

JAPAN'S DEFEAT SURE BUT DISTANT LEADERS ASSERT

Year and Half After Ger-
many's Surrender Is Be-
lieved Absolute Minimum.

Washington, Sept. 28.—U.P.—
Allied victory in the east is cer-
tain, but military leaders be-
lieve it will take an "absolute
minimum" of 1½ years after
defeat of Germany to bring un-
conditional surrender from Jap-
an, the Office of War Informa-
tion reported today.

The odds all favor the Allies.
The OWI said in a survey based
on data from the war navy and
state departments, but "overall
military plans, including those
concerned with war production,
are based on the assumption
that it may take years rather
than months, to defeat Japan."

Stalemate Hope

Japanese warlords themselves
are confident they can drag out
the conflict so long "that the
'soft' democracies will be forced
into a stalemate, the report said,
and in any event there are ob-
vious factors "favoring the Japa-
nese and pointing toward the
prolongation of the war."

Not the least of these factors
are a still powerful Japanese
fleet of 10 to 13 battleships and
10 to 12 large aircraft carriers,
a constantly improving air force
and an army of 4,000,000 men of
military age available for service.

And the psychological effect
of Germany's collapse, the OWI
said, might well heighten Japan's
determination and fighting spirit.

Whatever else happens, "no
internal collapse of Japan is ex-
pected," the OWI said. The re-
port quoted Joseph C. Grew, for
10 years ambassador to Japan,
as saying of the Pacific enemy
that "only by utter physical de-
struction or utter exhaustion of
their men and materials can they
be defeated."

The Japanese, on the other
hand, "are expecting the Allies
to grow tired and accept a nego-
tiated peace."

While "the mustered power of
the Allies is overwhelming," geo-
graphy "fights on the side of
the Japanese," the OWI pointed
out, and the United Nations
must conquer vast distances never
before brought into military
calculations before they can
throw their full might against
the enemy.

BAKER VETERAN WILL GET FIRST JOBLESS CHECK

With several thousand of Ore-
gon's service men already de-
mobilized, only a few so far have
taken advantage of the readjust-
ment allowances for out-of-work
veterans under terms of the G-I
bill of rights passed by congress
in June.

The first \$20 check went out
this week from the state unem-
ployment compensation commis-
sion, which has been designated
by the veterans administration
to handle Oregon payments. Re-
cipient of No. 1 check was Glenn
Lewis of Baker, while No. 2
went to Roy Sutton of Salem.

In the three weeks during
which claims have been taken
at 22 U. S. employment offices,
15 veterans have asked allow-
ances and three have continued
claims into the second week. Un-
der the bill's terms, 52 weeks of
payments may be made within
two years after discharge or the
end of the war. Partial allow-
ances also are made for quali-
fied workers who earn less than
\$23 a week or for self-employed
veterans making less than \$100
a month.

Acting as readjustment allow-
ance agent for the veterans ad-
ministration in Oregon is Arthur
Heer, who formerly was with the
state unemployment commission.

and R2 stamps worth 5 gallons
each; D, 1½ gallons; E, 1 gallon.

FUEL OIL

Period 4 and 5 coupons valid
until August 31, 1945. New pe-
riod 1 coupons may be used as
soon as received.

LAMB BONUS

October 21—Expiration date
of spare stamp No. 25 in ration
book 4 valid exclusively for 10
pounds of lamb.

MEATS, FATS

Red stamps A8 through Z8 and
A5 through G5 in ration book
No. 4 valid indefinitely. Each
stamp worth 10 points.

Stamps H5 through K5 valid
October 1.

PROCESSED FOODS

Blue stamps A8 through Z8
and A5 through L5 in ration
book No. 4 valid indefinitely.
Each stamp worth 10 points.

Stamps B5 through R5 valid
October 1. Blue tokens discon-
tinued October 1. To be used in
groups of 10 for purchase from
now until October 1.

SUGAR

Stamps Nos. 30, 31, 32 and 33
in book No. 4 valid indefinitely
(5 pounds each). Stamp No. 40
valid for five pounds home can-
ning sugar to February 28, 1945.

SHOES

Airplane stamps Nos. 1 and 2
in ration book No. 3 valid indefi-
nitely (each good for one pair).
