TIGERS BOUNCE
WEED 42-6, IN
SEASON OPENER

Marvin Doty Scores Three Touchdowns to Lead Attack; 2,500 See Clash.

Fullback Marvin Doty raced 49 yards to a touchdown on the first scrimmage play of the game here Friday night to start Medford high's T-formation Black Tornado off to a 42 to 6 conquest of Weed in the season opener before some 2500 spectators.

And, before the struggle was over, Doty had tallied two more touchdowns on typical "T" formation "breakaway" plays. Quarterback Bob Watson had scored twice himself and forward passed to Right End Howard Whillcock for another, and almost the entire Tiger forward wall had surged through to another Weed back behind the goal line for a safety and two points.

The big Tornado, operating under the first-year coaching of Al Simpson, manufactured two touchdowns in the first period, a touchdown and a safety in the second, another touchdown in the third and two more scores in the final quarter when the lineup was liberally sprinkled with second stringers.

Scores on Pass
Only score for the Cougars came late in the second quarter when Wilson, nimble-footed right halfback, tossed a five-yard aerial to Quarterback Catuzzo in the end zone. The Weed touchdown was set up by the longest run of the game—a 68-yard gallop by Murtha on an end-around. A pass was incomplete for the

extra point, and the half ended, 23 to 6 for Medford.

The Tornado wasted no time in striking Darrell Riggs returned Weed's opening kickoff to the Weed 49, and on the very first play Doty took an underhanded flip from Watson, went off his own right tackle, cut back toward the center of the field and with great downfield blocking went the distance. Watson place-kicked the extra point the first of four he successfully made during the evening.

Before the period was over Doty surged across for another score, this time on a 13-yard run on the same play, after Earl Barnhart, right half, had cracked right guard for eight yards and Doty had made nine at the same spot. Watson again converted.

The safety came midway through the second heat. The Tornado marched from its own 26 to the Weed four, where the drive was finally stopped. Wilson, attempting to run it out, was nabbed behind the goal line for the two points and a 16 to 0 Medford lead.

Watson Tallies
Watson carried the ball on the next Medford touchdown, later in the same quarter. Glen Bostwick made nine around left end. Watson took it 16 more around right end and Doty plunged 11 to the Weed three. A moment later Watson scored on a quarterback sneak and converted for a 23 to 0 Tornado bulge.

It was Doty again scoring Medford's fourth touchdown in the third chapter. Riggs recovered a Weed fumble on the Weed 36, and on his favorite play Doty galloped those 36 yards to paydirt. However, the touchdown was nullified by a 15-yard holding penalty.

Four minutes later, though, on the same play and from the identical spot on the field, Doty went off right tackle on fourth down, cut back and sped the 36 yards to the goal line. Watson's place-kick was wide.

With most of the second-stringers in the contest, the Tigers registered two more touchdowns in the final period. The first came on a 24-yard forward pass from Watson to lanky Whillcock, sophomore end.

Watson, shifted to fullback when Lindley came into the game at quarter, put on virtually a one-man show to get the final touchdown. He tore off runs of 25, 20 and 11 yards to cross the last stripe. His conversion attempt after Whillcock's score was low, but his second was good.

Big Margin
The Tornado had an overwhelming superiority statistically. It made 354 yards on the ground to Weed's 102, with Doty accounting for 183 yards, an average of 12.2 per carry. Watson made 73 yards for a 14.6 average.

Watson passed eight times and completed only two, while Weed tried 16 and completed four. Medford drew nine offside and one holding penalty for a 60-yard loss.

Although the Tigers looked unpolished in spots, they showed definite signs of developing into a fine ball club. Because of the one-sidedness of the clash many of the Tornado's "T" plays were not used.

Next Friday night, Medford will play the Marshfield high Pirates at the stadium.

DETROIT EXTENDS
LEAD BY TROUT'S
WIN OVER BOSOX

Yankees Still Have Chance; Cards, Pirates, and Reds Take Games.

New York, Sept. 23—(U.P.)—The Detroit Tigers, continuing their victory march through the American league, eliminated one contender and increased their lead over the second-place St. Louis Browns to a game and a half today when they trounced the Boston Red Sox, 8-2.

Winning their eighth game in their last nine starts, the Tigers backed Dizzy Trout's 26th victory with an 11-hit offensive against three Boston hurlers and settled the issue early when they got to Rookie Rex Cecil for four first-inning runs.

Trout scattered six hits over the route and in winning tied with his teammate, Hal Newhouser, as the leading winning pitchers in the major leagues this season. Their combined victory count is 52.

The loss dropped the Red Sox nine games behind the Tigers and with only eight games remaining on the Boston schedule, mathematically eliminated them from the red hot junior circuit race.

Pinky Higgins' three successive singles led the Detroit attack and drove in two runs. Higgins also scored twice himself. Dick Wakefield got two hits in three appearances and scored twice and two singles from the bat of Joe Hoover drove in three runs.

The New York Yankees clinging tenaciously to their slim chance for the world series, defeated the Cleveland Indians 7-2 to stay within three and a half games of the leaders in third place.

In the National league the champion Cardinals came from behind with three run rallies in

the sixth and seventh innings to defeat the Philadelphia Phillies 6-2.

The Pittsburgh Pirates extended the losing streak of the New York Giants to nine games but were extended considerably themselves to turn the trick, winning 6-4 in the 13th inning.

The Boston Braves defeated the Cincinnati Reds, 4-0, behind the six-hit pitching of their 19-game loser, Al Javery.
