## Polish Paratroops Landed in Warsaw By Allied Planes

London, Sept. 22—(U.P.)—The German DNB news agency reported today that Allied planes dropped Polish paratroops in Warsaw.

"On the fifth anniversary of the unconditional surrender of Warsaw, a large formation of Anglo-American bombers carried out a demonstrative raid for the purpose of encouraging remnants of the underground movement in its desperate struggle," DNB said.

"They dropped a number of Polish shock troop leaders who were shot down in the air. The dropping of Polish paratroops took place at Midday."

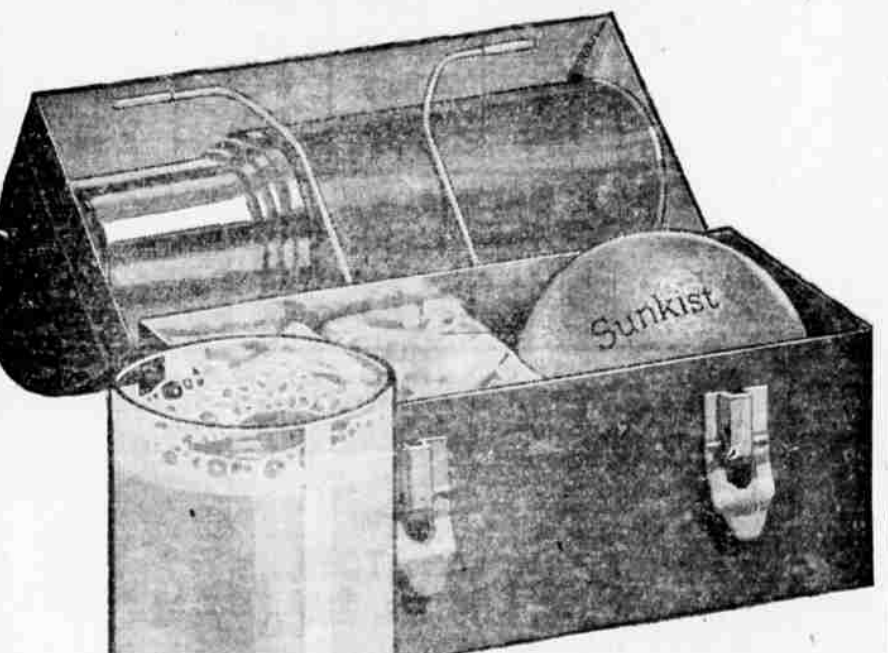
