Wall Street

New York, Sept. 25—(UP)—
Skyrocketing prices for farm commodities in the biggest bull movement in more than five years overshadowed a firm and moderately active stock market today.

Cotton scored an extreme gain of \$5 a bale in New York, while in domestic grain pits in Chicago, Kansas City, Minneapolis and Duluth, grains ran up the full 5-cent limit allowed in one day's trading. Wheat, corn, oats, rye and barley all joined the advance. The sharp gains and active trading in these staples overshadowed anything seen in commodities since start of World War II in September, 1939.

Demand for cotton and grains was sparked by over-night announcement of plans for acquisition by the war food administration of the 1944 wheat and cotton crops at full parity.

FINNISH TROOPS PUSH NORTHWARD TO EXPEL NAZIS

Stockholm, Sept. 22—(UP)—
Finnish troops were reported today to have taken Suomussalmi on the Russian frontier in a drive northward to expel or disarm German forces in northern Finland and comply with terms of the armistice with the Soviet Union.

An official announcement in Helsinki said the Finns had continued their advance toward northern Finland and there were no reports of any clashes with German troops.

The advance was being slowed by German destruction of bridges and roads, the Helsinki statement said. Other reports reaching here asserted the Nazis were burning villages and farm houses and seizing Finnish officials.

Finnish civilians in German occupied areas were reported embittered over the Germans for the confiscation of foodstuffs, locomotives and rolling stock.

(A BBC broadcast said the sheriff and other local officers in the Kuusamo district, were seized and taken to Rovaniemi, capital of Finnish Lapland, above the northern end of the Gulf of Bothnia.)

Finnish reports estimated that about 100,000 civilians had been evacuated from northern Finland, of which 17,000 entered Sweden with hundreds of others following.
