The Mask has his identity at stake tonight when he meets Jack Kizer, Pacific coast light heavyweight champ in the main event in the ring at the Medford armory. Mack Lillard, promoter, said that the mystery man has promised to remove his hood when he is beaten at legitimate wrestling. And if he loses to Kizer off comes the hood. If he wins, it will be his fourth consecutive victory in the Medford grappling circle.

Kizer, who is tops at wrestling on the coast, will give the hooded one a run for his money. And Kizer probably will use all efforts to keep away from the Mask's steel noggin.

In each meeting here thus far the Mask's opponent has gone down for the count after a bounce off the Mask's head. The bout will be an hour event or two out of three falls.

Buck Davidson, loser to the Mask last week by a foul, appears against Herb Parks in four ten minute rounds or two out of three falls. Parks has appeared in the Medford ring on previous occasions and Davidson has quite a following, despite his off-color wrestling technique, such as he employed last week in an effort to remove the hood from the Mask's head.

Curtain opener at 8:30 p. m. sees Tony Ross and Tex Porter the latter a Medford man in three ten-minute rounds.

TO TAKE TITLE IN
SECONDARY SERIES

Baltimore, Oct. 12—(U.P.)—The Baltimore Orioles of the International League held the 1944 Little World Series title today, defeating the American Association playoff winners, the Louisville Colonels, four games to two in the annual minor league classic.

Winners of the International League pennant during the regular season and also of the post-season playoffs, the Orioles defeated the Colonels 5-3 in the sixth game of the best-of-seven series here last night before 23,536 fans.

The birds came from behind with three runs in the seventh inning, paced by singles from the bats of Bob Lathaw, Frank Skaff and Sherman Lollar and two Louisville errors for their margin of victory.

The Colonels had taken the lead in the second inning when they tagged Baltimore starter Stan West for two runs.

Both clubs used three pitchers with Ambrose (Bob) Palica getting credit for the victory and Otis Clark suffering the loss. West, Sam Lowry and Palica collaborated on a seven hit hurling job while their mates tagged starter Mel Deutsch and his successors for 10 safe blows.

The Colonels narrowly missed at least a tie in the ninth inning when, with two down and a man on base, Nick Polly hit a ball into the left field stand that was foul by inches.
