

# LT. MONROE HOME FROM LONG TOUR OF PACIFIC DUTY

Second Lt. Lowell W. Monroe, 319 Ashland avenue, arrived in Medford Monday night after having spent 30 months in the South Pacific as an infantry officer. He reports Nov. 1 to a California station for reassignment.

Lt. Monroe left Medford with the National Guard unit which became a part of the 41st Infantry division and went overseas with that division. He was on duty in Australia and later was in New Guinea for 16 months part of that time being on combat duty. Lt. Monroe went into the army from school, having graduated from Medford senior high school with the class of 1941.

His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Lowell Monroe, Sr., and reside

at the Ashland avenue address. Lt. Monroe reported that two other Medford servicemen reported in at Ft. Lewis from overseas duty with him, the men being T Sgt. Ralph Carmichael and Cpl. Joe Dallaire and that both were due to arrive in Medford some time this week.

## TAX STRIKER SUES CHEST WORKERS

San Francisco, Oct. 11—(UP)—Miss Vivian Kellems, 47-year-old Connecticut business woman who went on a tax strike and whose correspondence with an alleged German agent in Argentina was read in the house of representatives, asked \$500,000 damages from the San Francisco Labor Herald and 17 persons associated with the CIO in a suit on file today in federal district court.

Miss Kellems charged her character was defamed by an article in the Labor Herald which appeared April 14 describing her brother, State Assemblyman Jesse Randolph Kellems, who is a candidate for congress from the California 16th district, as a "reactionary Republican" and referring to "the treasonable operations of Jesse's sister, Vivian."

Miss Kellems asks \$250,000 actual damages and \$250,000 exemplary damages for the article which she asserts has exposed her to "hatred, contempt, ridicule and obloquy."

## Drop Kitchen Sink On Japanese Base

With 5th Air Force, Southwest Pacific, Oct. 11—(UP)—The "Air Apaches," a Mitchell bomber outfit, finally did it. They hit the Japanese with everything—including the kitchen sink.

On a recent mission in the southwest Pacific, the crew of "Rita's Wagon" took the sink along as a gag. But when the B-25 reached the designated spot, the bombardier, S Sgt. Neal H. (Little Iron Man) Ryan, Watson-town, Pa., with 101 combat missions, lined up his sights and let go with the homestead hardware right on the target.

## Sorry Nazi Spy Given 29 Years

New York, Oct. 11—(UP)—Wilhelm Albrecht Von Rautter, former German count convicted of conspiring to spy for the nazis, was sentenced today to 29 years in federal prison, after pleading for leniency on the grounds he was sorry.

The 44-year-old ex-nobleman and naturalized American citizen pleaded guilty on September 28 of sending vital information to Germany on the U. S. defenses.

## AFL Will Finance Foreign Unions

New York, Oct. 11—(UP)—A campaign to raise \$1,000,000 among American Federation of Labor members to "aid in re-establishing independent trade unions in Europe and South America" was announced today by Matthew Woll, vice-president of the AFL.

Woll, president of the free trade union committee of the Labor League for Human Rights, relief arm of the AFL, which will raise the fund, said the committee is an outgrowth of the AFL conviction that "without a free trade union movement it will be impossible to rebuild a democratic Europe."

## Coast States Need War Plant Workers

Los Angeles, Oct. 11—(UP)—California, Oregon and Washington need 65,000 workers in shipyards and aircraft plants now and 10,000 to 12,000 workers are leaving California alone each month, War Manpower Commission officials said today at a re-conversion hearing before Sen. Sheridan Downey.

F. W. Hunter, regional director, said the present labor shortage assures work for all available manpower during the period between Germany's fall and the end of the far eastern war.
