CLOTHING DRIVE FOR EUROPEANS STARTS MONDAY

Collection of clothing for destitute of the newly liberated sections of war-torn Europe will begin at 10 a.m. Monday at the collection center located in the former Al Piche hardware store next to Luman's Grocery on East Main street, it was announced Saturday by the committee in charge.

The center will be open daily this week until Friday noon to receive donations of discarded yet usable men's, women's, children's, and infants' garments as well as all forms of bedding. Ladies of the Medford Council of Church Women will be on hand between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. every day to receive and sort all materials brought in.

It was emphasized that all clothing donated must be in acceptable form, clean, patched if necessary, and with all buttons intact. Shoes, gloves, rubber goods, and impractical forms of garments not suitable for daily hard wear such as old evening gowns, etc., cannot be used.

KEY PORTS, BASE ON CELEBES HIT

Allied Headquarters, Southwest Pacific, Sunday, Oct. 8.—(UP)—Liberator bombers of the Far Eastern Air Force hit airbases and key ports on Celebes island with 86 tons of explosives Thursday, striking at Makassar, Mandal and Kendari. Gen Douglas MacArthur announced today. The big bombers unloaded 53 tons of bombs on the Kendari airbases in daylight Thursday and that night other formations swept over the southwestern peninsula to hit Makassar and Mandal with 33 tons.

It was the second raid in five days on Makassar, key port on the Makassar strait.
