AMERICAN LEAGUE RESUMING AFTER FOUR-DAY LAYOFF

New York, Sept. 15.—(U.P.)—The American league "four-day circus" was scheduled to resume performances again today after a four-day layoff brought about by the whimsy of schedule makers and early autumn rainfall.

There was plenty of debate about which team benefited most by the stretch loafing, but most votes went to the St. Louis Browns, who were weary and stale when they ended their road campaigning for the year at Chicago by splitting a double header last Sunday.

Lack Pitchers
The Browns, who open at home against the White Sox tonight have only one pitcher, Nelson Potter, who has been able to win more than one game in the past month and such weary campaigners as Sig Jakucki, Jack Kramer, Bob Muncie and Denny Galehouse are almost sure to show some improvement after their rest.

The same condition probably exists with the Detroit Tigers, who have been forced to depend largely upon their two big winners Paul (Dizzy) Trout and Hal Newhouser. The Tigers play two at Cleveland tonight.

Manager Joe McCarthy made no secret of the fact that he was chafing over the long delay. The Yanks had a game at Philadelphia rained out twice and will play it Sunday as part of a doubleheader at Yankee stadium. The Yanks remain idle until tomorrow.

The Boston Red Sox, a fairly strong road club, have completed their campaign at home and begin their final trip at Washington tonight with the team in good shape.

Giants Tie Cubs
In a curtailed National league schedule yesterday, the Giants moved into a fourth place tie with the Cubs and the Brooklyn Dodgers squeezed into sixth place ahead of Boston by winning single games of scheduled doubleheaders before the coastal hurricane arrived.

Rookie Bill Voiselle became the first Giant pitcher to win 20 games since the 1937 season when Carl Hubbell and Cliff Melton did it, beating the Philadelphia Phillies, 12 to 1.

Augie Galan gave the Dodgers a 5 to 4 victory over the Boston Braves by singling with the bases loaded in the last of the ninth.

Ray Mueller of Cincinnati broke a 35-year National league record for catchers by handling his 134th consecutive game in the opener of a doubleheader at Chicago, which he helped win, 3 to 2, with a home run. Chicago took the second game, 4 to 2, with a homer by Roy Hughes providing three of the runs.

Gunder Hagg Slow After Long Rest
Malmoe, Sweden, Sept. 15.—(U.P.)—Swedish track enthusiasts wondered today whether Gunder Hagg, the track star, had lost the edge that made him one of the greatest distance runners in history.

Hagg, reappearing after a rest of several weeks, ran the 3,000 meters in 8:09.8 yesterday, far slower than his semi-official world record of 8:01.2 for the distance. He defeated Gustave Heino, who finished with a time of 8:10.3.

ANGELS, BEAVERS SCORE VICTORIES

The Los Angeles Angels, Pacific Coast league baseball champions, squeezed out a 2-1 win over the Seattle Rainiers last night for the third straight victory of the series as the second place Portland Beavers blanked Oakland 5-0.

San Francisco scored all their seven runs in the ninth in winning from San Diego, 7-3, and thus held their third position spot, one game behind Portland, while the Hollywood Stars out-hit the Sacramento Solons to take a 7-5 victory.

The Angels scored their winning tally in the ninth after Seattle had tied up the game at 1-1 in the eighth. Ray Prim, pitching his 22nd victory for Los Angeles, gave up four hits.

Marino Pieretti, Beaver south-paw ace, gave three hits as he won his 26th game of the season, the first of the series for Portland. The Oaks still retain a 2-1 edge.

SALKELD SIGNS PIRATE CONTRACT

San Diego, Calif., Sept. 15.—(U.P.)—Bill Salkeld, veteran catcher of the San Diego Padres Pacific Coast league baseball team, today signed to play with the Pittsburgh Pirates next year.

Salkeld, a left-handed batter who joined the Padres four years ago, will report to the Pirates for their 1945 season. Terms of the sale call for the Padres to receive one player from the National league team in addition to an unannounced sum.

Sale of Salkeld came in the wake of today's announcement that the Padres are being sold to a group of San Diego sportsmen.

MICKEY COCHRAN TO SOUTH PACIFIC DUTY

Cochran will report to San Francisco September 20, ending a three-year career as the naval center's baseball coach.

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Cardinals' Crash Dive Puts New Wrinkles In Kid's Brow

New York, Sept. 15.—(U.P.)—Even a championship baseball team is entitled to one slump a season, but Billy the Kid Southworth couldn't be blamed today for hoping that his crash-diving Cardinals will revert to normal now that the pesky Pittsburgh Pirates are out of the way for the campaign.

What worries Billy, a career man at brow furrowing, is whether the club hasn't been taken down with something a little worse than "buc" fever. His was supposed to be the super-team of the big leagues, the one that had designs on most of the National league records. Yet at the present reading, they aren't even as securely fixed in the National league lead as last year's Cardinals, who had none of the aura of supermen about them.

Lead Melts
On Sept. 15 of 1943, that edition of the Cardinals had a 16½ game margin over the second place Dodgers, while as of today the current outfit has only a 1½ game lead over the Pirates.

Although the current Cardinal percentage of .699 is better than their Sept. 15 standing of .574 in 1943, the team will have to step up its recent pace to equal last year's final standing of .680 when it turned in 104 victories.

A diagnosis of what's wrong with a team that can win only four out of its last 15 games would seem to indicate pitching weakness. That should be great news for the American league supporters of the Detroit Tigers and New York Yankees. Those teams have been sailing along lately with brilliant pitching—something usually vital in a short haul test like the World Series.

Cooper Only Help
In their last 10 games only Fork-baller Morton Cooper has been able to go the route, doing it twice. Max Lanier, generally considered the best left hander in the league, has been knocked out three straight games and has lost five games in a row, a direct reversal of his form prior to that when he won 10 straight. Rookie Ted Wilks, who won 11 straight earlier, has been kayoed twice and has lost two of his last three. Harry (the Cat) Brecheen, another brilliant lefty, has been knocked out three straight times, while the rookie corps of Fred Schmidt, El Byerly, Al Jurisich and Blix Donnelly have been of no help recently.

There have been other weak spots. The hitting has suffered a little in recent weeks, with the situation probably at its worst now with the team's "one-two punch" of Stan Musial, the leading batter, and George Kurowski, the top home run hitter, both hors d' combat. Musial was laid low in an outfield collision and Kurowsky has retired temporarily for an operation on his eye.

UMW SCORES F.R., PRAISES DEWEY

Cincinnati, O., Sept. 15.—(U.P.)—The biennial convention of the United Mine Workers of America today approved a report recommending that the union refrain from a presidential endorsement, but which strongly criticized the Roosevelt administration and praised Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, republican presidential nominee.

The report was submitted by the resolutions committee and was approved by a standing vote after delegates supporting Mr. Roosevelt argued during 40 minutes of debate that criticism of the administration by UMW President John L. Lewis and his officers was unjustified.

The report charged that the Roosevelt administration—"now known as the ex-New Deal"—actively had opposed labor generally and the UMW in particular; had refused to appoint a labor member as secretary of labor and had abolished collective bargaining in favor of the "Flat of Governmental Agencies."

Things had come to pass, but they were not wonderful. The lawn was dried up; toys lay scattered but they were faded and quite plainly had been left undisturbed by childish hands for a long time. The couple, I was told, had separated; the children had been sent to a grandmother.

But the house across the road had been given a fresh coat of paint. There was a white picket fence over which roses flung riotous sprays of bloom. A woman in a ruffy apron came to the door and shook a rug. Children's voices were a gay spatter of sound from a swing at the back; children which hadn't been sent to live with grandmother. Maybe it's slow and steady does it in home-making and marriage as it does with so many things. Maybe that's the moral, if there is one.
