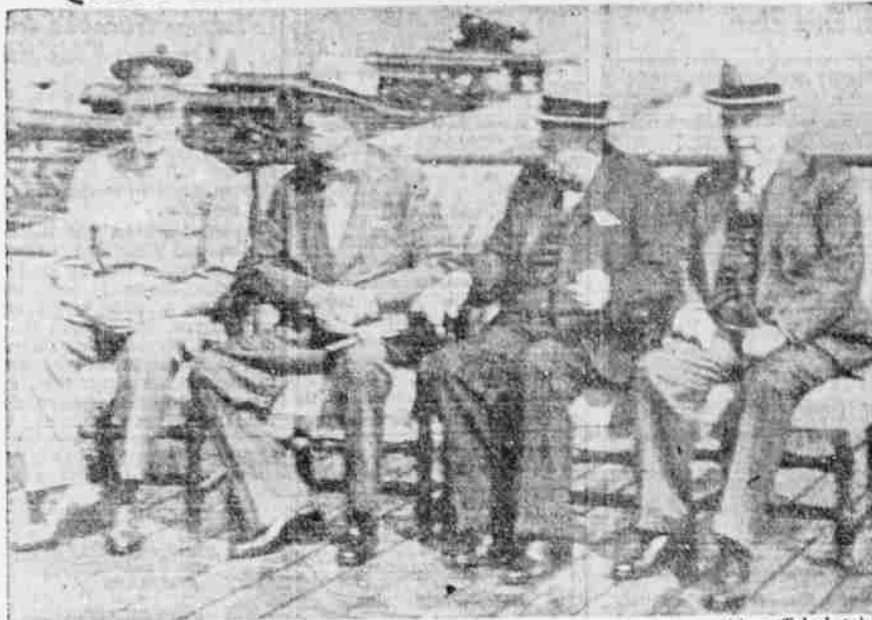

COURT COMMITS JOS. A. ELMHIRST

The county court signed an order this morning committing Joseph Arthur Elmhirst, county cattle-raiser, to the State hospital in Salem following a hearing before the court Tuesday afternoon to determine whether he was mentally diseased. County Judge J. B. Coleman said Elmhirst would probably be taken to the hospital Thursday.

Three local doctors, called by the county court to examine Elmhirst, testified that in their opinion he was a paranoiac, suffering from delusions of grandeur and persecution and was unsafe to be at large. The doctors were James C. Hayes, C. I. Drummond and A. E. Merkel, county health officer.

Other testimony was given by Sheriff Syd L. Brown, Deputy Sheriff Jerry Pearson and Mrs. Catherine G. Elmhirst, the wife, who signed the petition requesting the hearing. Also introduced as evidence was a report made by Dr. K. H. Findley of Portland, a psychiatrist, who examined Elmhirst about a week ago at the request of the defense. Dr. Findley reported that he considered the subject mentally diseased.

Counsel for Elmhirst were George M. Roberts and Hilding Bengtson.

MEDFORD FLIERS HOME FOR REST FROM WAR FRONTS

Two Medford men, Lieut. Jack Keaveny and Lieut. Robert Wilcox, returned to Medford Monday after serving overseas in Africa and Italy. They met in Naples and returned to America together. Lieut. Keaveny is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Keaveny near Jacksonville, and Lieut. Wilcox, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Wilcox, route 2.

Lieut. Keaveny, 21, who recently completed his 51st mission in Italy and is first pilot on a Liberator, has received the air medal and five oak leaf clusters. Keaveny's crew was particularly fortunate in not that one member of his crew had been lost, although a co-pilot had been injured during their missions.

He received his wings at Waco, Tex., and B-24 training at Fort Worth and later instruction in Massachusetts. He graduated from Medford high school in 1941 and entered the army air corps October of that year.

Also visiting at the Keaveny home is Miss Lucille Grayson of Waco, Tex., fiancée of the first lieutenant, who arrived here last week. They will leave September 25 for Santa Monica, Calif., and then proceed to Texas for a visit with her parents.

First Lieutenant Wilcox, bombardier, has seen action on both the African and Italian war fronts. He and other crew members were rescued some time ago when their plane was shot down over the water. He graduated from Medford high school and was sent overseas in November of 1943. He will proceed later to Santa Monica, Calif.

Other information regarding Lieut. Wilcox's training and activities was not immediately available.

FIRST GAS RELIEF TO "B" MOTORISTS

Washington, Sept. 13.—(U.P.)—Motorists with "B" ration books will be first to get ration relief when more gasoline is available for civilians, an Office of War Information report on the civilian petroleum supply disclosed today.

Trucks and buses, however, are tops on the list of civilian vehicles and will get increased gasoline rations before passenger cars.

"A" motorists won't get extra

gas until all "B" drivers have enough to permit a full amount of essential business driving.

The OWI warned, however, that there was "no expectation" of any basic change in civilian rations before the end of the war in Europe, and Deputy Petroleum Administrator Ralph K. Davies called "premature" any discussion of relaxed controls even then.

LIBERATOR CREW KILLED IN CRASH

Walla Walla, Wash., Sept. 13.—(U.P.)—The entire crew of a B-24 Liberator bomber, six officers and men, was killed last night when their plane crashed and exploded four miles south of the Walla Walla army air base, it was announced by army public relations officers.

The accident, cause of which was undetermined, occurred shortly after the B-24 took off from the field on a combat training flight.

Air base officials identified those killed as including: Bombardier, 2nd Lt. Carlos A. Edwards, El Paso, Tex.; engineer, Cpl. John P. Schneider, West Bend, Wis.; radio operator Cpl. Allan L. Wade, Santa Barbara, Calif.
