

DEWEY CHARGES STOCKPILING OF WOOL OVERDONE

Billings, Mont., Sept. 15.—(U.P.) Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, summarizing the results of conferences with western cattlemen and agricultural experts on his presidential campaign tour, said today it would appear that the federal government "has gone too far" in stockpiling for war needs.

Dewey told a press conference that western woolgrowers have informed him there is a wool stockpile in this country now adequate to nearly four years normal peacetime consumption.

It includes a government stockpile of 1,300,000,000 pounds and British holdings in this country of 600,000,000 pounds, he said, comparing it with normal peacetime consumption of 500,000,000 a year and a wartime consumption of approximately 1,000,000,000 pounds a year.

Dewey said the western woolgrowers were concerned about the disposal of the government stockpile, as well as 600,000,000 pounds of British owned wool in this country which they reported also is being sold on the American market.

"They take the position that it (the stockpile) will have to be dribbled out over a period of years, or else it will put the sheep industry out of business," Dewey said.

WAR CASUALTY

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PERSHING SUFFERS FROM BAD COLD

Washington, Sept. 15.—(U.P.)—Gen. John J. Pershing is confined to his bed at Walter Reed hospital with a cold which was aggravated, according to his friends, by over-exertion on his 84th birthday Wednesday.

The general was suffering from a cold before his birthday, but did not let it prevent him from seeing callers and well-wishers on Wednesday.

Afterward, however, his cold became worse, and friends said he was expected to be in bed for several days as a precautionary measure. They said there was nothing alarming about his condition.

Polio Declining Is Reassurance From Dr. Merkel

To quiet the fears of parents regarding the spread of poliomyelitis with the approach of school opening, Dr. A. E. Merkel, county health officer, stated today that the disease is on the decline over the entire state and that there are no cases in the county at present. The last case was reported nearly a month ago and the victim is now in Portland for treatment, with progress reported as satisfactory.

The weekly report of communicable diseases for the state shows 11 cases for the week ending Sept. 9, while 26 cases were reported for the same week last year. Dr. Merkel declared that the disease has definitely passed its peak, report showing a decline for the past four or five weeks, and that in all likelihood few cases would be reported for the remainder of the fall.

DON'T DELAY CASHING GOVERNMENT CHECKS

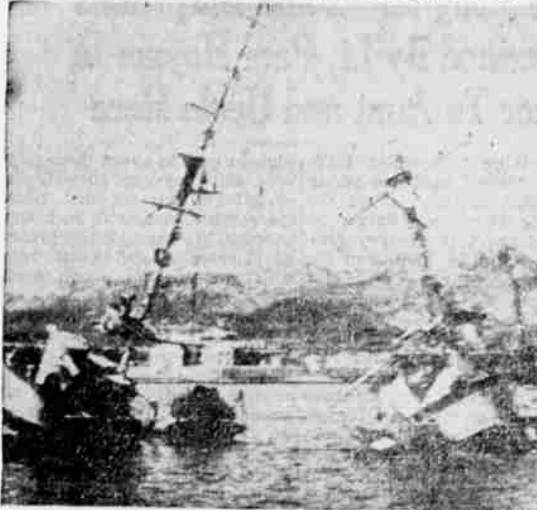
Washington, Sept. 15.—(U.P.)—The secret service today warned persons receiving government checks not to carry them around after endorsing them.

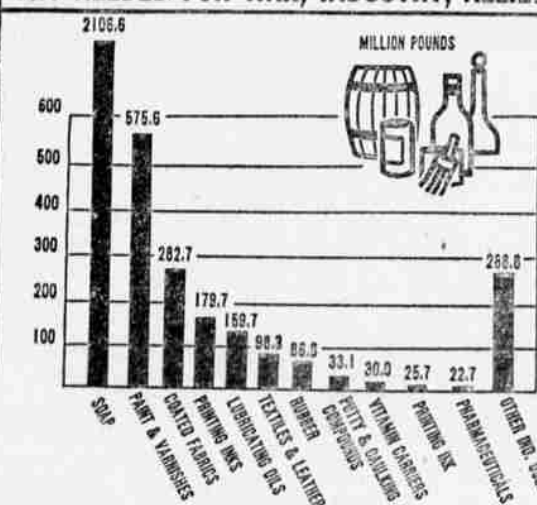

CHANGE IN WAGE POLICY FORESEEN WITH WAR'S END

Washington, Sept. 15.—(U.P.)—Chairman William H. Davis of the War Labor Board told a press conference today that "any fool can see that we are facing a probable change in wage policy" because of the approach of the end of a phase of the war.

Davis said all interested parties will be given an opportunity to say what they want to about the reports submitted to the WLB yesterday by the basic steel and American Federation of Labor panels.

He said the board hoped to reach its conclusions during the week of Oct. 9—"before election."

He said, however, that any changed wage stabilization policy might be quite different from the one demanded. "In the case of the United Steel Workers of America (CIO), he said, the union demands increased paid vacations, shift differentials, time and one-half for overtime and other issues which could be granted under the existing policy.

He contended that the little steel formula, which he said was an incorrect name for it, was not a ceiling but a floor to wages. The ceiling, he said, was the president's directive that there shall be no more general wage increases.

WARSAW POUNDED FROM AIR, GROUND IN RUSSIAN DRIVE

Moscow, Sept. 15.—(U.P.)—Red army forces bombarded the Polish capital of Warsaw from the air and ground today as Soviet troops prepared to cross the Vistula in what appeared to be the start of a big Russian drive on Germany.

While Red army bombers hit from the air, heavy artillery and mortars fired at point-blank range into Warsaw to open a path for Marshal Konstantin K. Rokossovsky's 1st White Russian army, already consolidated in suburban Praga on the east bank of the Vistula.

Rokossovsky's forces ended a seven-weeks battle for Praga yesterday. They were separated from the main section of Warsaw by only the quarter-mile wide Vistula, and his ground fire was pinning down the bulk of the German forces behind the 100-foot cliffs lining the west bank.

CLYDE L. SMITH DIES IN ARIZONA

Clyde L. Smith, 53, an employee of the city water department of Medford and a resident of Butte Falls for nearly 20 years, died early Thursday morning in Phoenix, Ariz., of a heart attack. The Smiths had moved to Phoenix less than a month ago from Jackson county, having accompanied Mr. and Mrs. William Holloway when the two families changed their residence from Medford to Phoenix. Mr. Smith had not been ill and his death came as a great shock to relatives and friends.

Funeral services for the former Medford resident will be held Monday at 2 p. m., according to information received here, the service to be at the McClelland Funeral parlors in Phoenix.

The Smiths and Holloways left Medford Aug. 20 for Arizona and had jointly purchased a tourist court there. The families had been close friends for many years.

OFFICIAL RULES
1. Packages to men and women overseas must be mailed between September 15 and October 15 and should be mailed as near October 1st as possible to insure delivery.
2. No package can be over 13 inches in length, or 36 inches in width and girth combined. No parcel can exceed 5 pounds in weight.
3. Every parcel should be labeled "Christmas Parcel" to insure delivery before Christmas.
4. Every package should be clearly addressed in ink on wrapping or carton, with name, rank, organization, A.P.O. address, and, most important, serial number.
5. Articles should be packed neatly in substantial boxes or containers, and should be covered with strong wrappings to withstand pressure of other mail, as well as long storage.
6. All parcels must be prepaid. Prevaling rate is parcel post rate from post-office from which package is mailed to postoffice in care of which mail is addressed.
