Washington, Sept. 22—(U.P.)—President Roosevelt today urged congress to establish a new agency, similar to the Tennessee valley authority, to stimulate industry, business and agriculture in the nine states embracing the Missouri river valley.

He also asked congress to give "renewed consideration" to studies for similar developments

in the Arkansas and Columbia river basins.

The football season gets under way here tonight when Coach Al Simpson, last year's Ashland high mentor, sends his gigantic Medford Black Tornado against Weed (Calif.) high. The Tigers, who will use the colorful and deceptive "T" formation, boast a weight average of 181 pounds. The line averages 187 and the backfield 172.

Starting for the Tigers will be Jim Cave, center; Porter and Cahill, guards; Dean Sheldon and Bill Plaskett, tackles; Darrell Riggs and Howard Whillock, ends; Bob Watson, quarterback; Glen Bostwick, left half; Earl Barnhart, right half, and Marvin Doty, fullback.

It was back to school this week for Medford grade youngsters, and when Monday's opening day enrollment was counted it was found that the figures were about 18 per cent above the opening day last year. This increase mystified school officials who had anticipated that the enrollment would either be about the same or slightly less, due to the shrinkage of army population.

Opening of school and of the football season were not the only signs of fall. Two inches of snow fell Sunday at Diamond Lake and Mt. Wagner was whitened on top. Valley days are quite warm and peach and tomato harvest is drawing to a close. Rain fell in other parts of the state and forest closures were lifted, but fire conditions locally are still quite bad and precautions are still in effect.

Changing conditions have resulted in closing of the local office of the Civil Service commission and announcement that the Medford Office of Defense

Transportation would be closed Oct. 15. Many processed foods have gone off rationing with others, such as fruits and tomatoes, remaining at a high point level.

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey's campaign tour of the west has heightened political interest here and several valley Republicans went to Klamath Falls Wednesday to see the presidential candidate and hear his platform speech there. A Democratic Women's club was formed here Monday to promote President Roosevelt's campaign.

Added to the list of local servicemen receiving the Silver Star is Pvt. Walter Lewis (Duke) Miller. Pvt. Miller's Star was awarded as the result of a battle in New Guinea last July, but further details were censored from the letter which relatives received. Lt. Louis N. Iven, bombardier, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for quickly reviving the unconscious pilot and co-pilot of his plane during a bombing attack on a target near Nucourt, France. Pfc. Weldon Zundel of Prospect was one of a group that received letters of recognition and commendation from Brig. Gen. Wolfe of the XX Bomber Command in India for their work in setting up a supply depot for the command.

An interesting letter from Capt. Tom Emmens described a sight-seeing trip through the Vatican and an audience with the Pope. Capt. Emmens has been overseas about 18 months. Letters from Lt. Alvin A. Gould, prisoner of the Germans, is to the effect that he and Lt. Tommy White are both in Stalag Luft 1 on the Baltic sea near Rostock. The officer wrote that he and

his room mate were cultivating a vegetable garden and play baseball for recreation. He said they listen to the German radio and had decided it wouldn't be long before they were on their way home.

Single casualty announced this week is Pfc. Clement J. Haas, reported killed in action in France Sept. 9.

Staff Sgt. Dale Tuer has joined the Half Hundred club by flying his 50th mission over occupied territory. Tuer, tail gunner for a Liberator, has shot down three planes during flights over Vienna and the oil field at Ploesti. Richard Wright has been promoted to first lieutenant at an air base in England and F.O. Douglas Eden recently arrived in England for duty. Cpl. George C. Leunberry is now serving with a medical unit in England. Staff Sgt. Stanley S. Smith, marine corps, recently left this country for overseas duty, and Pfc. Alfred Reed is also overseas. John Casad, now in France, has been promoted to sergeant. His brother, S/Sgt. Allen K. Casad, is in Australia and Joe Casad is training at Camp Roberts.

Pfc. Fred Krugel, wounded during the allied drive towards Pisa, is now recovered and again in action. The young man also visited Rome, Vatican City and saw Pope Pius. His younger brother, Robert, recently reported for army duty. When Joe Bennett RM3c, landed in San Francisco recently after South Pacific duty, he met a former schoolmate, Frank Dixon, RT3c, training at Treasure Island.

Three men returned home this week from overseas duty. Capt. Fielding K. Weatherford, B-17 pilot, has been in the European and Mediterranean theaters for the past 26 months and Staff Sgt. Donald G. Lawrence, tail gunner on a heavy bomber, was returned home after 31 missions from an English base. The sergeant has been in the army since before Pearl Harbor and served nearly two years in Alaska prior to the European assignment. He has an Air Medal, three Oak Leaf Clusters and the Distinguished Flying Cross.

Home from Australia is Connie Latham, chief storekeeper in the navy, who had been overseas 18 months. He originally was with a Seabee unit and later transferred to the regular navy.
