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## JUDGE FEE GIVES PARTIAL PERMIT

Attorneys for the defense in the cases of Dr. R. W. Clancy and Dr. A. F. Walter Kresse, charged with violation of the federal narcotics act, may examine only those prescriptions specifically mentioned in the indictments of the two physicians, according to a ruling of Judge James Alger Fee, in Medford for the fall session of federal court.

Judge Fee Friday afternoon ruled on motions of George Roberts and Otto Frohnmeyer that they be permitted to examine all prescriptions removed from the files of local druggists by the federal agents investigating the case, only partially granting the motions. The ruling covered both motions.

Both physicians entered not guilty pleas before Judge Fee last week and their trial dates were set. Dr. Clancy's case for Oct. 17 and Dr. Kresse's trial for Oct. 23.

## SCOUT TRAINING PAYS DIVIDENDS ON BATTLEFRONT

Boy Scout training has resulted in better-trained servicemen, local Scouting officials state, pointing out that the soldier's ability to out-think, out-last and out-smart the enemy depends upon his boyhood life, as well as his post-induction training. Though the army calls this "battlefield life insurance," and the Scouts call it "preparation for living" the results are the same, leaders claim.

"Officers at the battle fronts send back word to training centers. Replacements should have better pre-induction training, for what must be done cannot be done in six months," Scout leaders declare.

"The Boy Scouting program has greatly helped in this respect. Among the things which older boys in this program practice are: running obstacle course, rope climbing, stalking, personal first aid, jumps, vaults, distance walking with full packs, axmanship, knot tying (with emphasis on speed), and silent swimming. All these things of course, come directly from the regular Scouting and stress outdoor activities.

"Emergency swimming teaches several water practices calculated to be of particular help to the soldier at the battlefield. Some of these are: Entering water silently, swimming quietly and leaving water without movement or (if not buoyant) with a minimum of movement; rapid disappearance both head first and feet first; clothed in cotton trousers and shirt, entering water feet first, squeezing air out of shirt, then reinflating, then moving trousers, tying knot in bottom of each leg, inflating and using as float; how to break cramp in calf of leg, the thigh and foot."

These and other activities of the Boy Scouts depend in Medford on contributions to the Medford Community Chest and War Fund.

**10 RATION POINTS FOR EACH FURLOUGH MEAL**  
Service men, on leave or furlough 72 hours or longer, may obtain furlough rations of processed foods on the basis of 10 points for each nine meals, Willard Case, district OPS food rationing representative has informed the local rationing board. Previous regulations allowed issuance of only eight points for each nine meals, but adjustment has been made because point values of processed foods are now set in multiples of ten, it was explained.

## STATLER BATTLE POLITICAL MYTH, DELEGATE AVERS

Declaring that in his opinion the so-called "Statler Hotel battle" had been trumped up, probably for political reason, Don Stansell of Medford commented on the stories of the incident after his return to the city from Washington, D. C., where he attended the banquet following which the "battle" supposedly took place. Stansell, secretary of the Medford Teamsters' union, and also secretary of the Medford Central Labor Council, was a delegate to the convention of the A.F. of L. Teamsters' union which culminated in the banquet, addressed by President Roosevelt.

The secretary said that he and other delegates were in the east for a few days following the convention and heard nothing of the incident, in which a group of teamster delegates were reported to have picked a quarrel with two naval officers for refusing to talk politics, until his return to the west. Stansell said he and other delegates were "amazed" when they read the accounts of the convention has been unusually orderly and quiet, that a no-drinking rule had been rigidly enforced for the entire two days the meetings lasted and that after the banquet the entire delegation had dispersed to their rooms or to other points without anything unusual taking place.
