ST. LOUIS BROWNS REGAIN LEAD IN TIGHT CAMPAIGN

Kramer Hurls 1-Hit Game Against Sox To Break Triple Tie.

New York, 16—(U.P.)—The St. Louis Browns regained first place in the American league tonight when Jack Kramer pitched a one-hit ball game to defeat the Chicago White Sox, 9-0.

Kramer, who won the first game of the season for the Browns and ran up a streak of five wins before being charged with a loss, pitched his best game of the tight campaign tonight and was deprived of a no-hitter when Ray Schalk singled to left in the fourth inning.

The victory broke a three way tie for the junior circuit's first place and gave the Browns a half game lead over the New York Yankees and Detroit Tigers.

New York, Sept. 16—(U.P.)—Canny Connie Mack's Philadelphia Athletics, perennial also-rans threw the furious stretch battle for the American league pennant into a three-team tie today when he sent Bobo Newsom out to defeat the New York Yankees 6 to 3 on six well distributed hits.

Against Newsom, a wise pitching man with many campaigns of experience, Manager Joe McCarthy sent Rookie Floyd Bevens, who had turned in only two victories all season. McCarthy, seeking to rest his ace for the big series with Detroit next week, saw his strategy explode in his face when the A's acquired a 5 to 1 lead and when Atley Donald came in to relieve him in the fifth, the damage was irreparable.

Mack himself gambled in starting the erratic Newsom, who had dropped five straight decisions to the Yankees this season. The big fellow was right today, however, letting no Yankee get more than a single hit. All of the Yankee runs came on homers. Tom De La Cruz of the Cincinnati Reds missed a no-hitter when Jim Russell of Pittsburgh hit a first inning triple, after which he pitched eight hitless innings to win 2 to 1. The Reds also took the nightcap 3 to 1.

Chicago rapped the slumping St. Louis Cardinals 9 to 5, with Rookies Bill Trotter, El Byerly and Fred Schmidt taking a pounding from the Cubs.

The Brooklyn Dodgers divided a double bill at Boston winning 5 to 4 in the first game in which league leading Hitter Dixie Walker made three hits in four times at bat including a home run. The Braves supported by homes by Workman and Nieman took the second game 4 to 2.

The Philadelphia Phillies beat the New York Giants 5 to 2 getting 12 hits to give Dick (Kewpie) Barrett his 11th victory without difficulty. The Giants won the second game 2 to 1 in 10 innings with Left-hander Ewald Pyle pitching an eight hitter.

Honolulu, Sept. 16—(U.P.)—Phil Rizzuto and Dom Dimaggio, two former major league baseball stars, have reports, for duty with Lt. Bill Dickey's Navy-all-star squad for the big "service world series" which gets under way here next Friday.

Rizzuto, ex-New York Yankee and Dimaggio, from the Boston Red Sox, arrived from Australia and both donned uniforms yesterday and played in an exhibition tilt. Rizzuto rapped out a long double in the game with the submarine base, while Dom thrilled the fans with his spectacular fielding.

Meanwhile, the major league, studied Seventh Air Force Flyers trotted out Johnny Beazley, formerly of the St. Louis Cardinals and star of the 1942 world series. Johnny tossed a six-hitter in a warm-up tilt as the Flyers defeated the Braves, 13-0.

Walt Judnich, formerly of the St. Louis Browns, had a perfect day at bat when he collected two home runs, two doubles and a single in five trips to the plate, driving in nine runs.

The 28-year-old veteran from Toronto, Canada, leading rider in the nation showed no regard for form, booting in a pair of long shots in the Cowdin stakes and Beldame handicap, the afternoon's historic renewals. In the 22nd running of the Cowdin, Atkinson came home first with Best Effort, \$28.00, and in the sixth running of the Beldame, he won with Donita's First, \$15.

Having been atop the winners of the last two races on yesterday's card, Atkinson made it four straight when he rode both ends of the \$58.60 Daily Double, with Silver Smoke, \$4.60, in the first race and Jean Sickle, \$18.40 in the second. He also was first with Profile, \$8.50, in the fifth and third with Susan's Trick in the eighth. In seven trips to the post, he was out of the money only once.
