County Treasurer Speaks Tuesday For Zonta Club

Financial condition of Jackson county was discussed by the county treasurer, Ralph E. Sweeney, at the meeting of Medford Zonta club Tuesday evening at the Holland Hotel.

Treasurer Sweeney stated that there is now a fund of \$285,000 on hand for post-war road building and that the county also planned to set aside \$36,000 each year for three years to construct a new wing for the county farm. Total invested funds of the county now amount to \$399,600, Mr. Sweeney said.
