Thirty-five representatives of 13 home economics extension units held their annual officers training meeting Tuesday, according to Marian J. Farrell, home demonstration agent.

Mrs. Azalea Sager, State Home Demonstration leader, was present to train officers of local units in the proper parliamentary procedure and methods in organizing the year's program for home economics in Jackson county.

At these meetings information will be distributed on "Food for Mailing" and a discussion of suitable foods that can be shipped overseas and methods of packing them for safe shipment will be given.

Members of these units are urged to attend the first meeting so as to receive useful information in preparing Christmas gifts. Those unable to attend the meetings may get the information by calling at the extension service office in the courthouse. A new mimeograph has been developed containing candy recipes that are considered suitable for overseas shipment.

Boeing President Dies From Stroke

Johnson suffered a stroke Tuesday night in a hotel room here. He had stopped in Wichita en route from New York and Washington to Seattle to confer with officials here of the Boeing Corporation plant.

BAILEY AGREES TO ASSIST LAW

The grand jury will not be called this week to hear evidence in the first degree murder charge against Fred Bailey, 27, San Quentin prison camp escapee, in the slaying of Ira Clyde Carman, 45, mill worker, who died as the result of a beating allegedly administered by Bailey, according to District Attorney George W. Neilson and other county authorities. Bailey is held in the county jail where he was brought after his arrest September 3.

District Attorney Neilson said he would ask Circuit Judge H. K. Hanna to appoint an attorney for Bailey and have the defendant brought into court on a district attorney's information if the court will assent. This would avoid the calling of the grand jury to investigate. Bailey has indicated he is agreeable to this course.

Judge Hanna is holding court this week in Grants Pass.
