

DEWEY TO MAKE DIRECT ATTACK ON FOURTH TERM

Speech at Portland Tonight Will Center On "Is There an Indispensable Man?"

Aboard Dewey Campaign Train, Sept. 19 — (U.P.) — Gov. Thomas E. Dewey makes his second campaign speech from the west coast tonight with a direct attack on President Roosevelt's fourth term bid, a followup to last night's address at Seattle when he appealed to American labor to desert the present administration.

Dewey's theme in tonight's address, which will be delivered from Portland, Ore., will be "Is There an Indispensable Man?"

Strike Blame Placed

The Republican GOP nominee told a nation-wide radio audience last night that the Roosevelt administration was responsible for wartime strikes and said it seeks to make labor a political pawn. Speaking before an overflow crowd of more than 6,000 persons in Seattle's civic auditorium, Dewey outlined a five-point

program he would inaugurate if his white house bid is successful.

- 1—An able secretary of labor from the ranks of labor;
- 2—Return to the labor department all the functions of such a department;
- 3—Abolition of "wasteful, competing bureaus filled with men quarrelling for jurisdiction;"
- 4—Establishment of a fair employment practice committee as a permanent government function;
- 5—Abolition of "privilege for one group over any other."

Strike Right Defended

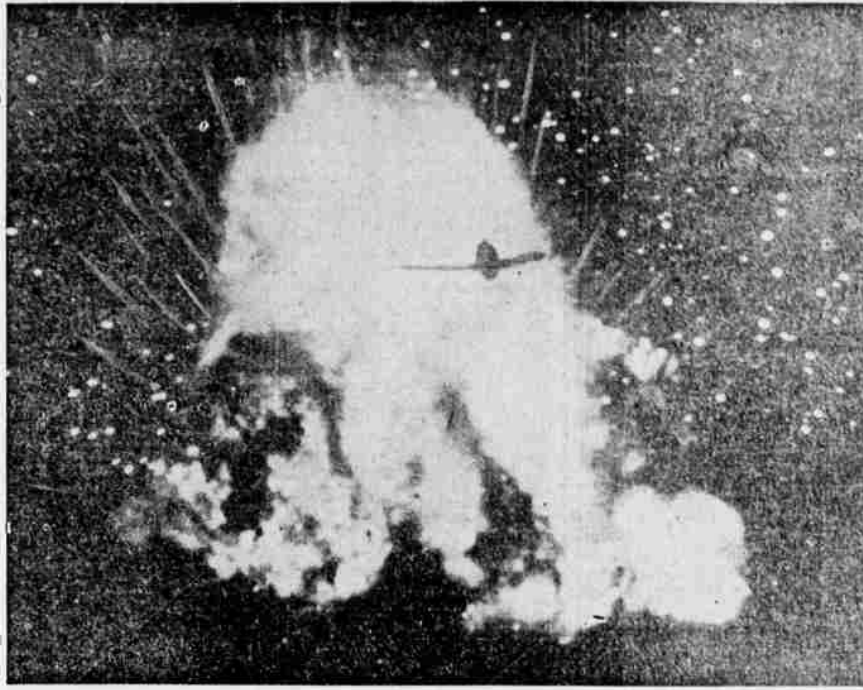
Dewey defended the right to strike as "one of the fundamental rights of free men," but he charged that it has been abused and the blame for such abuse lay directly with the Roosevelt administration.

"The new deal is exclusively responsible for most of the serious wartime strikes," he said. "The chief blame goes directly into the white house and to its agency created at the top of all this chaos of agencies—the war labor board."

"That board has supreme power over the vital matters of wages and conditions of employment. Whether by design or sheer incompetence, its practice has been to stall — weeks, months, sometimes years—before issuing decisions."

SPECIAL DELIVERY MAIL RATE BOOST SIGNED BY F. D. R.

Washington, Sept. 18. — (U.P.) — President Roosevelt has signed a bill increasing the special delivery mail rate to 13 cents, decreasing postal insurance rates, and revising present collect-on-delivery postal charges.

The changes will become effective Nov. 1. They represent a three-cent increase for special delivery mail service on letters or parcels of less than two pounds, expected to bring \$3,286,000 additional revenue which will balance current losses. The insurance decrease, from 5 to 3 cents on mail valued at \$5 or less, was expected to stimulate use of the service.

Also included in the new act is a flat 33 1/3 per cent increase on return receipts for registered mail and a sliding scale for COD charges ranging from 40 cents for values of less than \$10 to \$1.40 per \$1,000 on all classes of mail.

and more delay serves only the new deal and its political ends," he charged. "It puts the leaders of labor on the spot. It makes them come hat in hand to the white house. It makes political loyalty the test of a man getting his rights."

Great Gesture Aim

"This strategy of delay sets the stage for a great gesture—a big favor to labor before election day — a gesture carefully designed to make labor believe that something it is justly entitled to is a special gift from on high from the new deal."

Dewey said he would "refuse to believe that workers in this country will play the role of supplicants to any throne."

"I do believe," he continued, "the American people when they go into the secrecy of the voting booth will insist on government by law and not by special favor and political extortion."

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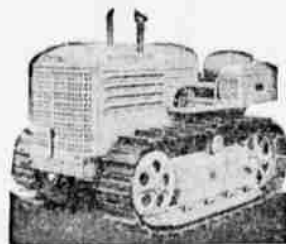
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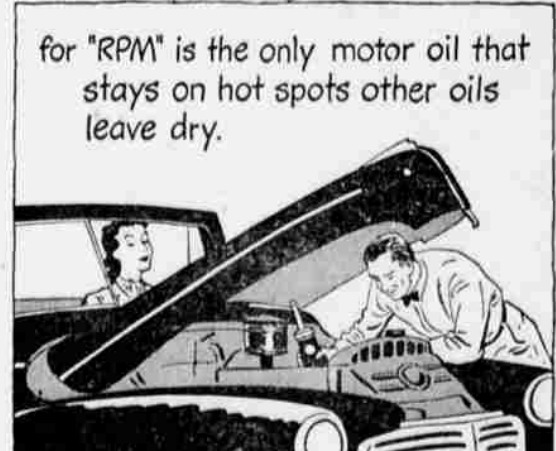

Pearl Harbor Probe Urged Immediately

Washington, Sept. 19 — (U.P.) — Rep. Forest A. Harness, R., Ind., introduced a resolution today calling for an immediate investigation of the Pearl Harbor disaster by a special five-member house committee.

The proposed committee would

be required to report its findings fixing responsibility for the losses within 30 days and would be authorized to subpoena records of the state, war, and navy departments and the White House bearing on the Pearl Harbor case and to subpoena military and navy personnel "whose current locations are not necessary to the war effort."



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
