

WALTERS DIES OF ABDOMEN WOUND FROM POLICE GUN

Raymond Earl Walters, 48, died in the Ashland Community hospital early this morning from an abdominal wound, sustained late Tuesday in a brush with two state policemen and a deputy sheriff, sent to investigate threats Walters had made to kill residents of the Dead Indian district. The officers had a warrant for Walters' arrest, signed by Mrs. Minnie C. Henry.

Walters was shot, according to county authorities, while seeking to avoid arrest. He sighted the three officers, Deputy Sheriff Vern Smith and State Policemen Charles Johnson and William Jungwirth, and raced for a tree where he had a rifle. Several shots were fired over Walters' head in an effort to stop him. Walters then raced toward a rocky formation. Another shot was fired by Deputy Smith, and Walters disappeared. Later it was revealed he had been shot through the lower abdomen, the bullet piercing a small intestine. Walters made his way to the road where he hailed D. H. Cadmus who was in an auto. He was rushed to the Ashland hospital.

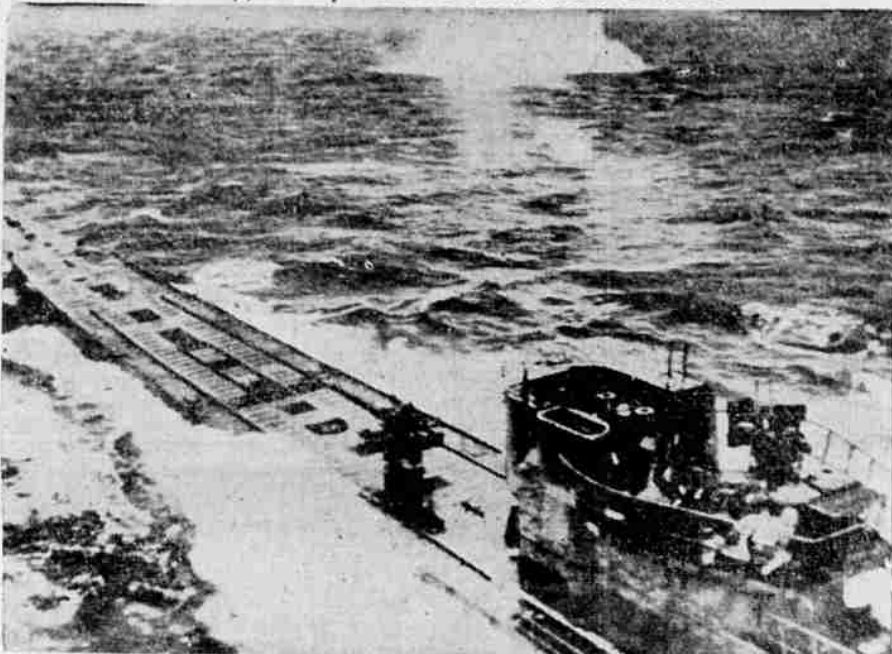
District Attorney George W. Neilson said today the grand jury would be called to hear evidence in the case as soon as Bruce Bauer, foreman, returns from Portland where he is receiving medical attention.

The district attorney also reported the rifle in Walters' possession had been stolen from a resident of the Dead Indian district, and further stated an investigation would be made of the report Walters was an escapee from a California institution.

Walters, according to a statement by Mrs. Minnie C. Henry, called at her home Tuesday morning and threatened to kill her, her two daughters, and "all cops." Other Dead Indian residents also reported threats made by Walters.

Records of the district attorney's office show that Walters was first committed to the state

hospital in 1939, and later escaped. He was discharged in May, 1940. He was again committed in 1942, and paroled in December, 1943, to a brother in California. He returned to the Dead Indian district three weeks ago, and has been living near the home of his brother, Marion Walters.

Prospect Soldier Among Commended For Aiding B-29's

Prospect, Sept. 21—Pfc. Weldon Zundel, son of Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Zundel, Sr., was one of the group that received a letter of recognition and commendation from Brig. Gen. Wolfe, head of the XX Bomber Command, in India, for the long hours of hard work endured by this group in setting up a depot. The letter stated, in part: "From the standpoint of supply and maintenance, a difficult mission, the bombing of an important installation in Japan, has just been successfully completed. The diligent work on the part of the 22nd has been a large factor in making it possible for bombardment groups to complete the mission over the target with such outstanding success." A column of honorable mention was given the 22nd air depot group, of which Pfc. Zundel is a member, in the India edition of the "Backsheesh Bugle," of July 8. The paper was precensored for overseas mailing, and stated that the above-mentioned successful mission over Japan was a Superfortress attack on the Japanese Yawata steel mills.

A few days ago Mrs. Zundel received a box of gifts from her son, including a beautiful bracelet of silver filigree butterflies, with a matching necklace, handmade by the natives, and also a handmade cashmere shawl of striking design and colors.

Young Americans Organize to Help Roosevelt Remain

New York, Sept. 21—(U.P.)—Formation of Young Americans for Roosevelt, described as a nation-wide, non-partisan movement for the re-election of President Roosevelt, was announced today by Barney Ross, marine hero of Guadalcanal and former lightweight and welterweight boxing champion.

Among founders of the group, which is working to enlist 1000 young people throughout the country, Ross named Motion Picture Star Olivia De Havilland, Radio Writer Norman Corwin, Novelist Howard Fast, Patricia Pearson star of "Junior Miss," and Leonard Bernstein, assistant conductor of the New York Philharmonic Symphony.

Fleet Operators To Sign Coupons

Operators of fleets of commercial motor vehicles that do not bear fleet designations will endorse their gasoline coupons after Oct. 1 by writing their names and addresses on the face of the coupons, under a change in endorsement requirements announced today by the district OPA.

Previously, the "T" coupons issued to a fleet of commercial vehicles that did not have a fleet designation were endorsed with the operators certificate of war necessity, OPA states. The change is made to facilitate tracing of coupons through the endorsement.

KLAMATH INDIAN WOMAN CONVICTED

Klamath Falls, Sept. 21—A manslaughter verdict was returned Wednesday against Imogene Fisher, Indian woman, tried on a charge of the second degree murder of Watkin Davis during a fight on June 24 in an auto wrecking yard near the viaduct. The jury decided that the stabbing of Davis by Imogene had been "without malice or express purpose, on a provocation apparently sufficient to make the passion irrefragable."

Testimony showed that Davis was killed in a fight that grew out of a drinking bout. Davis, it was testified, attacked Zetta Williams, an Indian woman, pulling her hair and beating her head on the ground. When the Williams woman called for help, Imogene Fisher is alleged to have assaulted Davis with a knife, after he had twice struck her.

Chicago, Sept. 21—(U.P.)—Edward N. Scheiberling, of Albany, N. Y., the new national commander of the American Legion comes to that position with a long record of leadership in Legion affairs.

His election Wednesday was an advancement from his former position of vice chairman of the National Legislative committee.

The organizer and first commander of Capital City post in Albany, Scheiberling later became commander of the New York state department and while in that position took a leading role in legislative affairs pertaining to veterans. He also served on many national committees.

A graduate of Union University's department of law, he is the senior member of the Albany law firm of Scheiberling and Schneider and is known to legionnaires as "Judge."

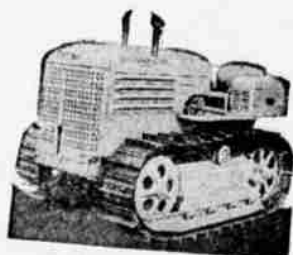

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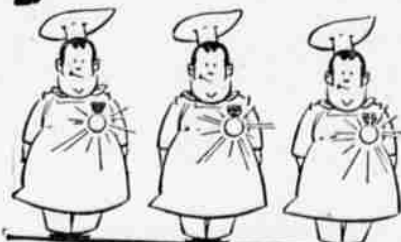
