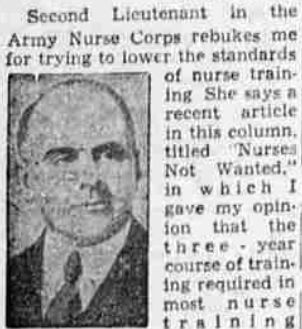

NURSES ARE NEEDED



Second Lieutenant in the Army Nurse Corps rebukes me for trying to lower the standards of nurse training. She says a recent article in this column, titled "Nurses Not Wanted," in which I gave my opinion that the three-year course of training required in most nurse training schools today is pretty soft for the hospitals—they get for nothing a whole year of service by the nurse who has had a two-year course of training. That's just my opinion. I mean to say if I were ill or under a major operation I'd want nothing better than the nursing of a two-year trained nurse—whether she might know any more about algebra than I do or not.

Without knowledge of the subjects which are essential in a pre-medical course, the lieutenant informs me, that is chemistry, biology, algebra, the sciences, etc. no nurse should have the right to the degree R. N.

Well that may be true. I wouldn't know.

The lieutenant—and I honor her and all of her associates serving the sick and wounded in all the services, some of them at the cost of their lives—adds "that pretty remark about penmanship—doesn't that apply to the best of doctors?" I made no remark about penmanship. I said a good many of the letters I receive from young women who are now studying nursing or who are graduate or registered nurses are not without faults in form, punctuation spelling. I still say that in my opinion a girl who has had only two years of high school and can write an ordinary letter without such faults is better qualified to study nursing than is a girl who has graduated from high school or perhaps has had a year or two

of college if she can't write an ordinary letter without faults of form, punctuation or spelling. From the tenor of the lieutenant's letter—which, by the way, is impeccable—I gather that she thinks a nurse who deserves the professional status conferred by the degree R. N. (Registered Nurse) must have something more than just neatness, the ability to catch on quickly and to give the patient good bedside care. Just what more any one can desire in a nurse I confess I can't comprehend—unless I should want to marry her. In that case she'd have to be a good looking, a good armful, and have in her the makings of a good mother.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Daughter, 44. Wonderful character, but liquor has gotten the best of her, which makes her husband and myself most unhappy. She will not listen to us—has a complex that we are trying to boss her. Answer:—Since she thinks she keeps her drinking secret, it may be difficult to persuade her to seek help or treatment of any kind. Best course I can suggest is that she get in touch with a local group of Alcoholics Anonymous—no doubt some of the members have gone through what she is going through and will therefore understand her problem—and perhaps she will understand they only want to help her whip it.

Paint to Conceal Skin Spots.
A year ago you told how to make a kind of paint to conceal white patches in the skin.

Answer:—It calls for glycerin, which is now sold only on prescription. If you have a little glycerin on hand, you can make up the paint—it is used to conceal any kind of spot which is on a level with surrounding skin. Instructions in booklet "Cosmetic Blenders"—copy send ten cents and stamped envelope bearing your address. Do not include a clipping—ask for what you want.

What Sherman Said.
Notice you included butter milk and skim milk with whole milk, chicken egg yolk, etc., as foods supplying vitamin A. Sherman, when you yourself offer it as an authority on nutrition, says butter milk and skim milk contain no vitamin A. (P. R. S.)

Answer:—Chemistry of Food and Nutrition, 5th edition, 1937, says (p. 666) that both dried skim milk and cream contain vitamin A. A real butter milk (the kind made by churning) contains some vitamin A, and of course it is not my intention to glass, skim milk or butter milk with whole milk cream or butter or cheese or egg yolk as sources of vitamin A. Of course they are comparatively poor sources of vitamin A.

COMMITTEE HEARS HART REPORT ON LAND RECLAIMING

F. H. Hart, engineer for the federal bureau of reclamation with headquarters at Grants Pass, met with the Jackson county water committee in the Hotel Holland Friday afternoon to describe the investigation the bureau has carried on into the possibilities of reclaiming irrigable land in the Rogue River basin not now under irrigation.

Thirty-two business men, agriculturists, sportsmen, city and county officials attended the meeting, presided over by H. B. Murphy, chairman of the committee which was set up on the recommendation of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

Hart made it clear to the gathering that the bureau of reclamation "is not proposing anything" but is merely making a detailed report of all resources in the basin in order to furnish a master plan to develop fully the natural resources of the basin.

Any proposal for dams or other irrigation facilities must come from the land-owners themselves, Hart explained. "It will be up to the people in the area to say what will be built and where," he stated. "Any construction that will take place will come as a result of a movement by your group or some other organization."

Hart said that the bureau's report, which will be made public sometime next spring, would show that there are some 64,000 acres of land in the basin now being irrigated.

He said that in the Medford area, 13,160 acres were now being irrigated and that 23,600 more acres were irrigable and could be served by the present system if the water were made available.

In the Talent area 10,390 acres are irrigated, with 4,700 other acres irrigable, and in the Sams Valley area no acres are irrigated and 4,000 could be, he stated.

Hart stated that the Eagle Point district's 5,000 irrigated acres and the Gold Hill area's 1,000 irrigated acres were all that are suited for irrigation.

In the Applegate valley, he

said, 8,900 acres could be irrigated through a consolidation and extension of the existing ditches if the water were made available. There are 8,700 acres now under irrigation in this area, he explained.

Hart told of the numerous dam sites the bureau has investigated and gave a comprehensive picture of what the bureau has done to prepare a report covering the basin.

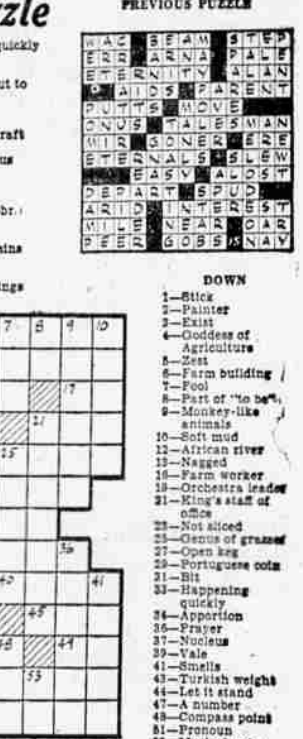


Crossword Puzzle
