

BRITISH EXTEND BRIDGEHEAD ON RUBICON BANKS

Rome, Sept. 28—(U.P.)—British Eighth army troops extended their bridgehead across the Rubicon to a width of 10 miles and a depth of two miles today, and captured the Adriatic coastal town of Bellaria, seven miles north of Rimini.

In the mountainous central sector, meanwhile, U. S. 5th army troops, apparently recovered from fierce German counter-attacks, advanced as much as two miles in 24 hours at some points and recaptured the spur of Mount Alafine ridge which was lost to the enemy on Tuesday.

The Americans and South African troops attached to the 5th army also captured the town of Castiglione, 11 miles west of Firenze, and about midway between Florence and Bologna, on the Florence-Prato-Bologna highway.

With the capture of Castel Del Rio in the central sector, the Americans were within 19 miles of their ultimate objective, Bologna, key city of the great Po valley. It is the northernmost point of the entire allied line extending across the Italian Peninsula.

DO YOU LIKE GRAPE JELLY?

This Delicious Recipe Saves Sugar

For jelly making, Concord grapes are best. All blue grapes, however, are NOT Concord. Be sure you get Concord when you ask for them.

CONCORD GRAPE JELLY
5 Cups Concord Juice
7 Cups Sugar
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash and crush 3 1/2 pounds fully ripe grapes. Add 1 1/2 cups water and simmer, covered, 10 minutes. Squeeze out juice. Measure exactly 5 level cups squeezed juice (add water to fill last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin, stir well, bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 2 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, skim carefully. Pour into sterilized glasses, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.

WHITE GRAPE JELLY
3 1/2 Cups Squeezed Juice
4 1/2 Cups Sugar
1 Cup Lemon Juice
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Use seedless Muscat or Malaga. Wash and stem about 3 pounds of grapes. Add 1 1/2-cup water and simmer, covered, 25 minutes. Squeeze out juice then, using proportions above, follow same procedure as in making Concord Grape Jelly.

RUSSIANS SMASH ACROSS DANUBE INTO YUGOSLAVIA

London, Sept. 28—(U.P.)—The German high command said today that Russian forces had smashed across the Danube river into Yugoslavia from the iron gate area of Romania—a crossing apparently aimed at a junction with Marshal Tito's partisan army.

The Moscow radio reported that the Soviet high command asked Tito for permission to cross into Yugoslavia for military operations, and the partisan commander agreed.

The Russians have been massing on the Yugoslav frontier for weeks since their swift drive across Romania, and a Danube crossing from the Orsova area as reported by Berlin would open the Morava valley to them.

On the northern front, Russian forces were driving over the approaches to Riga, routing the Nazi rear guard fighting for time to evacuate the Latvian capital.
