Sheet Metal Class Will Be Offered To High School Pupils

A new class in sheet metal will be offered high school students this year and will be taught by Sott E. Brill. Representing a wider and more practical use of sheet metal in home and business world, E. H. Hedrick, city school superintendent, stated that the course also involves acetylene welding, soldering and other skills allied to the sheet metal trade. It carries full high school credit and is open to all students.

In addition to this a course in general sheet metal for war production purposes will be offered both adults and students who are interested. Time of this class has not been arranged but will be either a day or evening class depending upon the convenience of those it serves. This course will be the same as has been offered for several semesters in the past.

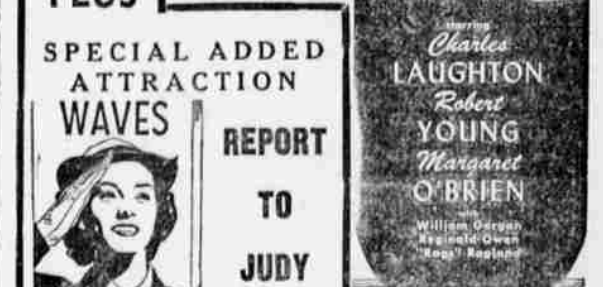

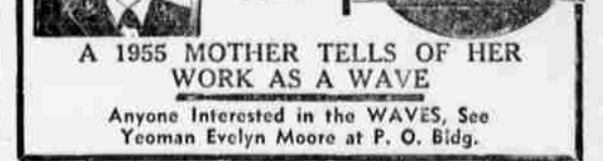
