Committee Plans Leaders Camapign For Girl Scouts

A campaign to recruit women for Girl Scout leaders will be made this week by the Medford Girl Scout Council under the direction of the organization committee, of which Mrs. John Larwood is chairman. It is pointed out that the Girl Scout movement is constantly expanding here and that many additional leaders must be recruited if the troops are to continue their activities this fall.

Women of the Girl Scout Council feel that the scouting program is in line with thought of a noted educator who said "What the best and wisest parent wants for his own child, that must the community want for all its children. Any other ideal is narrow and unlovely; acted upon, it destroys democracy." Translating this into Girl Scout terms, the council wishes to make the Girl Scout program available to all the girls in the community from seven to eighteen years of age, through leaders selected from among the homemakers, the teachers, the business or professional women in Jackson county.

"To begin the 1944-1945 Girl Scout year the Medford Council does have a group of splendid leaders and assistant leaders," Mrs. Larwood states. "However, many of the troops are too large and extra leaders are needed when divisions are made. A number of troops, already organized, cannot begin activities because last year's leader cannot continue. And an all too great a number of girls of Scout age are completely on the outside, looking in until suitable leaders are found."

"This appeal is made to all women who like girls; who enjoy doing things with them and learning with them the things they want to do. Women who have a few skills or abilities of their own that they are able to

share; who are interested in the welfare of their community and in working toward a peaceful world. Women who believe that a happy experience in democratic living right now in home, school and club groups by persons of all ages is the best preparation for life in a democracy."

Medford Girl Scout Council is planning a leaders training seminar, beginning in October, for all its leaders, both experienced and in experienced.

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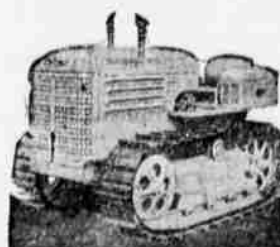
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
