FIRST BALLOT OF VOTER IN SERVICE MAY BE IN MAIL

Many Servicemen Have Already Received Oregon Ballots; 50,000 May Vote

Salem, Ore., Sept. 28.—(U.P.)—The general election in Oregon has started.

Although election day is not until November 7, the first ballot marked by an Oregonian may already have been cast—by a serviceman or woman.

Nearly all the soldier and sailor absentee ballots have been mailed by this time, and many servicemen in this country have already received them. Others will be getting them soon.

Servicemen may mark and mail in their ballots as soon as they receive them.

Some Mail Later
The Oregon soldier voting law, as passed by the last legislature and administered by the secretary of state, compares favorably with those of many other states in getting ballots to servicemen. In this state mailing started as soon as possible after 5 p. m. last Friday, the filing deadline, 45 days before election.

While some states mailed out ballots as long ago as July, others, such as Arkansas, will give considerably less time for ballots to go and return. Only 13 days are allowed for this in Arkansas.

Servicemen's votes will be a not inconsiderable portion of the votes cast in Oregon this year. An estimated 50,000 soldiers will have requested ballots before the election, and a large percentage of them are expected to vote. In case of close contests, they may very well be enough to swing the decision one way or another.

Such a large number of absentee votes brings an entirely new element into the election. Many voters will have to vote without having heard all the pros and cons of various candidates and measures from their proponents and foes, in the state elections.

Lines Well Drawn
And many will vote long before the national campaigns are completed.

For resident voters, the lines are pretty well drawn, with the ballot now complete. There will be four presidential candidates on the ballot—Roosevelt and Dewey, and Norman Thomas and Claude A. Watson, both running as independents because the socialist and prohibitionist parties failed to qualify in Oregon.

Two initiatives will appear among the nine proposals on the ballot—the school support fund amendment, and the "Little Townsend Plan" or "S60 at 60" bill, the controversial measure which won a place on the ballot when litigation in Marion county and the supreme court failed to keep it off.

The other proposals, four amendments and three laws, include:

Authorization for counties to have a managerial form of government; authorization of a war veterans fund from which loans can be made, financed from bonds and property tax; author-

ization of a law to permit felons to vote; veterans educational aid bill; three per cent sales tax; provision whereby wines more than 14 per cent alcohol must be sold in state liquor stores, and an amendment providing alternative means for securing bank depositors, other than the double liability of stockholders as at present.

SIX HUNDRED FIFTY-ODD DENTISTS

Since 1940 I have sent to six hundred fifty-odd dentists with my compliments the No. 1 Little Lesson in the Ways of Health, "Save Your Teeth." Readers other than physicians or dentists may have a copy of the 70-page booklet if (1) they ask for it—and a clipping is not a request; (2) inclose twenty-five cents and stamped self-addressed envelope. Dentists or physicians need inclose only a stamped self-addressed envelope.

In most instances I have asked the dentist to whom I mailed the booklet to criticize it or me just between ourselves, in a friendly way—that is, to tell me off if I am wrong about anything, in his judgment, just as my medical and dental friends do, without gloves, I can take it and I like it, and just such criticism is and always has been of utmost value in keeping this column, well, away from going haywire. For example, on a fateful Sunday (June 17, '28) I appealed to dentists who were legitimately entitled to the degree D.D.S. or D.M.D. or other doctorate degree than M.D. to relinquish use of the trade name "Doctor" to practicing physicians exclusively for the welfare of the public. That was pretty radical. Still, it was not until a few years later, as nearly as I can recollect now, that I committed the unforgivable sin—I proposed that practicing dentists adopt a certain trademark name (which I am not going to mention any more) to indicate to the public the nature of their trade, leaving the trademark name "Doctor" to the exclusive use of practicing physicians.

Of the six hundred-odd dentists scarcely a dozen took time out to criticize the booklet or my teachings—that is in an honest, sincere way.

A new edition of the booklet "Save Your Teeth" is now ready and I invite dentists to send a stamped self-addressed envelope for a copy. (Physicians, too, O.K.—may have a copy for twenty-five cents and stamped self-addressed envelope.) I believe and hope the dentists will find little in the new edition they cannot approve of. I even hope they may derive some practical benefit from glancing through the booklet. I shall not ask for their
