

CHINA WARLORDS HANDICAP EFFORT AGAINST JAPANESE

Soldiers Good Fighters Although Underpaid, Underfed, Ill-Equipped, Trained

Washington, Sept. 23—(U.P.)—The United States and China are about to embark upon a belated but major effort to harness Chinese military and industrial power for the final blow against Japan, it was learned today.

American officials hope that despite the recent crumbling of Chinese resistance inside China, the cooperative American-Chinese project will not be too late. Reports of the loss of Allied forward air bases in China hint that the aerial protection the navy might have counted on for the landing of amphibious forces on the China coast has been temporarily lost.

Details Ungiven
Details of the American-Chinese industrial and military plans are not known here and probably will not be until Chairman Donald M. Nelson of the War Production Board returns here and reports to President Roosevelt. The President and Prime Minister Winston Churchill considered Nelson's directive in Quebec last week in planning the end of Japan.

Officials have been outspoken in their criticism of the Chinese military setup and have placed most of the blame for military reverses on the inexperience and incompetency of the Chinese military commanders.

They point out, however, that the Chinese soldier fights admirably considering his condition. He is underpaid, underfed, ill-equipped and poorly trained. His war lord commander in many cases is more interested in keeping his unit intact than in fighting the enemy if the cost is his own troops. There is no overall coordinated strategy among the various commanders and the central Chinese government under Chiang has only tenuous control over the various Chinese armies.

Stilwell Successful
One of the possibilities Hurley is believed to be working on is the expansion of the system used in south China where Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell has had relatively great success. But, it is pointed out, his troops have had the best American training, are better equipped than most other Chinese troops, are fed, equipped and commanded by American officers, and fight under the direction of a unified command.

If the war in Europe ends soon, it is possible that the United States would be able to spare more American officers to help train and coordinate Chinese military effort in other regions of China.
For some time, the general feeling has been that the major part of China's difficulties was the lack of supplies. But it is also believed that with better coordination of what is available with her own economic, military and industrial resources, China could offer more resistance to the Japanese who now are penetrating dangerously into vital areas of southern China.

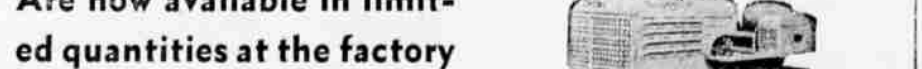
