

STUDENTS URGED TO STAY ON JOB FOR WEEK LONGER

Critical Labor Shortage Causes Request — Supt. Hedrick Agrees.

Senior high school students now working in the fruit were urged yesterday by school officials and fruit men not to quit work to enter high school, opening tomorrow, but to continue at least a week or two longer. E. H. Hedrick, superintendent, stated that calls from orchardists and warehousemen, from R. H. Cate of the farm labor supply office and W. J. Looker, secretary of the Traffic association, had convinced him that students were needed because of the critical labor shortage.

Opening of high schools was delayed one week at the request of the fruit industry, leaders being of the opinion then that by the 25th of September the harvest would be far enough advanced that students could be released. It is now stated that due to unforeseen circumstances, to lose the approximately 70 senior high school students now working would be a disaster.

Mr. Hedrick stated that every effort would be made by teachers and school officials to aid the students with their studies later if they delayed enrollment. He pointed out that from the standpoint of the student, it was easier to make up work at the beginning of the year and also to earn needed money at the high wages paid by the fruit industry. Some students have been in the habit of leaving school for some two weeks in the middle of the year to earn money, he said, and added that it would

be more advantageous if they stayed out two weeks at the opening of the year.

Students having left their jobs already were advised to report again for work.

CATALINAS RAKE ENEMY SHIPPING NEAR MINDANAO

Allied Headquarters, Southwest Pacific, Sunday, Sept. 24—(U.P.)—A navy Catalina bomber off southern Mindanao in the Philippines sank two Japanese merchant vessels of 2000 and 500 tons in attacks Wednesday night, Gen Douglas MacArthur announced today.

Other long-range navy bombers struck at shipping off Borneo the same night, hitting at enemy sea routes which are being pulled farther westward with the steady extension of Allied air control. A 1000-ton freighter was destroyed in the raid.

MacArthur's communique said that Allied ground and naval forces have killed an additional 835 Japanese in mopping up back areas in New Guinea, with 201 prisoners taken. In addition, 101 friendly nationals were freed.

Light naval units, presumably P.T. boats, continued to operate around Morotai island and sank five supply-laden barges north of the Morotai strait separating the Allied-held island from Halmahera. A single enemy plane raided U. S. positions during the night and dropped bombs without effect.
