

4-H Livestock Auctioned As Concluding Feature Of Club's Annual Fair

In what was described by those interested as one of the best 4-H livestock auction sales ever held in Jackson county, sixty head of beef steers, 18 hogs and 23 fat lambs were sold Thursday in the windup feature of the annual 4-H fair at the Jackson county fairground.

Grand champion beef steer owned by Dillon Arnold, Valleyview, was sold to Safeway Stores, Inc., for 47½¢ per pound and from there on prices ranged down to 12¢. The Groceteria Food Market purchased the

champion Angus, owned by Jan Freeman of Central Point, at 37½¢ per pound. The grand champion fat lamb owned by Nadine Davies, Antelope, was sold to John Day of Blue Moon ranch for 55¢ per pound. The grand champion fat hog owned by Robert Koger of Sams Valley, was sold to Crater Lake Motors, Medford, for 25¢ per pound. The champion Duroc hog owned by Bill Kramer of Howard, was sold to Crater Meat Co. of Medford at 26¢ per pound, and the champion Hampshire hog owned by Margaret Reed of Table Rock, was also sold to Crater Meat Co. for 21¢ per pound.

UNITED ADDS TO MEDFORD SERVICE; TEN TRIPS DAILY

To meet the needs of expanding passenger, mail and express traffic between Medford and other Pacific Coast points, United Air Lines has been granted a fifth daily round trip the length of the coast by the Civil Aeronautics Board. It was announced today by Jack Y. Meyer, station manager here. The new schedule is effective Sunday, October 1, Meyer said.

The new flight will bring to 420 the number of passenger seats on flights in and out of Medford daily, the manager pointed out, and added that this puts Medford service on a par with Sacramento and gives more than twice the service furnished Salem and Eugene.

The new southbound flight, to be No. 56, will not stop at Sacramento or Oakland and will be United's fastest schedule to date between Medford, San Francisco and Los Angeles, Meyer said. Leaving here at 7:11 p. m., the flight will arrive in Los Angeles four hours and 19 minutes later, or 11:30 p. m., with but the one stop in San Francisco.

No. 57, the new northbound trip, will leave Medford at 12:17 p. m. for Portland and Seattle. The five flights north bound each day will now be departing
