

EYES HAVE IT IN LOVE MAKING, IS WORD OF ARTIST

Men Don't Know It But Gazing Into Feminine Peepers Does Something to Them

Chicago, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—The eyes may not be the first thing a man notices about a woman, but they are the most important feature of love-making, Miss Louise Morris, one of the nation's foremost eyebrow artists, declared today.

"A woman's eyes are her most important romantic asset," Miss Morris, a Kansas City, Mo. beautician, said. "Men don't know it, but it is while looking into a woman's eyes that they get the urge to propose. The eyes are the most important feature of love-making."

Miss Morris's words were spoken before the silver anniversary convention of the American Cosmeticians' National association, but they were intended primarily for the millions of maidens tired of single blessedness.

Military Brow Latest
The very latest thing in eyebrows, she said, is the "military eyebrow" which frames the eye and calls attention to it. The military e. "brow follows natural lines but is somewhat heavier than the ones Mother Nature created."

Miss Morris cautioned women to keep that "open look" that "men like" in their eyes—but she did not explain just what an "open look" was.

However, she added, be sure to keep the eyebrows in line. The "Jap look" isn't popular this year. She also cautioned women not to get that "pinched-in look" of a school teacher by neglecting to "tweeze" the hairs away from the bridge of the nose.

Thomas Frank, a Chicago beautician, advised women to use eyeshadow to make the eyes

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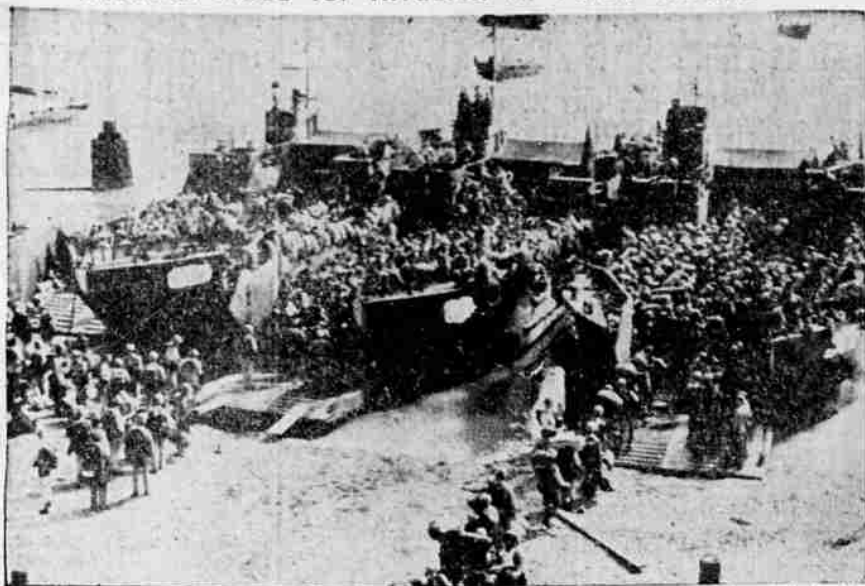
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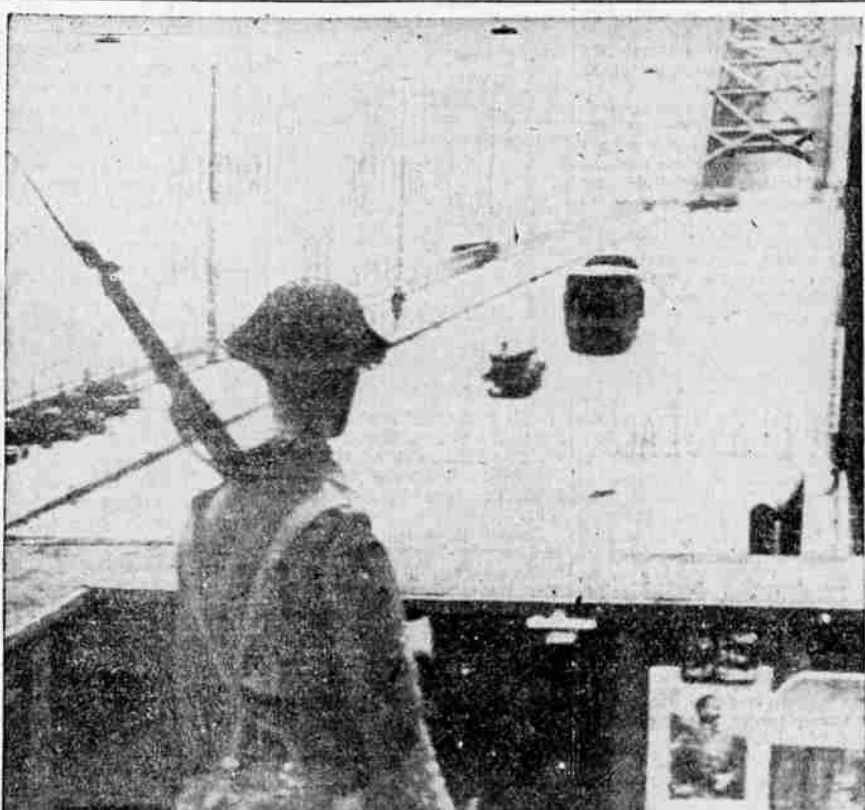
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Marines Head for Invasion of Palau Islands

KAISER IN FAVOR RETURN TO FIXED PRICE CONTRACTS

Portland, Ore., Sept. 27—(U.P.)—A return to fixed price contracts on a competitive basis rather than the more costly cost plus fixed fees was urged today for the shipbuilding industry by Edgar F. Kaiser, president and general manager of the Portland-Vancouver area maritime shipyards.

Kaiser said he was just returned from Washington, D. C., and Oakland, Calif., the Kaiser headquarters, in an endeavor to have the uncompleted portions of all existing contracts held by the yards changed to fixed price contracts so that Portland industry would be on a more stable competitive basis with industries in other areas.

"My father, Henry J. Kaiser, and I believe that a continuation of 'free enterprise,' an over-used term, is based upon competitive pricing," Kaiser said. "Throughout the period of wartime shipbuilding, competitive pricing has been difficult to attain because there was no cost history for the ships we were building. The designs were being continually changed to meet war requirements, and the shortage of manpower resulted in certain regulations that had to be met without regard to cost."

"Now we have reached a period of stabilized costs and stabilized labor conditions, and the time has come when concerns that wish to be in position to build in the future must get on a fixed price basis. We either win or lose."

STEEL DIRECTOR

New York, Sept. 27—(U.P.)—James B. Black of San Francisco was elected a director of the United States Steel corporation yesterday to succeed the late William J. Filbert and become the first Pacific coast director of the corporation.

PASSENGERS STAMPEDE

Long Beach, Cal., Sept. 27—(U.P.)—Fifteen persons were seriously injured last night in a panic-stricken stampede of passengers to escape from a crowded Pacific electric train when a broken trolley sent a sheet of flame licking along the roof of the car. Men and women trampled and clawed each other as more than 150 screaming passengers fought towards exits or leaped through windows.

TRAINING FOR ALL MAIN OBJECTIVE OF AMERICAN LEGION

Portland, Ore., Sept. 27—(U.P.)—Congressional enactment of a universal military training bill is the next objective of himself and the American Legion, former National Commander Warren Atherton said today before he continued to his home in Stockton, Calif.

Atherton said an "all-out" campaign for such legislation is being launched immediately. He emphasized that education as well as military tactics was desired "and if we devote half a year to education and half to military training, we'll turn out a pretty good soldier."

Discussing demobilization of the army, Atherton said it will be difficult to find any plan that will please everybody but said he felt there was merit in a system based on length of service, merit and family obligations.

He said every effort is being made in the Pacific to get furloughed men adequate transportation home, but reminded that many men who have been on duty the longest are such key men that the war effort would be slowed if they were to come home.
