## TIGERS BLISTER MARSHFIELD BY COUNT OF 33-0

Locals Score In First, Third and Final Periods: Clark Leads Attack.

Packing most of their scoring punch into the first and third periods—two touchdowns in each plus one in the final quarter for good measure—Medford high's "T" boys blanked the Marshfield high Pirates, 33 to 0 here Friday night for their second successive victory.

The wet, slippery turf and the driving rain, which held attendance down to between 1,500 and 2,000 spectators, apparently didn't hamper the T-formation magic the Tornado tossed at its outclassed opponent.

And, while Medford's speedy backs were racing to these five touchdowns and 323 net yards gained on the ground, the giant forward wall of Coach Al Simpson's club was throwing up an impenetrable barrier that yielded a mere 42 net yards to the Pirates.

## DETROIT, BROWNS BOTH SCORE WIN TO MAINTAIN TIE

Playoff Monday If Deadlock Unbroken In Final Games Today.

Sportsman's Park, St. Louis, Sept. 30—(UP)—The St. Louis Browns, baseball's ragged riches kids, came up with some more spectacular pitching and fielding today to keep their pennant hopes alive with a brilliant 2 to 0 victory over the New York Yankees.

The victory, coupled with Detroit's defeat of Washington, sent the Browns and the Tigers into the final day of the 1944 season just where they were 153 games ago. And if the 154th game tomorrow doesn't break the deadlock there will be a play-off game in Detroit Monday to determine the World Series opponent of the St. Louis Cardinals.

Dennis Galehouse turned the Yankees back on five hits and with the aid of magnificent fielding by Kreevich, and Christman never was in serious trouble.

His shutout was the fourth turned in by a St. Louis pitcher in the Browns last six games and it extended the streak of scoreless innings for the Yankees to 26.

It took clutch pitching by Dubiel, too, to turn the Browns back with only one run in the early innings. They got that one in the first. Don Gutteridge walked, went to second when Chen Leab beat out a bunt. Vernon Stephens' fly enabled Gutteridge to score.

But Dubiel settled down then and turned the Browns back without further damage. But he got into another jam in the second when Hayworth singled and went all the way to third when Dubiel picked up Galehouse's sacrifice bunt and threw it into center field. With men on third and second and none out, he bore down again to shut the scoring door.

That run loomed bigger and bigger with Galehouse setting down the Yankees inning after inning. In the sixth, Moore hit his sixth home run of the season. In the all-important game tomorrow, Sewell will go with Sig Jakucki, who has won 12 games while losing nine this season, and McCarthy will use Queen, whose record is six and two.

Briggs Stadium, Detroit, Sept. 30—(UP)—Young Hal Newhouse, the hometown boy who fires the high hard one, came through with his 29th triumph to stop the Washington Senators, 7 to 3, today and keep his Detroit Tigers tied with St. Louis for first place in the American league pennant race.

The 23-year-old southpaw, baseball's leading winner of the year, thus held the Bengals even as they came up for a photo finish final game tomorrow. But he found the going rough, as the shadows settled over big Briggs stadium and the battling Senators touched him for four hits and two runs in the ninth before he put out the fire.

Before a tense crowd of 16,444 Newhouse set a new major league mark for games won by two pitchers. For, with his teammate Dizzy Trout's 27, they

broke the 55-game record set in 1920 by Jim Bagby and Stan Koveleski of Cleveland.

The loser was Alex Carrasquel, touched for nine hits and five runs before Roger Wolff took over at the start of the seventh and finished a game in which the booming Detroit bats collected 13 safeties.

This left tomorrow's final up to Trout, with Washington using Dutch Leonard.

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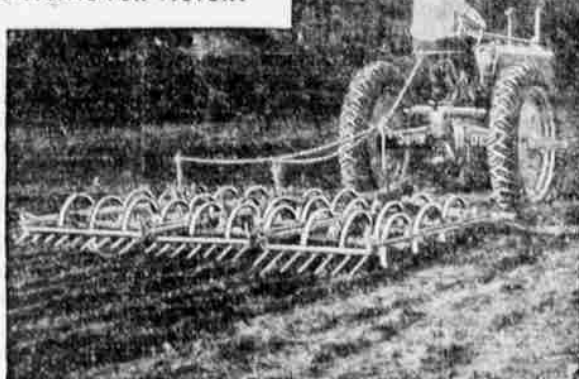
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
