

JACKSON COUNTY WAR CHEST DRIVE TO START OCT. 9

J. E. Earley Is Chairman of Campaign in Rural Areas; Mrs. Olive Floyd Assistant

Pre-campaign work towards the annual Jackson County War Chest drive is well under way, according to J. E. Earley, chairman, in charge of the drive this year in areas outside of the city of Medford. The county drive will start Oct. 9, to coincide with the campaign in other parts of the nation, and Mr. Earley states that the county's quota is \$28,500.

Mr. Earley's chief assistant is Mrs. Olive Floyd, who last year was chairman of the successful drive among Granges of the county. While the many Grange members are expected to carry the greatest share of the campaign load, other organizations and individuals will cooperate, it is said.

Not for Medford

Mr. Earley stressed the fact that contributions to the War Chest fund collected outside of Medford will not be used in any way in the Medford Community Chest. He further said that quite the reverse is true, since a great portion of the money collected in Medford during the chest drive will go to the war fund as one of the agencies included.

Th various community drives will be handled by individuals of each section, according to Mr. Earley. He states that Boy Scouts will take an active part in the distribution of literature which will explain the needs of the campaign, and urged persons receiving the literature to read it carefully.

"Read the literature you receive and when the solicitor calls know what you can give and be ready to contribute as much as possible to this cause," the chairman requested.

Agencies participating in the National War Fund drive are the USO War Prisoners Aid, United Seamen's Service, American Field Service, American Relief for Denmark, Czechoslovakia, France, Italy, Norway, Belgium, Britain, Luxembourg, Greece, the Philippines, Poland, Russia, China, Lithuania, Yugoslavia, the Queen Wilhelmina fund, Refugee Relief Trustees and the United States Committee for Care of European Children. State agencies participating are Boys' and Girls' Aid society, Catholic Charities' Children's Bureau, Children's Farm Home, Oregon Protective society, Salvation Army's White Shield and Wemme Homes, Volunteers of America's Mothers' and Children's Home, Waverley Baby Home, Oregon Mental Hygiene society.

COUPONS INVALID AUTOISTS WARNED UNLESS ENDORSED

Stressing that gasoline ration coupons are invalid unless properly endorsed, motorists holding the new "A13" coupons were urged today to endorse them on the face of each coupon with the car license number and state of registration as soon as they are received.

"The coupons are invalid unless properly endorsed," states Frederic F. Janney district OPA regulations executive. "The endorsement makes it possible to trace an illegal coupon to the person who put it into circulation, and it takes less than five minutes for the whole book."

Alterations or duplicate endorsements also invalidate the coupons and it is stressed that car owners should use the license plate number of the car and not the 1944 sticker number.

The six "A-13" coupons will be valid for three months through Dec. 31 and each coupon is worth four gallons, providing the same driving allowance as the old ration which consisted of eight 3-gallon coupons for a three-months period.

OTTO KLUM RITES HELD IN ASHLAND

FRANKLYN FANGER ON 50 MISSIONS OVER NAZI LAND

15th AAF in Italy—Franklyn H. Fanger, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Fanger, of box 57, Jacksonville Highway, Medford, Ore., was promoted to the grade of technical-sergeant in the USAAF. He is a radio-operator-runner with a 15th AAF B-24 Liberator bomber group operating from an advanced air base in Italy. His group has played a vital role in the violent assaults on enemy industrial and communications targets in northern Italy, southern Germany, France, and the Balkans.

Sgt. Fanger flew on the missions that knocked out the German gun emplacements and shore installations prefacing the allied invasion of southern France. He said of the invasion, "I never saw so many planes in the sky at one time. We had everything from Piper Cubs to Liberator bombers. Airborne troops were parachuting by the thousands. The naval guns sent up a barrage that blackened the sky."

Fanger is credited with 50 separate missions into enemy territory and holds the air medal with five oak leaf clusters "for meritorious achievement while participating in sustained operational activities against the enemy."

Sgt. Fanger is a graduate of the Medford high school and was an engineering student at the Oregon State college at the time of his enlistment. Entering the service in February of 1942 he was sent to the radio school at Sioux Falls, S. Dak. On graduation he went to the gunnery school at Laredo, Texas. After further schooling at Boise, Idaho, Fanger flew to his present station.

A brother, Carleton G. Fanger, is a S 1/c stationed at the Great Lakes naval training and serving as an instructor. A third brother, Archie F. Fanger, was killed on the Anzio beachhead May 27 during the Italian invasion.

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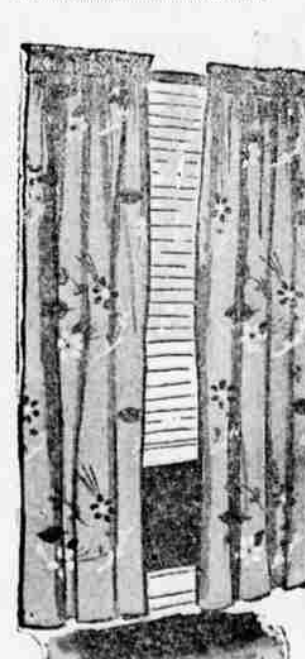
