HOODED BAD-MAN MEETS KATONEN ON ARMORY MAT

Head Crackers to Collide In Top Half of Double Main Event; Gong at 8:30

It will be Paavo Katonen's turn to feel the stunning shock of a hard-as-rock cranium smashing into his when he goes against the "Gray Mask," hooded bad-man, in the top half of a double main event in the armory grappling ring tonight.

The "Mask," whose vicious head-butts cooled off Coast Light-Heavy Champ Jack Kaiser on last week's program, plans to employ the same devastating, but legal, tactics against the husky Finn, ex-coast titlist.

Head-Butts Legal

Those head-butts are legal, that is, if "The Mask" hasn't concealed under his bonnet some sort of a shock absorber. From the way he staggered Kaiser last week by ramming his noggin against Jack's, while remaining upright and apparently unaffected by the collisions, himself, a touch of suspicion was injected into the minds of a number of fans and members of the boxing and wrestling commission.

Is the "Gray Mask" just a hard-headed hombre who can knock guys silly with his dome, or does he have under the head-covering a concealed weapon? That's the question that has been asked by more than one local citizen ever since last Thursday night.

Nobody knows for sure, but suspicions have been aroused and it can be stated that the boxing and wrestling commission will watch things pretty closely when the "Mask" and southpaw Katonen start tossing and belting each other around the area.

Kaiser, fully recovered from the beating he suffered at the hands of the "Gray Mask" last week, will tackle Harold (Buck) Davidson in the lower half of the double main event, both of which will be for an hour's straight wrestling time or the best two out of three falls.

Davidson is inclined to be rather off-color in his mat work at times and it appears Kaiser has his work cut out for him. Tex Porter, a clean and scientific performer, faces Pat O'Dowdy, at the other extreme, in the three-round opener getting under way at 8:30 sharp.

YANKEES NURSE SLIM CHANGE IN AMERICAN RACE

New York, Sept. 28.—(U.P.)—The Detroit Tigers took a precious one game lead over the St. Louis Browns in the American league today, while the New York Yankees still nursed their mathematical pennant hopes three games off the pace and with only four left to play.

Detroit picked up the margin by winning 4 to 0 over the Philadelphia Athletics behind Hal Newhouser's five-hit shutout. It was his 28th victory and sixth shutout.

The Browns lost 4 to 1 to the Boston Red Sox in the mud and rain at St. Louis last night, with the game being delayed more than six hours because of the weather. Originally scheduled as a day game, it was called off and rescheduled for a night contest. George Woods, a seldom-used Boston pitcher, came out of obscurity to turn in a four-hit victory over the Browns.

Yanks Win

The Yankees defeated the Chicago White Sox 7 to 2, clinching the victory for Rookie Floyd Bevens with a four run rally in the seventh.

In the only other American league game, Cleveland defeated Washington 6 to 4 with a sand lot rookie, Earl Henry, on the mound.

Clyde King, fresh from the Class B Piedmont league, accomplished what some American league pitcher will be hoping to do next week when he provided the Brooklyn Dodgers with a 3 to 2 victory over the Champion St. Louis Cards. In other National league games, Buckey Walters won his 23rd game for the Cincinnati Reds by beating the New York Giants 8 to 1, the Boston Braves tossed out the Pittsburgh Pirates 4 to 3, and Chicago defeated the Philadelphia Phillies, 5 to 3 in 11 innings.

GOLF BALL HOPE DASHED FOR 1945

Chicago, Sept. 28.—(U.P.)—The nation's golfers are "due for a sad awakening from their dream of new golf balls for next season," L. E. Coleman, according to president of the Golf Ball Manufacturers association.

Coleman said yesterday that the government's recent allocation of a small amount of synthetic rubber to golf ball thread makers was for experimental purposes. If the rubber can be used the golf balls produced will be used by the army for the rehabilitation of servicemen, he said.

He predicted an acute shortage of golf balls during 1945 and urged golfers to turn in used balls for reprocessing during the winter.

Lumber Demand to Drop After War Is Byrnes Prediction

Washington, Sept. 28.—(U.P.)—Mobilization Director James F. Byrnes predicted today that war demand for lumber would fall off after the end of the European war to such an extent that enough wood and building materials would be available to fill all needs for private construction.

Byrnes estimated that 1944 lumber production would be 36,000,000,000 feet, compared with the 1939 output of 28,000,000,000 feet. He said recent surveys indicated that the lumber situation will remain tight after "V-E" day but that there will be enough to take care of private construction.

War production board sources said Byrnes was somewhat optimistic in his predictions but that there might be enough lumber to meet "reasonable" building demands after the German surrender.
